The 'European Union Prize for Contemporary Architecture - Mies van der Rohe Award' is Europe's most prestigious and famed prize for contemporary architecture. Every two years and for the past 25 years the prize committee awards innovative architectural projects by visionary architects. Previous winners include renowned architects David Chipperfield, Rem Koolhaas and Zaha Hadid.

The forty projects selected in last year's edition are now presented in a travelling exhibition which can also be found in M – Museum Leuven, its only stop in the Benelux. The exhibition is a showcase of striking contemporary architecture from all over Europe, summed up in images, models and succinct texts. The laureate receives a place of honour: a panel of international judges, chaired by Wiel Arets, having assessed a total of 335 nominated projects from 37 European countries, has elected as its winner the Harpa concert hall and conference centre in Reykjavík by the Danish architecture office Henning Larsen Architects, the Icelandic architects' practice Batteríið, and the artist Olafur Elíasson. The concert hall has, according to the jury, revitalised the harbour area and has provided a wonderful transition to Reykjavík's vibrant city life. The crystal structure of the building was inspired by Icelandic landscapes and makes for a unique spectacle when the port's waters and the concert hall's transparent structure converse through infinite rays of sunlight.

The "Emerging Architect Special Mention", awarded to up-coming young architects, was granted to María Langarita and Víctor Navarro for the Nave de Música Matadero (Red Bull Music Academy) in Madrid. The Prize consists of a cash prize of 60,000€, while the Special Mention is endowed with 20,000€. Belgian projects were nominated as well. The Market Hall in Ghent by architecture offices *Robbrecht en Daem* and *Marie-José Van Hee architecten* made it to the finals.

This year's exhibition will include a special feature: to celebrate the award's 25-year anniversary the exhibition will present all twelve winners from previous editions. Accompanying the exhibition are a catalog and an additional jubilee publication, both of which are available at M – Museum Leuven.

Harpa forms part of an extensive plan to expand and revitalize the eastern harbour of Reykjavik, as well as to improve the connection between this part of the harbour and the city centre. The building consists of both concert and conference facilities, including four main halls. Seen from the foyer, the configuration of the halls forms a sort of 'massif', recalling the rocky Icelandic coast, which contrasts to the expressive multifaceted glass façade that is the result of a unique collaboration with Studio Olafur Elíasson.

The changing daylight penetrating the façade creates a vibrant and adventurous play of light, shadow and colour in the foyer. Inspired by the crystallised basalt columns commonly found in Iceland, the southern façades create kaleidoscopic reflections of the city and the surrounding landscape. Made of a twelve-sided space-filler of glass and steel that Eliasson calls 'quasi brick', the building appears as an ever-changing play of color, reflected in the more than 1,000 three-dimensional bricks composing the southern façade. The remaining façades and the roof are made of sectional representations of this geometric system, resulting in two-dimensional flat façades of five and six-sided structural frames.

Light and transparency are the key elements of the building. Emerging on the border between the land and the sea, the crystalline structure captures and reflects the light – promoting a dialogue between the building, the city, and the surrounding landscape. One of the main ideas has been to 'dematerialise' the building as a static entity and let it respond to the surrounding colors of the city lights, ocean and glow of the sky.

EMERGING ARCHITECT SPECIAL MENTION

Nave de Música Matadero (Red Bull Music Academy) Madrid, Spain

The Red Bull Music Academy (RBMA) is a nomadic annual music festival. The 2011 edition of RBMA was going to be held in Tokyo, but given the devastating effects of the earthquake, the location had to be changed. With only two months to build, the city of Madrid took over. The creative space known as Matadero Madrid, which is located in an early 20th-century industrial warehouse complex, was designated as the event's new location. The RBMA at Matadero Madrid launched the programming for the new Nave de Musica, a space specifically dedicated to audio creation and research. The construction project was approached as a temporary structure based on the criteria of adaptability and reversibility that would make it easy to completely or partially reconfigure over time. Under these circumstances and in an emergency situation, the work began on an infrastructure capable of meeting the precise technical and acoustic needs of the event, in addition to accelerating, promoting and enriching a series of extremely intense artistic encounters that would take place between the participating musicians. At the same time, an environment was added that would record and archive everything taking place. The proposal was developed following five guidelines: deadlines and budget, preservation of the warehouse, programme requirements, acoustics, and temporariness. As a result, the project unfolded in the warehouse's interior in the form of a fragmented urban structure in which the variable relationship between proximity and independence, and pre-existence and performance, could offer unexpected stages to its community of inhabitants.

BELGIAN FINALIST

Robbrecht en Daem architecten, Marie-José Van Hee architecten



Following two demolition campaigns for a world exhibition in 1913 and an administrative centre never built in the 60s, Ghent's historic heart degenerated for decades into a desolate parking lot in between a suite of three adjoining Gothic towers. In two consecutive competitions between 1996 and 2005, Robbrecht en Daem architecten and Marie-José Van Hee architecten proposed their own programme, countering the initial competition requirement. Rather than just providing an open space for events, they sought, by meticulously positioning a market hall, to rectify this deficiency and reinstate the presence of old urban areas that had become unrecognisable. The building positions itself between Poeljemarkt, Goudenleeuwplein, and a new lower 'green' connecting to the brasserie, bicycle park, and public toilets below the hall. And although the building clearly occupies a position on the 24,000 m² site, it fits in well. Compared to St. Nicholas Church, the Belfry and the Cathedral, it assumes the heights of a lower group of buildings such as the adjacent town hall, from which it derives, mathematically, its profile. As an urban interior, the inside embraces passers-by with a dual modulated wooden ceiling, whose small windows scatter light inwards. The exterior, the entire building in fact, seems to assume a respectful role relative to the nobler historic stone buildings, by using a wooden, almost humble, finish. A glass envelope protects the wood and provides a soft shine, with the sky reflected, integrated. Large buffer basins to absorb rainwater, principles of low-energy consumption for the brasserie, use of truly natural materials, the contribution of public transport and a clear vision about giving new value to the historic centre with its old spatial structures, are just parts that broadly flesh out sustainability for the future. The centre of Ghent will again become a social spot for people.
