SEASON 4 | SHORT SYNOPSIS

Oly's the brand new breadwinner; Santi's the unhappy stay-at-home dad, and the endless interventions from their big mess of a family are going to make or break them.

SEASON 4 | LONG SYNOPSIS

In *Bump S4* we've jumped forward in time again – this time by two years. Oly and Santi are back together, having finally stabilised their small family unit with their challenging seven-year-old Jacinda. Angie has moved out of the Chalmers-Davis house into a protest camp, focusing on environmental activism and the climate crisis in part as a useful distraction from her recent heartbreak, putting her at loggerheads once more with Rosa, whose growing restaurant empire seems far from sustainable. Vince, who's living with Oly and Santi and working hard as a midwife, has found his stride with Talia and Ariel and toddler Malik too, although the involvement of Reema as sort-of-step-mum complicates things a little – especially since she has no interest in having kids herself. The unexpected return of Reema's long-distance dad Hazem from the UK is a big curveball for Reema and has implications for her relationship with Vince, and with her mum. Dom is happily re-living his share-house years with his best mate Tim, while Reema and Vince begin to reckon with the fact that

their relationship may not have a viable future. Rosa and Hector are challenged by life with her impossible teenage boys, and a somewhat lost Bowie is struggling through his Saturn return and big questions about the direction his life should take. The perennial battle between Oly's big ambitions and her family obligations comes to a sharp point with her first proper job, which finds her on a steep learning curve with her demanding boss Shauna, the local mayor, who expects Oly to be permanently available, in part because Oly hasn't been completely honest about her home life. Meanwhile Santi struggles to progress his art career and to redefine his masculinity as Jacinda's primary carer at home, no longer the breadwinner. The way Oly and Santi deal with tensions between them over this new phase of their lives, exacerbated by interventions from his dad Matias and both her parents, could make or break them. As the chaos of life shows no signs of settling down, our characters look for ways to find joy in life's many curveballs.

EPISODE 1 “WORK”

Work, life, imbalance: everything's getting in the way of Santi and Oly getting it on.

Oly returns from an overseas trip with her demanding new boss, dreaming about walking out of the airport straight into Santi's arms. But reality has other plans. It's a scorchingly hot day, and no one's come to pick her up, not to mention that her boss insists on her coming into the office later – even though it's Saturday. Jacinda is feeling resentful after her mum's absence and in a mood for punishing Oly, but she's not the only member of the Chalmers-Davis family getting in the way of Santi and Oly's longed-for reunion. Angie, who's moved out of the family home to commit her life to a cause she deeply believes in,

has a mishap that diverts the whole family to casualty. Then Bowie gets in the way; before Santi and Oly's stolen moment is derailed by a phone call from Oly's boss. Oly leaves a cranky Santi stuck in the house and the heat with her infuriating family while she deals with her impossible boss at work, where we discover Oly's told a huge lie that will have consequences for her relationship with Santi. Meanwhile, Vince has moved into the Chalmers-Davis house, doing his best to juggle his relationship with Reema, and Talia and Ariel and their son Malik, along with his demanding career as a midwife.



EPISODE 2 “2”

The terrible twos: Reema is roped into party planning, while Angie goes nuclear on Rosa.

Reema and Vince are juggling Vince’s wider family obligations with the sister-wives, Talia and Ariel and Malik, who’s turning 2. Reema uses her legal expertise to set some clear boundaries, in the process missing out on some key info that will come back to haunt her later on. Meanwhile Angie has a dangerous run-in with Rosa on the road, and follows her all the way to Pica del Sabor HQ, where a stand-up fight ensues. Reema reveals to her mum Ishani that her dad Hazem is back in town from the UK – but her mum’s one step ahead. Vince’s intentions to host a birthday party for Malik are derailed by work, so he asks Reema and Santi to help. But at the party, Reema is on the outer when Talia drops a bombshell. Meanwhile, Angie visits a local community group where a simple question from the convenor spirals into a major emotional realization about Angie’s severe case of climate distress. Reema meets up with her dad, where a conversation about her love life gets complicated. But Hazem has big news of his own.



EPISODE 3 “WOULD YOU RATHER?”

Not the problems we’re supposed to be having: Dom’s back, and a double date strikes out, no spares.

Dom returns from Canada, but he’s hiding from Angie for some reason, and enlisting the family to lie on his behalf. Meanwhile, Reema bites the bullet and introduces Vince to her father, over an excruciatingly awkward lunch where her dad has brought a surprise guest who just so happens to be single, Muslim and interested in all the same things as Reema. At work, pressures continue to escalate for Oly, as she fights to get her boss Shauna on board with Angie’s campaign to save the trees from being bulldozed by the local council. Despite feeling like she’s floundering, Oly gets a promotion from her unpredictable boss, leaving her less certain than ever where she stands. Santi’s struggling with Oly’s new breadwinner role, to the point of nightmares. A new art commission offers a promising reprieve, but when he meets the clients and hears about their special request, he feels further from his goals than ever. A double date with Vince and Reema promises a night off parenting and work responsibilities, but what starts as a happy reminder that they’re young and social beings soon sours when suppressed tensions bubble to the surface.



EPISODE 4 “BOTH ON THREE...”

An awkward proposal, a third wheel and a minor kidnapping.

Jacinda is digging through Santi's clothes drawers when she finds Santi's mum's hidden engagement ring. Naturally, she pops the question to her parents: will you two please get married? Awkward! Once Jacinda has (thankfully) been picked up and escorted to school by bestie Gracie and her dad, Oly and Santi have a chance to have a real talk, where Santi admits he was going to propose but then changed his mind. This escalates into an argument, leaving both of them even more confused about what the other wants. As Oly rushes off to work, Santi spends the day doing manual labour for his dad Matias and grandfather Alejandro, where Matias thinks marrying into the Chalmers-Davies family would be as good as castration. Meanwhile, Reema and Rakim find an obvious connection, notwithstanding Reema's friend, Mariam, the third wheel Reema invited along to set up with him. Oly asks Santi to come along to her work drinks – only for him to discover she's kept a few minor details about her personal life secret in the office. It triggers a full-blown doozy of a fight. Dom deduces that Santi is the cause of Oly's sadness, so with his best mate and brand-new flatmate Tim's help, takes matters into his own hands.



EPISODE 5 “LA HORA LOCA”

It's crazy hour: a momentous celebration brings the love, tears and foraged nettles.

There's trouble on the horizon for Vince and Reema, but an elaborate hens' night is in the way of them sorting it out. All the girls – and Austin – play along with Rosa's over-the-top party plans, even Angie, who soon reveals to Oly why she's being so obliging: it was part of a tightly negotiated peace treaty she made with Rosa. Meanwhile, the bucks is proving far less eventful, when a rattled Vince finds Santi lifting weights, shredding for the wedding. Vince belatedly realises Santi was expecting something of a party, so he wrangles together the only men in their life who would be free at the last minute – Dom and Matias. The girls' huge party, an errant g-string and some leftover jelly shots have unfortunate consequences for the next day, to Oly's horror. Angie and Reema to the rescue, for what might turn out to be the perfect day anyway. Just not for everyone.



EPISODE 6 “DATING”

Vince navigates a new world, Dom and Edith confront the past, and Rosa meets her match.

Dom, Angie and Edith are stuck on a joint mission to pack up and clear out Dom and Edith's late mother's house and belongings, with Dom doing as little of the heavy-lifting as possible. But it leads him to a long-lost family item, while Angie and Edith get to spend some time together. Meanwhile Vince tells Santi he's on the up, even if the chatty new friend of Vince's who is wandering around their house in just a t-shirt thinks otherwise; and so does an unimpressed Talia, when Vince forgets his babysitting appointment with Malik. Santi and Oly immediately make plans to try to get Vince and Reema back together. Rosa finds out in the worst possible way that her youngest son Seb has a new girlfriend, and tries to intervene to make sure no one's uncomfortable with anything. But Rosa is the one who learns more than she wanted to know. A bad day at work forces Vince to confront his real feelings – but he's devastated by a shock discovery.



EPISODE 7 “TALK IT OUT”

Regrets, we've a had a few: Reema moves on, Dom tries to help, Angie and Edith get real.

Vince is doing his best to move on from his heartbreak, even trying therapy like everyone keeps telling him too; and spending quality time with his son Malik and Talia. But neither of them, or indeed the therapist, are letting him forget what he wants to forget. Reema's feeling regrets and a move to take things to the next level with Rakim has an unexpected outcome, triggering a spot of difficult truth-telling between Oly and Reema. And Tim's closeness with his son leads Dom to try to connect with Oly by dropping in on her at work, where he proves unexpectedly useful to Shauna in a difficult meeting with a political foe. Until he doesn't. Talia helps Vince find a way forward, while Santi is feeling left on the outer by his daughter. Jacinda, meanwhile, has an all-important jiu-jitsu match against her nemesis; where Angie and Edith finally have the huge reckoning they've been avoiding since Edith came home.



EPISODE 8 "JEFFURRY"

Horrible bosses, crypto bros, big bad wolves.

Santi is stressing about his biggest art commission yet while Oly is struggling with Shauna's chaotic mood swings and impossible work demands. Meanwhile, Bowie arrives at Dom and Tim's house to collect the bitcoin password that Dom rediscovered in his mum's garage, only to discover that Tim's accidentally put it through the wash. The trio embark on a forensic mission to extract the password which could be worth tens of thousands for Bowie. When the eccentric wolf-furry, Jeffurry, commissions Santi to paint a huge mural in his weird mansion, with some pretty bad inspiration, Santi begins to doubt where his art and career choices are really taking him. But he finds inspiration from Jacinda which points the way to a better solution. Bowie's windfall leads him to the sugar highs of the crypto market, but he begins to lose himself in his new passion. When Shauna goes mental at Oly over zoom, Angie steps in and dresses Shauna down for being a bully, much to Oly's horror. But Angie's unwelcome interference has unexpected consequences.



EPISODE 9 "THE STYX VALLEY"

If wishing made it so: Santi and Oly contemplate a new world, while Angie eyes a big win.

A visit from a colleague's baby at work raises new questions for Oly, when Shauna puts an ultimatum to her. Van takes Vince to task for his shitty behaviour, making his return to work hard going until he can find a way to make it up to her. Reema's misplaced attempt at peace talks with Vince goes horribly off the rails. Upset, Reema goes to Ishani only to get an even bigger shock. At the tree protest, Angie gives Gabe some advice after he's rejected by a cute protester, which triggers an unexpected new commitment to environmentalism, much to Rosa's ire. As the threat of arrest looms, Angie makes a stand. Santi and Oly start trying to 'see what happens' but begin to find out that getting pregnant doesn't come as easily as it did the first time round, and their multiple remedies, ovulation tracking and scheduled sex are not only unsexy but not helping. And Oly discovers a secret from Shauna that could be a very big problem.



EPISODE 10 “TOILET BABY”

Life in the balance: Angie goes weird, Reema makes a decision, Oly’s life alters forever.

Angie is acting weird, and no one knows why. She’s got nothing for Oly and her major work crisis, nor for Bowie and his Saturn return. A big night and a bad white lie causes major problems for Rosa, who is forced to enlist Tim and Dom to defend her honour to Hector. Santi’s attempt to have a quiet word with Jacinda’s bully makes him realise that he might actually be the problem. Santi and Oly have to have “The Talk” with Jacinda. This bungled effort inspires Santi to try to find a new way to connect with his daughter and put his creative skills to use. As Reema learns Ishani’s moving to London, her mum has a revealing insight into Reema’s unfinished business in Sydney. An awkward run-in with Rakim leads to a compelling offer for Reema, while Vince makes plans to move out and move on. Edith is called on to help Angie navigate the dangerous seas ahead. Oly confides in Marcus, and while she thinks she’s done the right thing, it leads to life-changing consequences and an unexpected silver lining. Kind of.



THE NEW CHARACTERS

Shauna Johnson (Steph Tisdell) is the young, overachieving inner west mayor, and Oly’s new boss. She’s an independent politician, focused on social justice, the housing crisis, climate action and centrist economic policy. Tough, blunt, funny; a needy and demanding employer, Shauna is often terrifying to Oly, who Shauna sees as ambitious and hard working but quite naive in the workplace. But as Oly gets to know her better she realises Shauna’s heart is in the right place: she’s just laser-focused on making a difference to her constituents while juggling a complicated personal life.



Marcus Evans (Dylan Alcott) is Shauna’s political fixer and deputy. They’ve been working together a long time and are a close team, sharing politics and goals and career ambitions. He’s cynical, funny, quick, but dedicated to making a difference with Shauna. He’s working in the background to further her political career, maybe to get her to Canberra. He genuinely likes, and takes care of Oly. But his loyalty lies with Shauna, and their close working relationship might mask romantic feelings for Shauna on his part.



Tim (Ryan Johnson) is Dom’s soul mate, a fellow Radiohead-obsessive Dom met by chance at a Withnail and I screening in series 2, before losing contact. They reconnected by chance in the carpark of a camping store in series 3, becoming close friends. Now, with Tim living alone in the big house inherited from his late father and Dom finding himself in between homes, Tim makes Dom an offer he can’t refuse: relive your sharehouse days, but this time with money. Sun Ra marathons await.



Ishani (Nadie Kammallaweera) has raised Reema more or less on her own for the past decade or so, since divorcing her lawyer ex-husband, Hazem (Hazem Shammam), who left Sydney to work in the UK. Warm, kind, and very close to her only child, Ishani has nonetheless remained in contact with the paternalistic but kind Hazem, whose unexpected return to Sydney triggers big changes in both her life and her daughter's.

Rakim (Arlo Green) is a young police detective-in-training, introduced to Reema by her father Hazem. Calm, smart and insightful, there are instant sparks between Reema and Rakim when they meet again after a soccer comp they both play in. But she's with her longtime love Vince, and Rakim can already see that nothing about this is going to be simple.



ABOUT THE PRODUCTION

Australia's favourite family is back – and this time we jump forward two years with Oly and Santi together again and finding their feet in the world as full-grown adults while raising their adorable but challenging seven-year-old daughter Jacinda.

Season 4 of *Bump* also sees two new significant characters with Steph Tisdell (*Total Control*, *Class of 07*) as Oly's demanding boss, Shauna, and Dylan Alcott AO, 2022 Australian of the Year and one of the Australia's most successful and well recognised Paralympians, in his first acting role as Oly's work colleague Marcus.

Across three seasons, *Bump* has become renowned for its charm, warmth and humour, while also exploring contemporary social issues and concerns that impact the lives of its characters.

We see Oly's steep learning curve in her first real job, Santi's struggles to redefine his masculinity as Jacinda's primary carer, and no longer the primary breadwinner, Angie dedicating her life to campaigning for the environment which puts her at loggerheads with Paula and her expanding business empire, Dom navigating middle age in a share-house environment, and Vince and Reema's attempts to define their relationship with the realities of Vince's parental commitments.

The joie de vivre we've come to expect from *Bump* is there in spades too in season four with the television wedding of the year that follows a hen's night like no other! For those audiences of non-Latino backgrounds, La Hora Loca is about to become a

'must do' at weddings around the globe. No-one celebrates like Paula and her extended *Bump* family!

Series creator, producer and writer Kelsey Munro says part of the success of *Bump* is that the characters are fully formed. As she is writing them, to her they are very real. When embarking on a new season, she looks to locate it at a turning point in each of the central characters' lives.

Kelsey says: "This time around I really wanted to get to Oly's work. She's always been so ambitious. A central part of the character of Oly is that she's wanted to have a big career where she can make a difference in the world. I wanted to see Oly take the first career stop and see how that affects the balance in her and Santi's relationship.

"Oly's become the breadwinner and for me and Santi, that becomes a very real domestic battle. And it's one that lots of people go through, in their own straight relationships. We had a lot of fun in the writers' room talking about how Oly's work would affect her and Santi's relationship. And of course, we know that they come through the tensions and they commit forever in this series. Claudia was really keen on a wedding!"

The wedding was filmed over days in Sydney's eastern beaches area with dozens of extras, dancers and musicians. Claudia Karvan says it felt like a celebration of the entire show and the journeys of the characters across the seasons. As with any wedding there were tears of joy and lots of laughter.

"It was like a real wedding and it was really surprisingly emotional. Often those big production days feel like a bit of a grind because there's so many logistics involved, there's so many people on set to get ready and you have to get up very early. But it was just an utter delight. We had a beautiful location. We had perfect weather. And everyone was dressed up looking smart. And then we got to dance. We had musicians and dancers and instruments and great speeches. It was beautifully directed by Margie Beattie. It was heaven. And was completely sincere - everything that you see happening on camera is what everyone was really feeling at the time," Claudia says.

Nathalie Morris, who plays Oly, agrees: "It was actually just like a *Bump* reunion for two days. Everyone was there - it wasn't just like the Hernandez and the Chalmers-Davis families. Even Kelsey Munro, the creator of *Bump*, was there as an extra."

There was the emotion of the wedding ceremony, and then there was the party! La Hora Loca is a Colombian tradition pitched to the producers by Paula Garcia, who plays Rosa. It's when, later in the evening, to lift the wedding party to another level, the lights go out

a feminist gaze has always been essential to and remains so in Season 4, with Oly's desire for a career, despite becoming a mother at such a young age, central to the story, alongside Angie's quest for meaning post her marriage and relationship with Edith.

Nathalie Morris says it's been a privilege to play one character for so many years and through so many of the character's critical life moments. She says when she first read the scripts, she didn't question if Oly was a likeable character and 'got' her immediately.

"I just understood her straightaway. She's very determined and stubborn, and highly intelligent and very particular. It was really exciting to me, because I could relate," Nathalie says. "It's been so cool to play one character over this period of time. She's matured so much. I also feel like I have changed so much as well in the years that we've been shooting and it's really interesting how your own life experience informs how you view the scripts. I'm bringing that to Oly."

Carlos Sanson Jnr recalls, when auditioning for the role of Santi, how similar they were but as time has



and the room is flooded with dancers, stilt walkers, drummers and maraca players, who hand out light sabres to the guests. The party goes off!

Kelsey Munro talks about writing the wedding scenes so that they are not cliched and corny. It's a wedding very much in *Bump's* tonal world.

"I worked really hard to subvert all those TV wedding tropes. So Oly has a bung eye (she has conjunctivitis) and everything goes wrong on the morning before the wedding. Angie's made it a climate conscious wedding and everyone's a bit sad about the vegetarian food. And it all comes together beautifully," Kelsey says.

The lead up to the wedding also sees Rosa take control of the hen's party. Oly submits to Rosa's desire for hen's night with all the trappings - penis lollipops, hummer limo, sequins, big hair, lots of makeup. And a stripper. Another *Bump* fun fact - the stripper is played by Paula Garcia's (Rosa) husband.

"The hens' night that was always going to be Rosa's trump card and she was never going to not put her heart and soul into it!" Claudia laughs.

While having fun with the traditions of a wedding,

passed and the character evolved, he's enjoyed the challenge of discovering how different they actually are and taking Santi in a different direction. In season four, Santi is having something of a quarter life crisis. He's juggling being a graphic designer/artist with being a fulltime dad.

"Santi's questioning a lot about who he is and who he wants to be and what he wants to do with his life. He obviously has so much love for the family that he's created with Oly and J, but he also has this passion for art that's never been fulfilled. He's struggling with the type of artist he is and whether he can make this a career for himself and also take care of his family and provide for his family."

Santi's inner turmoil is vividly portrayed in a nightmare scene - one of Carlo's favourite and funniest scenes - in Episode 3.

Angie (Claudia Karvan) is at the heart of the environmental lens across this series. Claudia says that, with fellow producers John Edwards, Dan Edwards and Kelsey Munro, she was determined to dramatically explore the climate crisis - a subject that is on the minds of people across the world - but in a way that felt consistent with *Bump's* tone.

“There are challenges in including climate change in a television series in that you don’t want to be didactic, and you don’t want to be too earnest, but you have got to be true to it. So I think we’ve successfully made it a story line that’s funny, dramatic and interesting and slightly subversive,” Claudia says.

In the last series, in recovery from cancer, we found Angie with a new ‘no fucks’ attitude to the world. In season four, we find Angie living in a tent at the base of a tree in the inner west with a group of other protestors who are trying to save the tree from being cut down to make way for a real estate development.

“Angie is very much a truth speaker. She’s living her best life in a way. She doesn’t mince her words. She’s quite passionate and free,” Claudia says.

At a time in Australia when legislation is making certain environmental protests illegal, *Bump* doesn’t flinch from depicting Angie standing up to police. “It’s a great moment. Angie’s pretty comfortable in that situation. She knows her rights. She’s well educated.”

Angie’s eco anxiety extends to her refusing to get on a plane to Canada to see Edith, because of the carbon footprint, despite being heart-broken by the end of the relationship.

As with so many of *Bump*’s storylines, including the original premise of Oly’s cryptic pregnancy, Kelsey drew on real life stories and events in developing the tree protestor camp story.

“The idea came from news stories around the country over the last few years where trees have been knocked down for roads and development, and we thought it was a good way to crystallize Angie’s climate activism. The tree where we filmed it is like a temple – it’s the most majestic Moreton Bay fig, probably 200 years old. It really felt like we were in some sort of church with the tents set up around it and looking up at it. I also had a sense that a lot of the people involved in these activist movements tend to be older women, and I really wanted to represent that contribution to the community,” Kelsey adds.

Bump’s new characters, Shauna and Marcus, played by Steph Tisdell and Dylan Alcott, are involved in the climate activism story in the series, with Shauna, the local mayor, stepping in to save the day – or does she?

Of her two new cast mates Claudia says: Dylan Alcott is magnificent and very funny. He’s done a great job in his first acting role. And Steph Tisdell, who’s just hilarious, she plays this wonderful, volatile, Machiavellian, very powerful and very efficient boss who is very happy to put Oly in her place - at any opportunity.”

Kelsey Munro continues: “Those two are just amazing; they’re both so charismatic. Writing their characters felt like it was a little bit of a gamble as we’ve never had an office workplace in *Bump* before. We knew they were going to have to be just extraordinary actors to make sure these interlopers in the show are characters that people warm to. Steph is a genius. She’s so funny. She’s so quick and she’s so clever. And Dylan is awesome. Claudia knew he was interested in acting through his acting coach and we wondered if he wanted to do *Bump*. He loved the show and was super keen. But he wanted to make sure we weren’t doing some sort of dull, worthy thing with his character, so we had a meeting before production and worked on the script for him. He wanted to be funny and edgy - a lot of his lines were his contribution.”

Steph Tisdell says Shauna is a completely different character to any other she’s played.

“I really love playing powerful, ambitious women. But what I think what makes Shauna different from anything else I’ve played - and what makes her relatable - is the idea that a woman can be so successful and ambitious and powerful, but also be quite emotionally unstable. Shauna is a very flawed character. She is somebody who I think has all the best intentions in the world and absolutely no ability to make any of them match up together,” Steph says.

While well known and highly regarded for his hugely successful career as a tennis player and disability advocate, Dylan Alcott has always been keen to act.

“I’m so grateful to be in *Bump*. Some people work their whole life as actors and never get an opportunity like this,” Dylan says. “When I was a kid I never saw anybody like Marcus in a wheelchair on screen and it would have changed my life. That’s why I wanted to do it but also because I love sharing stories, and I want to challenge myself and have a crack. I really enjoyed the craft and working with proper actors who are awesome like Nathalie, Claudia and Carlos. It’s been awesome.”

Nathalie Morris as Oly Chalmers-Davis

Nathalie Morris was most recently seen in acclaimed filmmaker Alena Lodkina's feature film *Petrol* which premiered at the Locarno International Film Festival followed by the Melbourne International Film Festival, and she will next be seen in Josephine Stewart Te-Whiu's New Zealand feature *Te Motu*.

Nathalie graduated from New Zealand's leading Drama School, Toi Whakaari, with a Bachelor of Performing Arts Degree in 2018. Since graduating, she has appeared in the US feature film *Black Christmas* for Blumhouse Productions, US TV series *Almost Paradise*, and season 1 and 2 of Great Southern Television's *One Lane Bridge*.

He has also appeared in shows like *Mr Inbetween* and has produced short films of his own (*Hoodies*, *Nine White Moons*, *Seeing Red*) with his film collective 'Strange Attractor'.

Claudia Karvan is one of Australia's most respected, awarded and acclaimed film and television actors.



In 2023 Claudia was awarded the OAM for outstanding film industry contribution.



Angus Sampson as Dom Chalmers

Angus Sampson is regarded as one of Australia's most distinctive, diverse and successful performers with an extensive body of work spanning film, theatre and television.

Angus was the recipient of two Golden Globe nominations for *Fargo - Best Limited Series* and George Miller's *Mad Max: Fury Road - Best Motion Picture*. Angus' season of *Fargo* received the prestigious Peabody Award whilst *Mad Max: Fury Road* was also nominated for Best Picture at the Academy Awards. Feature film credits include *Next Goal Wins* for Taika Waititi, *Where the Wild Things Are* for Spike Jonze, *Legend of The Guardians* for Zach Snyder, the box office smash *Insidious* franchise for James Wan, grossing over \$800million worldwide and *100 Bloody Acres* in which Angus was AACTA nominated plus many more including internationally acclaimed crime film *The Mule* starring Hugo Weaving, that Angus helped produce, write, and direct.

Television credits include many prestige series such as Peabody Award winning *Reservation Dogs* for FX/Hulu, *Our Flag Means Death* for HBO, AMC's *The Walking Dead*, George RR Martin's *Nightflyers*, *Shut Eye* for Hulu, Stephen King's *The Stand* for CBS and *Fargo* for FX. Locally Angus' television credits include *Spirited*, *Party Tricks*, *Paper Giants: Magazine Wars* and Working Dog's *Thank God You're Here*.

Angus combines all this with ongoing work as a TVC director (having helmed over 40 commercials), copywriter and a much sought-after voice artist. Recent voice work includes *Gen:Lock* for HBO, Roku's *Doomlands* and *Jurassic World: Camp Cretaceous* for Universal Pictures. Angus also narrated the *Les Norton* series for ABC, voiced the villainous Goro in *Mortal Kombat* and multiple characters in Hulu's *Koala Man*.

Angus currently stars in the Stan original hit series *BUMP* opposite Claudia Karvan, and also the David E. Kelley smash hit drama *The Lincoln Lawyer* for Netflix.

Coming up he will be seen in a slate of projects for HBO, Hulu, Netflix, Stan and Marvel as well as George Miller's highly anticipated *Mad Max: Furiosa*.





Steph Tisdell as Shauna Johnson

Steph Tisdell is one of the brightest stars to explode on the Australian comedy scene in recent years. A luminescent presence on stage, her warmth and wit has been a hit with audiences ever since she won the Deadly Funny National Grand Final in 2014. Her award-winning shows sell out wherever she performs and she is fast becoming a ubiquitous presence on mainstream television, in 2021 she made her 'serious acting' debut in ABC's *Total Control*, she appeared on Ten's *The Stand Up* for Christchurch Benefit, a couple of times on *Hughesy We Have a Problem*, and on multiple occasions as both an interviewee and presenter on *The Project*. More recently Steph plays fan favourite "Phoebe" the scholarship scab to workaholic career woman in Amazon Primes hit show *Class of 07*.

Her famous 2019 spot on ABC TV's Oxfam Melbourne International Comedy Festival Gala went viral and as a result, in 2022 she was invited to host the Gala, one of the festival's highest status gigs. Steph has also performed barefoot stand-up on ABC TV's *Tonightly With Tom Ballard*; went on a platonic blind-date with Faustina 'Fuzzy' Agolley on ABC Life's *Hey Stranger*, where the pair bonded over being mixed race, and performed stand-up to a live audience of a couple of thousand for radio station Triple J. She's also done Stand-up on ABC *Comedy Up Late* and was a presenter on *Australia Talks*, an ABC special broadcast in 2019.

On stage, critics have showered her with a galaxy-worth of four and five star reviews and hail her as being "warmly funny, immediately relatable, fast on her feet" (Time Out) and "riotous, audacious and incredibly smart" (Arts Hub). "Like Hannah Gadsby, she clearly recognises that true vulnerability is a powerful place to excavate comedy material and her authenticity on stage is remarkable," said The Adelaide Review of her 2020 show *Baby Beryl*.

Her debut solo show, *Identity Steft*, won the weekly award for best emerging talent at the 2018 Adelaide Fringe and was nominated for the illustrious Best Newcomer Award at the Melbourne International Comedy Festival. Her

second show, *The Pyramid*, took out the 2019 Melbourne International Comedy Festival John Pinder Award.

As a proud Indigenous woman, Steph was also a part of the Aboriginal All Stars line-up, who sold out most nights during their festival run at the notoriously competitive Edinburgh Fringe, before heading to London's Soho Theatre. It's not just Australian critics impressed that she "never fails to keep the audience laughing" (The Wee Review). Major daily newspaper The Scotsman described her set as being "a phenomenal twenty minutes" and said "Steph Tisdell is a glorious powerhouse of First Nation funny". Broadway World's enamoured reviewer admitted "it was a bit of a fangirl moment seeing Tisdell gig live".

Steph has also traversed Australia with the Comedy Festival's Roadshow and when she was honing her craft at the beginning of her career in the UK, was a semi-finalist in comedy competition So You Think You're Funny and a finalist in Scotland's Yes Bar New Comedian contest.

Before discovering her gift for comedy, Steph's interest in politics and advocacy saw her enrolling in law and this formidable intelligence and sense of social justice now permeates her material. As a Yidinji woman she loves to share her experiences and what her culture means to her, and she hopes that her visibility will empower other Aboriginal artists to come forward and showcase why they're the funniest race in the world. "Aware of her platform, she uses it in a way that both educates and entertains her audience on the nuances of Aboriginal life – something that many Australians would benefit from" (Arts Hub).

Steph's material covers plenty of other ground, as well. She talks with endearing candour about her issues with mental health and body image, revels in oddball observations (have you ever considered what animals would look like with eyebrows?) and peppers her sets with some ribald remarks. Whatever the topic, with a wit as sparkly as the mischievous glint in her eyes, Steph Tisdell is indeed "a joy to watch" (Glam Adelaide).



Dylan Alcott as Marcus

2022 Australian of the Year, Dylan Alcott AO, is one of the Australia's most successful and well recognised Paralympians, media personalities and disability advocates. In 2021 he became the only male in any form of tennis to win the 'Golden Slam', winning the Australian, French, Wimbledon and US Open Championships, and he is a Paralympic Gold Medallist in two different sports.

Since retiring from professional tennis Dylan has not slowed down in any way and his drive is stronger than ever when he comes to his purpose and mission: to change perceptions so people with disability can live the lives they deserve to live. In 2017, Dylan launched the Dylan Alcott Foundation, providing grants, scholarships and mentoring to young Australians with disability to eliminate the barriers of entry to get involved in sports, study, training, employment and business ownership. In the same year, he co-founded consultancy firm Get Skilled Access with a purpose to create a new generation of disability inclusion that is equitable for all. More recently, he co-founded and launched The Field Jobs - a dedicated platform to establish pathways between job seekers with a Disability and employers of all kind in the marketplace.

In 2019, Dylan won the TV Week Logie Graham Kennedy Award for Most Popular New Talent for his role in the broadcast of the Invictus Games on the ABC.

Dylan was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) in 2022 for distinguished service to Paralympic sport, particularly to tennis, and as a role model for people with disability, and to the community through a range of organisations.

Christian Byers as Bowie Chalmers-Davis

Christian Byers first attracted international attention starring as Spark in *December Boys* alongside Daniel Radcliffe.

At 12, he was nominated for the AFI Young Actor Award for his performance as Ashmol in *Opal Dream*. Christian's other film credits include *Tim in The Tree*, Jacob in *Hey Hey It's Esther Blueberger* and Brislee in Miro's Billbrough's *Being Venice*. His short film credits include Sofya Gollan's *Gimpsey*, *Kettle*, *Purple Flowers*, *Shiloh*, *Safety Driver*, *Snare* and *Laura*, which he also co-wrote. He can next be seen in upcoming horror film *The Moogai*.

Christian's television credits include Reece in *Ready for This* and Woody in *Puberty Blues: Series 2*. He has also featured as Elmo in *Panic at Rock Island*, James Cunneen in *Blood Brothers*, and as Jase Falconer in *Underbelly: Badness*. Christian starred as Australian music legend Stevie Wright in the ABC miniseries *Friday on My Mind*. He also made appearances in ABC's *Newton's Law*, *Riot* and *True Story with Hamish and Andy*.

Christian can most recently be seen in the STAN original *Bump* and its spin-off series *Year Of*. He can also be seen in documentary-fiction hybrid *Death of an Undertaker*, set in a real funeral home in Sydney's Inner West, which he wrote, directed, and starred in.

Ava Cannon as Jacinda

With her standout performance playing the role of Jacinda in the highly successful TV series *Bump*, it's evident that Ava has a bright future in the entertainment industry.

At a young age, Ava developed a love for the craft and quickly made her mark in the advertising world, landing campaigns with major brands. Ava has also starred in a variety of short films with the most recently playing Asha in *Bernice*.

Born in Los Angeles, Ava is of mixed heritage. Her talents extend beyond acting, as she's a Ju Ju-jitsu champion, a singer, and loves to dance. She also has an unusual passion for sharks.

Ioane Sa'ula as Vince Ingram

Ioane Sa'ula is a young, emerging actor who was born and raised in Griffith NSW. Ioane found a passion for performing and acting late in his high schooling years.

In just a short period of his career, Ioane made his debut to Australian television in his role as Vince in Stan's popular series *Bump* and an appearance in Channel Nine's *Doctor Doctor series 5* whilst still in year 12. He has also featured in his first short film *Shark* for Blue Tongue Films. He has currently wrapped on filming Nine Network's series three of *Bump* in Sydney and is currently filming on the feature film *The Deb* directed by Rebel Wilson.

Paula Garcia as Rosa Hernandez

Colombian born Paula made her debut on Australian screens in 2020 as the effervescent and headstrong Rosa Hernandez, in the Stan Original series *Bump*. Paula went on to be cast in *13 Lives* directed by Ron Howard (2022) and appears in the new Foxtel drama *The Twelve* as Carla (2022).

At age 20, Paula moved from Colombia to Paris where she studied acting and lived for fifteen years. Paula's career began in French cinema as a cast member of the French box office hit *Les Petits Mouchoirs* in 2010.

As a global citizen, influenced by many cultures, Paula is an eclectic performer fluent in four languages.

Safia Arain as Reema

Safia is an Australian actor who was born in England but grew up in Sydney. Both sets of her grandparents migrated to Australia from Pakistan in the 1970's. Throughout her schooling Safia was involved in theatre and realised her passion for acting. She went on to graduate from Screenwise's Diploma of Screen Acting in 2019, where she fine-tuned her technique for screen performance.

Since graduating, Safia has appeared as a series regular in all 4 seasons of the Stan Original series *Bump*, as well as roles in the film *The Appleton Ladies' Potato Race* and *The Last King of the Cross* (Paramount+), *Underbelly: Vanishing Act* (Stan/Nine), *Pieces of Her* (Netflix) and *Amazing Grace* (Nine Network).

Safia is strongly influenced by her heritage, her Muslim faith and the power of the arts and storytelling to heal and transform.

Henrietta Amevor as Talia

Henrietta Enyonam Amevor is an Australian based Ghanaian actor who works across both stage and screen.

For the Sydney Theatre Company Henrietta starred as Chantel Ocean in their production *Hubris & Humiliation*, directed by Dean Bryant and was the understudy for the role of Benetha in *A Raisin In The Sun*, directed by Wesley Enoch.

Henrietta is currently starring in *Is God Is*, a co-production between the Melbourne Theatre Company and the Sydney Theatre Company.

Henrietta's professional stage debut was in Outhouse Theatre's *The Rolling Stone*, directed by Adam Cook. Henrietta's other theatre credits include Bomtom's *The House at Boundary Road* Liverpool, for director Jessica Arthur, and the role of Suzanne in *Claudiel*, directed by Christabel Sved for Tinderbox Productions.

Henrietta was also part of the community engagement team for Darlinghurst Theatre Company's *7 Methods of Killing Kylie Jenner*, directed by Shari Sebbens and Zindzi Okenyo, and was Creative Associate on Greendoor Theatre Company's *Chewing Gum Dreams*, directed by Bernadette Fam.

Claudia Di Giusti as Bernardita

Claudia De Giusti was born in San Nicolas, Argentina and studied theatre in Buenos Aires whilst completing her teaching degree. During the mid-70s, the political and economic situation in Argentina forced Claudia to move to Sydney with her husband and 2 children, where she began working in one of Australia's biggest Latin community newspapers, first as a typist and then as a reporter. Many of her newspaper assignments gave her entry into the Latin Arts community and she began to gravitate towards Sydney's Latin theatre movement in the 80s, reigniting her passion for acting.

Miguel Andrade as Alejandro

Miguel Andrade was born in Santiago, Chile and arrived in Australia in 1971 where he worked first in the shipping and coal mining industry before joining the Australian Federal Police force in 1996.

A dedicated humanitarian, Miguel spent much of the 1980's teaching English to newly arrived migrants. Miguel now works predominantly as a volunteer tutor, for both The Smith Family and at TAFE.

Anita Hegh as Edith

Anita Hegh is an award-winning performer whose credits include theatre, film and television roles.

A graduate of NIDA, Anita has worked extensively within the theatre industry with selected credits including *A Room of One's Own*, *The Wild Duck*, *Twelfth Night* and *The Seagull* (Belvoir). Other theatre credits include *A Cheery Soul*, *Harp in the South* and *The Resistible Ride of Arturo Ui* which saw her receive the 2018 Helpmann award for Best Female in a Supporting Role, *The Fatherland Cloud Nine* (STC). Further credits include *The Crucible*, and *Top Girls* for Melbourne Theatre Company.

On screen, Anita has currently been working on Series 3 of *Total Control*. She has also recently appeared in *Upright* (series 2) and *Irreverent*. Alex Sanson as Gabriel Hernandez

Alex was a notable and accomplished drama student in high school, his Shakespeare monologue was selected as one of the top performances in the state. Alex is the youngest brother in the Australian acting Sanson family and studied at NIDA (National Institute of Dramatic Art).

Matilda Ridgway as Ariel

Matilda is an award-winning actor, director, theatre maker and arts educator.

Her film and television credits include, *Disclosure*, which was nominated for Best Indie Film at the 2021 AACTA Awards and *Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow* for which she received an Award for Best Lead Performance by an Actor/Actress at FlickerFest 2018. Other credits include Cannes Palm D'Or nominee film *The Guests, 1919*, *Book Week*, *June Again*, *Hiding* (ABC) and *Fam Time* (7 Network).

Ryan Johnson as Tim

Since graduating from the Queensland University of Technology (QUT) in 1999, Ryan has built an extensive career in film, television, and theatre. He is well-known to viewers as "Matt Knight" in Channel Nine's *Doctor Doctor* having starred in all five series, and most recently played the lead role in Channel Sevens *The Claremont Murders* as Bradley Robert Edwards.

Dan Edwards is a television executive with two decades of industry experience. In 2016 Dan joined forces with his father John Edwards and Roadshow Films to form Roadshow Rough Diamond.

Their productions include last year's *Les Norton* for the ABC, *Australian Gangster* for the Seven Network and *Romper Stomper*, which broke viewing records for Australian SVOD service Stan, winning two Logie awards. *Les Norton*, *Australian Gangster* and *Romper Stomper* were co-created and produced by Dan.

Prior to launching Roadshow Rough Diamond, Dan was Vice President (ANZ/Japan) at ITV Studios Global Entertainment. Also, in the Asian market, Dan spearheaded the 2009 set up of Endemol Worldwide Distribution's office in Hong Kong following the merger with Southern Star where Dan was a sales director for seven years across Canada, Middle East, Africa, Greece and Asia. He has created and developed fifteen projects in concert with Australian and international broadcasters.

Claudia Karvan OAM - Producer

Claudia Karvan is highly regarded as a producer as well as being recognised as one of Australia's most respected and

renewed for four seasons and sold to international markets including the BBC (UK), the CW (US) and HBO Latin America. It was nominated for three Logie Awards including Outstanding Drama Series at the 2022 Logies. Kelsey was shortlisted in the NSW Premier's Literary Awards 2022 for scriptwriting, for her Season 1 *Bump* finale 'Matrescence'. As a journalist she was a news reporter covering state politics and education policy for the Sydney Morning Herald, where she was also a senior editor; and worked as a features writer for The Guardian and Rolling Stone, among others. She lives in Sydney with her husband and kids.

Nick Coyle - Writer (Ep 2 & 6)

Nick Coyle is a writer, director and performer renowned for his plays and one-man shows. His regular seasons at Melbourne Comedy Festival and Edinburgh Fringe Festival have created a cult-like following for his work.

Likewise, for his episode on the sequel, *Mystery Road: Origin*, Timothy received an AACTA Award nomination for Best Screenplay in Television.

Shanti wrote the eco-horror feature *Carnifex* for Dancing Road Productions, which premiered at the 2022 Adelaide Film Festival. Her previous credits include *Trip For Biscuits*, *Nowhere Boys*, *You're Skitting Me*, *SLIDE*, *Conspiracy 365*, and *Dance Academy*. *Nowhere Boys* won the AACTA Award for Best Children's Series and the LOGIE Award for Best Children's Series, while *Trip for Biscuits* was nominated for a SPA Award for Best Children's Television Productions.

Geoff was fortunate to be the lead director of *Bump* Series 1. Directing the very first episode of this wonderful series is the highlight of his career. He loves *Bump* and is deeply connected to the show and its cast and crew.

Margie Beattie - Director Block 2 (Ep 5, 6 & 7)

Margie Beattie is one of the Australian film and television industry's most experienced professionals with three decades of expertise working on some of its most iconic and critically acclaimed productions, both local and

international. Her career began in Brisbane within the Brisbane Independent Film Makers Association which sparked her creative passion. Rebecca O'Brien is an award-winning filmmaker, a graduate of AFTRS, an AACTA and ADG nominee and a recipient of Screen Australia's talent escalator program. As a teen growing up in Christchurch, New Zealand, Rebecca bought a video camera and started documenting her world. Keen to pursue her passion for storytelling she ventured to Australia to study at AFTRS.

Now, her successful career to date includes working for Roadshow Rough Diamond, Aquarius Films, ABC TV, NITV, Southern Star, and NBC Universal creating a wide variety of scripted and unscripted projects. These include the award-winning, Screen NSW-funded short film, *The Great Dark*, producing the historic 50th-anniversary episodes of *Play School*, as well as shadowing director Michael Rymer on the Emmy-award winning drama *Battlestar Galactica* (SyFy) in Vancouver. It proved to be a transformative experience and upon her return, Rebecca seized the film rights to Craig Silvey's acclaimed book, *Jasper Jones*, which she executive produced.

More recently Rebecca's short film, *The Gathering*, was granted funding by Screen NSW and Epic Games as part of the Unreal Engine short film fund. In 2019, Rebecca became the recipient of the ADG shadow directing program where she directed her first episode of television drama for Aquarius Films / Netflix production, *The Unlisted* earning her a nomination for the 2020 ADG Awards for Best Direction. Her goal is to keep work as a drama director, both here in Australia and Internationally.



Ismail Khan - Shadow Director (Ep 4)

Izzy Khan is a Sydney based screenwriter and director with Wailwan and Pakistani heritage, born and raised in south-west Sydney. A graduate of AFTRS, Izzy's masters film *Sunnies* won the Capa Prize for best fictional short in Asia-Pacific and had its world premiere at Sydney Film Festival 2021, followed by screenings at academy accredited festivals Short Shorts Film Festival in Tokyo, Flickerfest and LA Shorts. *Sunnies* also won the Australian Short Film Today Audience Award and the Nicholas Baudin Prize for Best Short Film at the 24th Festival des Antipodes in Saint Tropez.
