Beginning **December 2**, the Museum will honor holidays and traditions from around the world with the debut of **Celebrations in Light**. Each week in December will feature a different holiday – Las Posadas, Hanukkah, Christmas or Kwanza – and include themed story time, art projects, special workshops, guest artists and more for families to enjoy. Whether it's participating in familiar traditions or discovering a different culture, elves of all ages are guaranteed to get into the spirit of the season with the Museum's hands-on, interactive holiday programming!

# Magic Tree House® exhibit-themed daily programming will continue in conjunction with Celebration in Lights. All programs are included with admission unless otherwise noted.

# **Celebrations in Light: Matsiko World Open Choir**

# Friday, December 2 at 2 p.m.

In this festive kick-off to the month-long Celebrations in Light activities, 18 children from Peru, Liberia and India will perform at the Museum as part of the Matsiko World Orphan Choir. Sharing a message of hope for the world's 600 million orphaned and at-risk children, Matsiko will perform energetic and dynamic cultural dances in full, vibrant costumes while singing original songs.

# **Celebrations in Light: Las Posadas**

# Saturday, December 3 – Friday, December 9

A 9-day Latin religious celebration, Las Posadas is commonly observed in Mexico and by Mexican-Americans in the Southwest United States. Families celebrate the holiday in the evenings by participating nightly in Christmas processions that re-create the Holy Pilgrimage of Mary, Joseph and baby Jesus during their journey to Bethlehem.

# **Special Story Time**

Weekdays at 1 p.m., Saturdays at 12 p.m. and Sundays at 2 p.m.

- "Un, Dos, Tres, Posada!" by Virginia Kroll
  In this special story about Las Posadas, a young girl explains each step of the celebration process –
  from putting out Poinsettias to hanging the piñata as she counts to 10 in English and Spanish.
  Sprinkled with Spanish vocabulary and filled with lively illustrations, this interactive reading event
  will allow kids to follow along by counting the different items mentioned.
- "The Night Of Los Posadas" by Tomie de Paola In this luminous story from Tomie de Paola's, Sister Angie, who is always in charge of the celebration, has to stay home with the flu, while Lupe and Roberto, who are to play Mary and Joseph, get caught in a snowstorm. Just when they think the celebration is ruined, an unknown man and a woman arrive to take their place in the procession, and then mysteriously disappear at the end before they can be thanked. That night a Christian miracle is witnessed, for when Sister Angie goes to the

cathedral and kneels before the statue of Mary and Joseph, wet footprints from the snow lead up to the statue.

## **Special Music and Movement**

Weekdays at 2 p.m. and weekends at 3 p.m.

Guests will join the Imaginators for a lively dance with their version of the children's musical bottle cap instrument the *Corcholatas*.

## Art Studio Projects

*Weekdays from 10 a.m. –3:30 p.m. and weekends from 11 a.m. –4 p.m.* Children will create their own shining star – to represent the one that shined over the stable in Bethlehem when baby Jesus was born – or construct a homemade rosary to honor Mary, the Mother of God and learn how it relates to Las Posadas.

# Build It Lab

Weekdays from 10:30 a.m. –3:30 p.m. and weekends from 11 a.m. –4 p.m. Families will celebrate Las Posadas by building a manger for baby Jesus, which Mary and Joseph found in a stable at the end of their pilgrimage.

## Special Las Posadas Workshop

Thursday, December 8 at 11 a.m.

During this special workshop, guests will create a lantern to light the way in the dark by drilling holes in a coffee can and adding LED lights. Each child will also get to personalize their lantern by adding paint and decorations. Due to limited space available (max of 10 children and 10 adults), registration should be completed in advance. The price to attend the workshop is \$3 and is not included in regular Museum admission.

## **Celebrations in Light: Hanukkah**

## Saturday, December 10 – Friday, December 16

Known as the "Festival of Lights," this eight-day Jewish holiday celebrates the fundamental rights of religious freedom. Hanukkah lasts for eight days in December, when the days are shortest and nights are darkest, and is observed by lighting one candle of the nine-branched Menorah each night.

Sunday, December 11 at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m.

Guests can join Rabbi Glusman, a leader of the Marcus Jewish Community Center of Atlanta, for a fun Hanukkah performance featuring festive songs and stories.

# **Special Story Time**

Weekdays at 1 p.m., Saturdays at 12 p.m. and Sundays at 2 p.m.

- "Light the Candles: A Hanukkah Lift the Flap Book" by Joan Holub In this spirited story time, kids will enjoy all the fun happenings during Hanukkah – lighting the Menorah candles, opening presents, eating latkes and chocolates, playing the Dreidel game and more. With each turn of the page, another candle will be "lit," as a new element of the holiday is depicted.
- "Light the Menorah" by Jannie Ho Children will celebrate the eight days of Hanukkah with this interactive book that teaches the story of Macabees, how to making potato latkes and how to play Dreidal.

*Weekdays at 2 p.m. and weekends at 3 p.m.* Kids will learn the Hanukkah Candle Dance and the Hora with the Museum's fun Imaginators.

Families will create candle holders using images of symbolic Hanukkah traditions or have the chance to design beautiful stained glass window decorations, which will include a picture of a Menorah.

*Weekdays from 10:30 a.m. –3:30 p.m. and weekends from 11 a.m. –4 p.m.* Children will break out their tools and build a mini-Menorah using recycled material.

# Special Hanukah Workshop

Thursday, December 15 at 11 a.m.

In this special workshop, kids will get the chance to build a Menorah with lights and decorations to last all eight nights of the holiday. Due to limited space available (max of 10 children and 10 adults), registration should be completed in advance. The price to attend the workshop is \$3 and is not included in regular Museum admission.

Author and illustrator Karen Katz's wonderful series of picture books for the very young offer a simple and fun way to get familiar with the traditions of holiday celebrations from different cultures. • "K is for Kwanzaa : A Kwanzaa Alphabet Book" by Juwanda & Wilson-Max, Ken Ford A great educational tool for teaching young children all about the Kwanzaa holiday, this fun story time will also help kids learn the alphabet in a memorable way.
