Letter from the Pastor

Rev. Bryan L. Carter Senior Pastor

As a Pastor, my heart for couples that were cohabitating in our church and our community, led me to begin exploring options in terms of how to deal with this ever growing situation. I began to pray and seek God about how we can best address this issue. Ultimately, through research, prayer, and discovery, God allowed us to challenge couples that live together to get married. It was in that context which led me to preach an entire series on the subject matter; however, I discovered that would be too heavy or weighty. So, I designed one message, built around helping couples that were living together understand the Biblical implications of this matter and to help stem the tide that our culture promotes so avidly.

The message I preached on that Sunday in September 2009, was entitled, "Let's Just Live Together" (Heb. 14:3). In that message, my main goal was to help people get a clear picture of the whole issue of cohabitation from a Biblical perspective. Many cohabitating couples that may desire to be married, don't do so for financial reasons or they procrastinate which leads to a greater level of uncertainty. Therefore, goal of the message was to remove any excuses...remove any barriers that they may be facing. At the conclusion of the message, I invited cohabitating couples that wanted to make this commitment, to meet with me after church to assist them in beginning the process of having them married in less than 30 days. It's with that in mind we began this journey of inviting couples to become wed.

As a part of the invitation to begin the journey I made it a point to remove any barriers that migh have existed that would prohibit couples from taking part in this opportunity to live as husband and wife. The barriers eliminated and thus paid for by the church were:

- Bridal Gown
- Grooms Tux
- Bouquet
- Boutoniere
- Bride and Groom Rings
- Cakes

- Video of Ceremony
- Photography
- Make up
- Hair Stylist
- Jewlery
- Invitations

On that Sunday afternoon we had 30 couples that actually expressed interest. When everything was said and done, ultimately we ended up with 18 couples that decided to marry. Some have asked; "What happened to the other 12?" Well, we know that marriage counseling is designed to help couples make the right decision for their future, and some of those made the decision not to get married once they began going through the counseling. Others decided they still needed more time to work through other issues before making a lifelong commitment.

The goal of this program is that it gives the church a Biblically healthy way to deal with this epidemic that the churches are facing. We were able to balance the love of God with the standards of God, and it worked extremely well for us. I encourage you as a Pastor and a church leader to consider implementing this in your own church. The Bible is a redemptive book, and it talks about redemption at the heart of scripture. We were able to witness these couples become redeemed through this process. Of those 18 couples, five of them joined our church. Helping these couples also led many of them to become highly involved in the life of our church. We are so grateful for the tremendous connection between these new families and the church.

Statistical Data

The number of opposite-sex couples who live together, less than a million 30 years, hit 6.4 million in 2007, show federal data released Monday. Cohabiting couples now make up almost 10% of all opposite-sex U.S. couples, married and unmarried.

WASHINGTON (AFP) – Couples living together before marrying have a higher chance of getting divorced than those who wait until they were engaged or married, according to research out Tuesday in the Journal of Family Psychology.

The study, carried out by researchers from the University of Denver, also found that couples who lived together before marrying reported lower marriage satisfaction.

"We think that some couples who move in together without a clear commitment to marriage may wind up sliding into marriage partly because they are cohabiting," said senior researcher and study coauthor Galena Rhoades.

"It seems wise to talk about commitment and what living together might mean for the future of the relationship before moving in together, especially

because cohabiting likely makes it harder to break up compared to dating," said another researcher, Scott Stanley.


More than 70 percent of couples in the United States live together before marrying, according to the article.

Yet the researchers "have found evidence that cohabiting before engagement, even only with one's future spouse, is associated with lower marital quality and higher divorce potential," the article read. In a separate study that appeared in the Journal of Family Issues, the researchers studied the reasons why couples chose to live together.

The most common answer was because they wanted to spend more time together, followed by convenience, and followed by testing the relationship. Earlier research suggested that people cohabited before marrying because they wanted to test their relationship.

"Cohabiting to test a relationship turns out to be associated with the most problems in relationships," said Rhoades.

Planning Checklist

- PASTOR SHARES HIS VISION
- PASTOR APPOINTS CHURCH WEDDING COORDINATOR
- CHURCH WEDDING COORDINATOR
 - **DESCRIPTION:** This person(s) will act is the liaison between the church and couples.
 - Schedule an informal meeting with interested couples
 - *Provide wedding information/schedule to the couples*
 - Answer any questions and/or concerns
 - Access each couples needs
 - Coordinate with wedding team and business partners
 - Establish budget for each wedding component The budget will be based on the amount of funds the church is willing to invest and/or the cost it would take to provide each couple with, but not limited to, the following items:
 - o Bridal Gown & Grooms Tux
 - Bouquet & Boutonniere
 - Rings (Bride & Groom)
 - Ceremony Video (1 per couple)
 - o Ceremony Photos
 - o Invitations
- COUNSELING BEGIN W/COUPLES (MARRIAGE LICENSE WAVIER)

DESCRIPTION: The person(s) will make sure that all couples are enrolled in a marriage

counseling program to meet requirement for the State waiver. (See appendix)

- ESTABLISH WEDDING TEAM
 - WEDDING COORDINATORS (PREFERABLY @ NO COST)

DESCRIPTION: This team will aid in the planning of the wedding & reception.

- Provide décor inventory to be used for the wedding ceremony
 - Using the décor inventory of the Business Owners the cost to provide desired aesthetics is limited and/or reduced.
- Provide directives for the ceremony and reception (if applicable).
- FLORAL DESIGNERS (PREFERABLY @ NO COST)
 - **DECRIPTION:** This team will aid in the floral design and arrangements for the wedding & reception.
 - Design floral bouquets and boutonnieres for the couples.
 - Using the décor inventory of the Business Owners the cost to provide desired aesthetics is limited and/or reduced also in the category.

• PHOTOGRAPHERS (PREFERABLY @ NO COST)

DESCRIPTION: This team will provide photography for the wedding & reception.

- Assign photographers to specific duties (One photographer per location)
 - Brides entrance
 - Bride and Groom w/Pastor
 - o Bride & Groom Only
 - Reception Photo (Cake/Family Photo)
- Ask Photographers to provide all photos on a disc and give disc to the church
- Church will provide all photos on a website for access for all couple to view
- VIDEOGRAPHERS (PREFERABLY @ NO COST)

DESCRIPTION: This team records the ceremony and reception.

- Edit footage and provide a copy of the finished recording to the church.
 - Each couple will receive (1) one copy of the video
- MAKE-UP ARTIST (PREFERABLY @ NO COST)
 DESCRIPTION: Assist each bride with wedding day look at bride's request.
- HAIR STYLIST
 DESCRIPTION: Assist each bride with wedding day look at bride's request.
- MARKETING (WEDDING INVITATIONS/PROGRAMS)
 - **DESCRIPTION:** Design and provide each couple with invitations to be given to invited guest. Design program to be distributed during the ceremony. We (The Concord Church) was able to provide this service because we have inhouse printing capabilities.
- CATERER (*RECEPTION* ~ *IF APPLICABLE*)
- BAKERY (*RECEPTION* ~ *IF APPLICABLE*)
- EXPLORE BUSINESS PARTNERSHIPS
 - BRIDAL SHOPS (RENTAL)
 - **DESCRIPTION:** Partner with a local bridal shop that will allow the brides to rent their bridal gowns for one (1) set rate. This rate will be a line item for sponsored couples.

• TUXEDO SHOPS (RENTAL)

DESCRIPTION: Partner with a local tuxedo shop will allow the groom to rent their tuxedo attire for one (1) set rate. This rate will be a line item for sponsored couples.

o FLORIST

DESCRIPTION: This partnership will allow the wedding coordinators and event planners to purchase floral at wholesale cost (if applicable)

Planning Checklist Cont.

• LOCAL JEWELER

DESCRIPTION: This partnership will allow the wedding coordinators and event planners to purchase wedding bands at a reduced rate. Keep in mind that some couples could already have their rings and this information will be disclosed during the couples assessment.

• CHURCH PARTICIPATION

o SPONSORSHIP

DESCRIPTION: To encourage the membership to be a part of the Pastor's vision by inviting them to sponsor a couple. Please refer to our (The Concord Church) sample sponsor worship guide insert.

• VOLUNTEERS

PRAYER MINISTRY

DESCRIPTION: Serve as Prayer Warriors for couples and their commitment to honor God in their new obedience to Him.

WOMENS MINISTRY (BRIDAL ASSISTANTS)

DESCRIPTION: This woman serves her assigned bride beginning the week leading up to the ceremony; contacting her to assist with any pre-wedding day arrangements. She will assist the bride at wedding rehearsal and the day of the wedding (i.e. getting dressed, presentation of bouquet, etc.)

- MENS MINISTRY (GROOM ASSISTANTS)
 DESCRIPTION: This man serves his assigned groom beginning the week leading up to the ceremony; praying with him and assisting as needed.
- DEACON/ELDERS (COMMUNION ~ IF APPLICABLE)
 - SETUP
 DESCRIPTION: Church membership will assist wedding coordinators as needed to prepare for the wedding ceremony and reception (if applicable)

CLEANUP

DESCRIPTION: Church membership will assist wedding coordinators as needed to post wedding ceremony and reception (if applicable)







And that culminated in a challenge: If you aren't honoring God by your behavior, move out. And if you want to get married, get married the church will pay for it all, the gowns, tuxedos, rings, even the wedding cakes.

"I told them, 'We've already made arrangements, and we'll have you married in 30 days,'" Carter said of that Sunday morning. "I said, 'Meet me at the church at 3 o'clock and we'll provide more details."

"We ended up having about 30 couples. We interviewed and assessed each one, we did eight hours of counseling. The goal was to get people awakened, to see if they were really that compatible. And we ended up with 18 couples."

"We were planning to get married next August," Adams said before the ceremonies, "and we still plan to have something for families and friends. But the economy caused a situation for us to move in together.

As the couple left church and crossed the parking lot, each had the same question: 'Did you hear the sermon?" figncee said. We're



Church teachings lead 18 couples to tie the knot in joint ceremony

Down the long aisle at Concord Church, set off this Sunday by a soft, white border draped from pew to pew, the bride walked with stately deliberation, the crowd's applause ringing out as she glided toward her groom.
