This series is about us. And it's about the Australian health system. It's both. It's a snapshot of what happens over a single day in our unique health service, stretched from one end of the continent to the other. How healthy is our health system? What are the challenges of distance, of recurring national problems (like obesity, melanoma, substance abuse and mental health)? These are the human stories (patients and staff), the character, jeopardy, drama and heart. This series is about us and our relationships; about joy, fear, uncertainty and hope.



As individuals our relationship with the health system begins when we are no more than the blue line on the pregnancy test and ends when we are a flat line on the ECG. By looking closely at our health system we also put ourselves under the microscope. How do we live? What do we value? What is the quality of our lives? What are our priorities? How do we want to live and die?

It is also about the future. With advances in medicine, the escalating costs of sophisticated or ongoing treatment, and our ever-aging population – how will we as a nation face the challenges ahead?

This landmark series will confront and surprise the audience with the real stories of what makes up Australia's massive system of care and service, which we often take for granted. What are the inequities between public and private systems, between east and west, between country and city? What specific challenges do we face with a system that needs to cater for everything from the most remote indigenous community to the busiest city hospital?

What human dramas unfold, every day, within it and what do they tell us about ourselves? What do they tell us about modern Australia? What do we (staff and patients) feel about our health care system? What does it mean to us collectively, as well as individually? What do we discover when we dissect the health system as a whole – slicing through its layers, its wonder, its horror, its enormity, all on one selected, ordinary day?

Does gender equality free women from family

violence? Campaigner Rosie Batty and reporter Sally Sara journey to gender equality heartland, Sweden, to find out. What they discover will surprise...

Progressive Sweden has long been a world leader in equality between the sexes.

But while Swedish women enjoy more rights and opportunities than most, there is a dark and shameful side to this story.

Despite all the progress, Sweden has among the highest levels of family violence in Europe. Nearly half of all women in Sweden will face physical or sexual violence by men, usually their current or former partner.

"It's difficult to realise that in the beauty of these places there is also the real ugliness of the worst of human behaviour" - Rosie Batty, family violence campaigner and 2015 Australian of the Year.

To try to understand this paradox - why violence pervades this bastion of gender equality - Foreign Correspondent invited Rosie Batty to Sweden. It was her first big overseas trip since her son Luke was murdered by his father at cricket practice barely two years ago.

"In some ways it seems a long time ago; other times it just seems like yesterday" – Rosie Batty

For Rosie, this trip is no holiday. From the capital Stockholm to the remote far north where temperatures sink to minus 29, she is trying to understand what lies behind family violence in Sweden.

Foreign Correspondent films Rosie meeting fellow activists – men as well as women - politicians and victims. And for the first time since Luke's murder, she comes face to face with a perpetrator.

"I don't feel in the least bit intimidated. After the journey I've had with Luke's father I don't think I could ever be intimidated in the same way again" - Rosie Batty to Sally Sara on their way to meet an offender named Emanuel.

Remarkably, Rosie finds some rapport with Emanuel, as she and Sally Sara get a step closer to understanding why gender equality is just one part of the solution to family violence.

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My Self Harm Nightmare

Highlighting the soaring rates of eating disorders and self harm among young people, My Self Harm Nightmare explores the internet... where they go to share their secrets. Thousands of blogs and websites have emerged which encourage users to compete in weight loss and glorify self harm. They include images of emaciated bodies alongside tips on how to make yourself vomit and hide scars. In this intense, intimate and revealing film we hear from teenagers who've been sucked into this chilling online world. Through insightful and unflinching testimonies we hear how they became trapped in a cycle of self-hatred and self-punishment, doing unimaginable damage to their bodies. Some are taking the painful steps to recovery. Others are still compulsively logging-on. We also hear from the family of 13-year-old girl who killed herself after becoming involved with pro-self harm websites.

Kev Carmody: Songman

Premiere

Kev Carmody: Songman is part of a new four-part biographical series, CREATORS, featuring four highly talented Australian artists from the fields of theatre, music, art and dance, who have each made significant contributions to the cultural life of this country.

Kev Carmody: Songman (Tuesday 15 March) captures the unusual creative process of one of Australia's most celebrated songwriters as he sets about his latest musical adventure. Kev Carmody, nicknamed Australia's black Bob Dylan, co-wrote "From Little Things Big Things Grow" - the most famous Aboriginal anthem ever written. This tribute features interviews with Paul Kelly, Missy Higgins and Dan Sultan.

Michelle's Story (Tuesday 22 March) follows the dramatic events in the life of talented Australian dancer, Michelle Ryan, who danced for Meryl Tankard's Australian Dance Theatre, famed for its ground-breaking choreography. Michelle relates the heart-wrenching story of her shock MS diagnosis, its tragic fallout and the slow path to rehabilitation as she works with disabled dancers as Artistic Director of Adelaide's Restless Dance Theatre. Intimate access to Michelle is captured by the acclaimed choreographer Meryl Tankard, making her directorial debut on the ABC.

Patricia Piccinini: A Dark Fairytale (Tuesday 29 March) is a portrait of worldrenowned Australian artist Patricia Piccinini - famous for creating bizarre mutant creatures. The film examines her roots and influences, along with the profound impact the death of her mother had on the artist's work. It follows too the transitions Piccinini has made from one theme to another, as she explores the interface between technology and nature and makes a new series of work, collaborating with husband Peter Hennessy for the first time.

John Bell: One Man Show (Tuesday 5 April) is a special tribute to award-winning icon of Australian theatre. It records a lifetime spent enthralling audiences, as on the eve of his 75th birthday the actor bows out of Bell Shakespeare, the company he founded 25 years ago. This documentary observes John Bell preparing his final show and includes interviews with friends, family and colleagues. Spine-tingling archival footage tells the story of the young Shakespeare obsessive, who once entertained his parents with his one-man puppet show version of Macbeth.

Julia Zemiro's Home Delivery: Kerri-Anne Kennerley

Kerri-Anne Kennerley has spent 50 years on Australian television screens. She meets Julia back where it all began - in the Brisbane coastal suburb of Sandgate. But the house in which she grew up, built by her father's own hands, no longer stands.

Kerri-Anne describes a typical Queensland childhood, one of four children in a close-knit family, and of how she was the 'annoying' youngest sibling who always wanted to tag along with her brothers and sister.

She reveals that she wanted to be in show business for as long as she can remember. Before the family had one of their own, she used to walk over the hill in her pyjamas to watch television through the electronics shop window, all the while dreaming of being on the tele herself.

Kerri-Anne and Julia then jump into a 1970s Valiant Charger to drive to a seemingly unchanged Sandgate State School.

And next, it's on to Sandgate Town Hall to meet her sister Jan, where Kerri-Anne complains of the injustice of being made to wear hand-me-down fancy dress costumes while their mother created a prize-winning masterpiece for Jan.

The town hall was also the first place Kerri-Anne ever performed in public, recreating routines by her favourite comedians, and miming to 'My Boomerang Won't Come Back' with her school friends.

They end the day at Channel 9 studios, where at the age 13, Kerri-Anne pestered her way to a television debut. She tells Julia about the highs and lows, from battling chauvinism to her long reign as daytime queen.

Hatch, Match And Dispatch

Hatch, Match & Dispatch steps inside the Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages (BDM), for an intimate look at the milestones that unite us all.

In episode six of **Hatch, Match & Dispatch,** fitness instructor, Nathan and Yoga instructor, Neha have turned up at the Registry to apply to get married. But there's a hiccup. They have no wedding rings and no vows - Nathan hasn't even asked Neha to marry him! To complicate matters, Neha's very traditional parents haven't met their future son-in-law yet. The Registry conducts close to 10,000 marriage interviews every year but only half of those turn into actual weddings. Is Neha and Nathan's wedding another disaster in the making?

Six hundred and seventy thousand Australians identify as being of aboriginal descent. 16 year-old Kerry has been offered her first ever job working in a community centre for the elderly and she needs a birth certificate to get paid. But Kerry's birth was never officially registered so Rebecca and Max have to try and find evidence to prove Kerry is who she says she is.

Laura's stoicism is heartbreaking. She's come into the office for a death certificate - Bruce her late husband died too young. And he's not the only family member she's lost.
