Mystery Road

When there is a mysterious disappearance on an outback cattle station in the remote town of Patterson, Detective Jay Swan (Aaron Pedersen) is assigned to investigate. Working with local cop Sergeant Emma James (Judy Davis), Jay's investigation uncovers a past injustice that threatens the fabric of the whole community.

In episode 1, Jay arrives in Patterson, thinking his assignment will be an easy job - but it soon becomes clear that this is not the case. Jay, always a loner, now must work with tough local cop Emma. Born to a wealthy pastoral family and proud of her pioneering history, Emma's life is embedded in the town. Jay is also saddled by the arrival of his daughter Crystal (Madeleine Madden), who's run away from her own trouble at home.

When it becomes apparent that missing boy Marley was not alone, and that another farm hand is also missing, Jay's focus turns to the cattle station owner Tony Ballantyne (Colin Friels). When it is revealed that Tony is Emma's brother and that the land where the boys went missing belongs to the family, Jay wonders why she didn't tell him that up front. Did the boys stumble on something? Is Emma covering for her brother? When everyone knows everyone, anyone could be a suspect ... including Emma.

In episode 2, as Jay and Emma search for missing farm workers Marley (Aaron McGrath) and Reese (Connor Van Vuuren), the early morning interstate bus arrives in Patterson bringing trouble in two forms – Larry Dime (Wayne Blair), convicted paedophile and Marley's uncle who has been released on parole after 10 years in gaol; and Georgia Clarke (Rose Riley), a teenager who has seen the news and recognised Reese as her boyfriend Simon, who went missing two years earlier.

At the same time, Jay and Emma are finding it hard to put their differences aside. Emma is finding it difficult working with Jay – who doesn't tell her anything about where his inquiries are taking him. The investigation leads them back to Emma's family station where they discover that Marley and Reese checked out a work rifle but never returned it. Is Emma's brother Tony merely careless with his workers and guns or is he hiding something? Jay discovers Tony wants to put Ballantyne station up for sale, but Emma doesn't want to part with her family property.

Jay digs further and finds Reese had told his girlfriend Shevorne (Tasia Zalar) something was going on with the water at the station. Jay goes out alone to investigate. He finds that although the station is supposed to have an unlimited supply of water, the bore's lines and troughs are empty. For Jay it's more confirmation that he can't trust anyone, especially Emma, as he thinks she's either hiding or ignoring the deep underbelly of Patterson that's beginning to surface.

Meanwhile Emma is shocked to find Larry has returned to town and is finding himself a physical target from angry townspeople who don't want him back. But there is one major clue that reveals itself. Larry's prison visitor logs show only one person called on Larry in the last 10 years ... it was Marley one week before he went missing. Despite Jay's pleas to the 'good' man of old, Larry refuses to reveal why Marley visited him or what they discussed, leaving Jay and Emma back at square one. When Emma realises Jay is investigating behind her back, she tries to get him re-assigned but to no avail.

Under pressure from the police, Shevorne is living in fear due to Larry's return. Unaware that Georgia is stalking her believing that Shevorne has stolen 'her' boyfriend Reese (aka Simon), she is followed on her walk home after a late shift. Hearing someone breaking into the house, Shevorne freezes in terror and manages to phone Emma but can she get there in time?

Back in Time For Dinner

We've all heard it at some stage, or even said it ... "back in my day things were better..." or "you don't know how lucky you've got it these days..." So, what if you could find out if those statements from your parents or grandparents were true? What if you and your family could go back into the past and 'live' those bygone days? Well, that's exactly what the Ferrone family has agreed to do.

In each of the series' seven episodes, this food-loving Australian family of five is throwing away its culinary comforts and kitchen appliances, smartphones and snapchat, and is turning its backs on its 21st Century lifestyle. As Annabel Crabb, guides The Ferrone's through the different decades, **Back in Time for Dinner** offers a unique opportunity to tap into the social, economic, and political imperatives of our times. The family's own home is meticulously transformed back in time from the 50s all the way to present day and finally into the future. Following carefully researched recipes they'll source, cook, and eat the same meals as everyday Australian families in each era.

The family will live through the highs, lows and challenges that shaped family life in the 20th Century.

This week is the 1960s and there's great change in Australia and the Ferrone household. Making Child Prodigies

During this series, we follow five extraordinarily talented children from around Australia and ask - what does it take to be a child prodigy? Lifting the lid on the elite worlds of dance, music, academia and fine art, *Making Child Prodigies* provides an intimate and candid look at the day-to-day lives of a special group of children and their families at a pivotal time in their careers.

Tonight, 12-year-old heavy metal guitarist Callum is recording his debut single at a state-of-the-art studio, just as his social media channel reaches an impressive milestone. With a technical skill that rivals most professionals, Callum takes one step closer to the fame he craves.

Abstract artist Aelita's deep love for nature and animals is reflected in her militant vegetarian beliefs, but a new task challenges her to put her principles aside. David Attenborough's Tasmania

Narrated by Sir David Attenborough this documentary explores Tasmania, the weird and wonderful isle at the bottom of the world.

Tasmania is a vast, island wilderness of ancient forests and pristine rivers, surrounded by spectacular coastline. Its animal inhabitants are every bit as extraordinary as they are bizarre: a cast of black devils, white wallabies, miniature penguins and giant trees. With Antarctica the next landfall south, their lives are governed by the cool climate and strong seasonal calendar. Tasmania may be part of Australia, but life here is very different indeed.

Tasmania experiences greater seasonal change than anywhere else in Australia. Winter is the most challenging time of year, as temperatures fall below freezing and snow covers the landscape. On the mainland, animals like wombats, wallabies and platypus are mostly nocturnal, avoiding the daytime heat. In Tasmania, however, the cooler temperatures mean they feed and move around in broad daylight.

Spring in Tasmania brings milder temperatures however this time of year can also bring wild weather to Tasmania, most of which comes from the west, due to prevailing winds. The result divides Tasmania in two, with a dry eastern half and a wet western half.

Summer in Tasmania is most apparent in the dry, eastern half of the island. This dry half is more reminiscent of the Australian mainland to the north, though there are animals here that are distinctly Tasmanian.

Autumn's arrival is marked by a bizarre event: the Tasmanian devil mating season. Females become receptive several times over just a few weeks and, to ensure the fittest young, will try to mate with as many males as possible. The males, however, have a very different objective. To maximise their chance of fathering young, they try to keep the female in their den for as long as possible. The result is a breeding system quite unlike anything else.

Julia Zemiro's Home Delivery - Barrie Cassidy

As a journalist and host of ABC TV's Insiders, Barrie Cassidy has kept us abreast of the machinations of Australian politics for more than a quarter of a century.

Barrie proudly escorts Julia around Chiltern in Victoria's gold rush country where his mother's side of the family has lived since 1858. Ready to show off the town in which he and his fellow Cassidys made such a mark, the two meet up in Chiltern's picturesque main street. As they wander around the corner to the old family home, they meet up with Barrie's brother Megsie, who still lives here.

As Barrie and Julia explore a house he hasn't been inside for 50 years, Barrie - one of six kids - remembers a home without running water in the kitchen, and two rooms so stricken with damp they were unable to be used. He also remembers how his father was very involved in all the town's sporting clubs and that there were always lots of kids in their back yard playing one sport or another.

During the war Barrie's father Bill was captured on Crete and spent four years as a prisoner of war. Meanwhile, his mother Myra was told Bill had been injured and was missing, and It took 12 months for her to learn he was still alive. After the war, his mother gave birth to his sister Pam and then five boys. He explains that they were always puzzled that their mother hardly ever left the house and would send the kids out to get the groceries. Fifty years later Myra's secret is revealed when a letter arrives.

Then it's off to nearby Rutherglen, to the now abandoned convent and girls' boarding school where Barrie attended high school. This was the only place that two boys from the Catholic school in Chiltern could go to high school. There they meet his old school friend Judy Courtin to talk about the idiosyncrasies of their education by the nuns.

Back in Chiltern, Barrie shows Julia the Federal Standard printing works, where he got his first job in journalism writing the local football column for five years. They finished the day at Chiltern Grandstand, overlooking the impressive Chiltern oval. Here Barrie reflects on the end of his father's life and the emotion of retracing the lives of the Chiltern Cassidys.

Architect Domenic Alvaro and his partner Sue Bassett are urban animals who love the innercity suburb of Surry Hills in Sydney. However, their dream location comes with a nightmare price tag. So, they come up with a unique way of keeping costs down and do this by buying very small and building tall.

After buying a tiny corner car park measuring 7m x 6m they set out to create 220 square metres of light filled living space. Their vertical build comes together quickly thanks to prefab concrete panels which fit together like Lego. Construction itself is fast and efficient but there are interesting challenges on site. A miniscule block and two narrow cross streets won't submit to the needs of a gigantic crane in a hurry – and the crane is essential as it hauls the huge panels and windows into position. Basically, something's gotta give – and it does. Will the result be worth the hassle?
