The Queen at Ninety includes individual contributions from many key figures in her life, including Their Royal Highnesses: The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall, The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge,



Prince Harry, The Duke of York, Princesses Beatrice and Eugenie, The Countess of Wessex and Peter Phillips.

In addition, leading national and international figures will feature, including Prime Minister David Cameron, along with famous faces from the world of sport and entertainment, and material from the most comprehensive international film archives.

Viewers will also see Her Majesty attending and hosting various events, including a reception for the Rugby World Cup and the Chinese State Visit, as well as working and relaxing at home.

Speaking about Her Majesty, HRH The Prince of Wales says: "I said to my mother the other day, do you realise that when you reach 90 I shall have known you for 68 years, she had to laugh a little bit."

He continued: "When you think that all these years the Queen has been on throne, that in itself is a huge achievement, coping with so many different challenges and complications and always being there really in that remarkable way – steadfast."

As she reaches her 90th birthday, this film aims to offer a fresh insight into the monarch's life and work; a remarkable story of an extraordinary life which in so many ways reflects the changing face of Britain.

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


Over-Represented: A Vice Special On Indigenous Incarceration

NAIDOC Week Special

Indigenous Australians are over-represented in Australia's prisons. Making up just 3% of the total population, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders represent more than 28% of Australia's prison numbers.

VICE Australia explores the topic of Indigenous incarceration in this documentary, taking a multi-faceted approach, it provides the perspectives of Aboriginal people working in and around the sector, as well as the individuals directly affected by incarceration.



Though the issues and circumstances surrounding Indigenous incarceration are broad and far-reaching, this program seeks to answer two central questions, "Why is the rate of Indigenous incarceration so high? And what is being done to disrupt the cycle?"

To get an idea of what life is like as a young, Indigenous, A-class offender, we followed rapper and proud Yorta-Yorta man Adam Briggs inside Reiby, a Juvenile Justice Centre on the outskirts of Sydney. We join Darwin's Night Patrols, riding along to see how they help people home, assist the homeless, and ultimately keep Aboriginal people out of the justice system. And VICE spends a night shift with a Client Service Officer of the Victorian Aboriginal Legal Service, whose task is to check in on Indigenous people taken into custody and prevent Aboriginal deaths behind bars.

Residents of The Zone are shocked when drones appear in the sky, announcing that all humans have 24 hours to leave. Anyone remaining after that time will be deemed a Hairy and treated accordingly. It's the only way the government can protect innocent citizens from these unprovoked, violent attacks. People begin to pack up and leave.



Encouraged by the success of the smoking, Koen (Hunter Page-Lochard) agrees to send Kora (Alexis Lane) back to her dimension.

While Koen is going from strength to strength, Waruu (Rob Collins) is now completely estranged from his wife and daughter. When Linda (Deb Mailman) confronts him about the fact that he's prepared to sacrifice his own brother, Waruu turns on her. He believes it's her fault that he's not a worthy man.

Waruu heads to see Slade, but when he hears Matthews (Andrew McFarlane) speaking about reclaiming The Zone, he despairs – what is the point of all this money Slade has given him, if Matthews is going to take the land? Slade gives Waruu a computer drive, assuring him that Matthews will have lost his job by the end of the day. Waruu realises that he is doing exactly what Slade wants him to do and has become his pawn. Waruu realizes there is no way out, even if he wanted one.

Waruu entices Koen to come to see Slade with him. In the lab, Slade shows Waruu his wonder drug – it gives the recipient Hairy-like strength and longevity. Waruu takes the nulla nulla and abandons Koen to Slade, who is knocked out by powerful shockwaves whilst attempting to draw blood from the young Cleverman, now comfortably in his full powers.

Back in The Zone, Maliyan (Adam Briggs) makes a defiant stand against the impending arrival of the Containment forces – he will spill the first blood. A human. Blair (Ryan Corr). But before he can, he's felled by a shot. It's Waruu, who then attempts to rally The Zoners together, extolling the virtues of his plans for land ownership and housing for all.

His messianic rant is met by a stunned silence. Everyone has seen him murder Maliyan. But before anyone can move, the Namorrodor appears out of nowhere and swoops down on Aunty Linda. Waruu grabs the nulla nulla and races to her rescue. But the Namorrodor easily swipes him aside.

Koen appears, having escaped from Slade – who stirs from his blackout – and picks up the nulla nulla from the ground where Waruu dropped it. He summons the full powers of the Cleverman, and conquers the Namorrodor.

Rescued from the beast, but still having to face the arrival of the troops, The Zoners prepare. Koen moves amongst them as their new leader. And in the deep heart of The Zone, alone and bitter, Waruu doses up on Slade's wonder drug.

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Compass: The Vic Simms Story

This **COMPASS** contribution to NAIDOC Week puts Bidgigal elder and singer Vic Simms in the spotlight. Discovered by Col Joye when he first performed as an 11 year old at a social club in Maroubra, Vic went on to be the first indigenous performer on Bandstand before solo performers went out of fashion.

Alcoholism contributed to Vic's early decline and his involvement in an armed robbery led to seven years in prison. Here he recorded the iconic album *The Loner* and was let out of prison to perform a number of concerts.

When finally released he was a forgotten man. A revival of *The Loner* and his status as a respected Aboriginal elder in La Perouse have restored his dignity.
