## **Synopsis**

The Office of Births, Deaths and Marriages (BDM) is the place where the most momentous events of our lives happen. We go there when the stakes are highest and when we're at our most joyful and vulnerable. Emotions run high and stories of love, life and loss surface.

This remarkably human place is a microcosm of life - and through the eyes of the registry officers, we'll share the love, laughter and tears of ordinary Aussies.

People from all walks of life rely on the BDM – births, deaths and marriages affect us all, and we'll witness firsthand the funniest, most romantic, emotional and sometimes unhinged moments.

The BDM is a melting pot of tradition, culture and religion, an institution where landmark events unfold every day: young lovers get hitched on a budget; marriage parties roll in and out like clockwork, and intimate personal moments get thrown around like confetti. And then there's death...

Families are reunited over tears and testaments. And in death, we'll also find laughter as everyday Australians reminisce about the special times. But for every dispatch, there's a hatch: stories of conception, birth, and young mums doing it tough. What's in a name? Everything. The BDM also creates the data that shapes Australia. Governments use BDM birth stats to help decide the location of new suburbs, roads, schools and hospitals, and the trending causes of death influence policies on everything from healthcare and housing to superannuation.

A dramatic rise in the number of civil ceremonies over the last 20 years has seen marriage change from the days of lavish Christian church weddings to low budget multicultural weddings.

But beyond the data and the personal journeys, the office of BDM is a place where there's a wider unfolding social and cultural context: racial tolerance and intolerance; loss and betrayal; sexual prejudice; the changing face of marriage; identity; multiculturalism; family conflict and adoption.

While our narrative unfolds through the eyes of a core cast of registry officers, we'll follow stories to maternity wards and hospitals, family homes, funeral parlours, cemeteries, and beyond.

# **Birth, Death & Marriage Facts**

- The First Fleet of British ships arrived at Botany Bay in January 1788 - however the first 'Australian' birth and death were recorded the previous year.
- The first recorded birth was William **Tilley on board the First Fleet ship** the Lady Penryn on 20 April 1787.
- The first recorded burial was James **Bradley on board the First Fleet ship** the Alexander on 3 February 1787.
- The first recorded marriage was between William Parr and Mary MacCormick at the corner of Bligh and Hunter Streets in Sydney on 10 February 1788.
- The Reverend Richard Johnson, Chaplain to the First Fleet, recorded these events. His successors continued to perform and record baptisms, burials and marriages.
- From 1788 to 1856 the only birth, death or marriage records kept in NSW were the registers maintained by the established churches. The Registry holds transcriptions of these early church records. Any surviving original registers are located in the NSW Archives.
- Civil celebrants have overseen the majority of marriages since 1999 and the proportion of marriage ceremonies overseen by a civil celebrant increased again to 74.1 per cent of all marriages in 2014.<sup>(1)</sup>

- In 2012 there were 123,244 marriages registered across all states and territories. In the same year, there were 49,917 divorces granted. So in 2012, more than twice as many people married as divorced.<sup>(2)</sup>
- Top baby names for 2015 in NSW are Charlotte and Oliver, while William and Charlotte ranked first in the ACT and Oliver and Charlotte in SA.
- When naming a baby in Australia you legally can't chose a name that is: obscene or offensive, is too long, contains symbols without phonetic significance, such as an exclamation or question mark or one that is contrary to public interest or a name that contains an official title or rank recognised in Australia such as King, Lady, Father, Sir or Admiral.
- 2,255 babies are stillborn every year in Australia. That's 6 Australian families who experience the devastation of stillbirth every day.<sup>(3)</sup>
- Early pregnancy losses are not registered as either a birth of a death. Registrar Amanda introduced the 'Certificate of Loss' four months after becoming registrar in 2014. NSW, SA, QLD offer the certificates. WA and TAS were due to start in October this year and Vic & NT & ACT don't currently offer this certificate.



## Episode1

#### **Thursday February 11 8pm**

22-year old Jared from Mt Druitt is headover-heels in love with his pregnant brideto-be, Renee. They've come into the Parramatta Registry office with their family and friends to tie the knot. Jared's so nervous he can't stop shaking and Renee is due any day now. Are they ready for parenthood?

According to the Australian Marriage Act, marriage is not for everyone – and that's a concept, Social Justice Activist, Norrie wants to change. Norrie recently won a High Court battle to be classified as sex non-specific, meaning Norrie is legally neither male nor female. Norrie, partner Sam and a group of students storm into the city office of the Registry demanding an official Marriage Interview. But in Australia, marriage can only take place between a man and a woman. And Norrie is sex non-specific. The Registry is set for a showdown.

The Office of Births, Deaths & Marriages acts as a kind of bookend to life. More than 140,000 birth and death certificates are issued in NSW each year. Pauline comes into the Registry to apply for her official birth certificate because just two days before her mother died, Pauline was told she was adopted. It's a shocking deathbed confession but Pauline's biggest bombshell is yet to come.





## Episode2

#### **Thursday February 18 8pm**

Monika, the Registrar's Assistant, and her fiancé Duane are getting hitched. Duane thinks it's cool getting married at Monika's workplace with Amanda, the Registrar, officiating.

The Registry is the country's largest celebrant – more than 12,000 Australian couples get married in registry offices every year. But for bride-to-be, Monika, it all feels a little too close to home. Perhaps that's because she's planning a lavish wedding reception overseas. Her work colleagues are determined to make this a day to remember as long as the electrician can get the lights back on - the city has been hit by a power failure. Will the wedding even go ahead?

At the front counter, Client Services Officer, and the Registry's resident 'Origami Master', Gary is dealing with a distressed funeral director who's come in to collect a death certificate. Wendy wants to honour her late father's dying wish to have his body repatriated to his birth country of Argentina. But there is a serious problem - Jose's body may be contagious.

What's in a name? Ask transgender, ballet dancer, Julia, and she'll say everything. Julia, (birth name, Tibor), was a worldrenowned ballet dancer. She's come in to Registry today to apply to change her name. But Registry Officer, Alize, must prove this is not a case of identify fraud.





#### Amanda REGISTRAR

Amanda has 20 years experience at the Registry and is passionate about the staff, customers and keeping the records for the people of NSW. Amanda's grassroots beginning with the Registry was as Team Leader, Manager and Assistant Registrar. She's now the 17th NSW Registrar since 1856, and only the second female to hold the post.
