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HYUNDAI'S HELLO

Welcome to Rally de España for round 12 of what has become an enthralling 2018 FIA World Rally Championship – and to an event where Hyundai Motorsport must make up lost ground.

Wales Rally GB proved to be a difficult weekend for our team. We went there hoping to fight for a podium, or even the win, but it wasn't to be and, in the end, we had to salvage what points we could.

Unfortunately, we failed to get the correct set-up for our Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC on this tricky event and although we made improvements during Friday that really helped us the following day, Thierry's off meant we could not fight for the victory. Thankfully he managed to regain some positions to finish fifth, with Andreas and Hayden following him home. And Jari also showed promise with his fine run to fourth in the WRC2 class.

But the fact remains that we have allowed ourselves to fall behind in the championship and we now have just this rally and the final round in Australia from which we can bounce back. We have to accept the result in Wales, learn from the experience and move on. It will be an uphill battle but we have to give it everything possible.

With Sébastien Ogier now trailing Thierry by just seven points in the Drivers' championship, he knows he must push for the win on the mixed road surfaces of Spain. But Thierry has made the podium here in the past so there is everything to play for. Andreas and Dani should also be on good form – Andreas took his maiden win here in 2015 and Dani will of course have the support of his home fans.

A good result will also help Hyundai Motorsport to make up ground to Toyota in the Manufacturers' championship – and this will be the final

event of the year for Jari and Antti to show what they have learned in WRC2 this season.

We have a good car, good crews and a strong team – now is the time to make all those elements work for us as this year's WRC nears what is sure to be a thrilling climax.

ON STAGE WITH... **DANI SORDO**

Just how much would you like to win this rally?

"I would love to win because it's really a special one for me. It's my home rally and we have a lot of supporters. I enjoy this event a lot, so yes, a win would be amazing."

What do you need to be successful?

"You need to have the feeling with the car on gravel and tarmac. It's a long time between Portugal, my last event on gravel, and this rally so it will be difficult to start again on the first day, which is obviously mainly on a loose surface. But on the other side I have a really good road position on the first day."

How confident are you of a strong result based on car performance and your preparations?

"I need to have a really strong first day with everything working well and no problems. After that if I have the confidence I am sure we can take a good result."

What are the strengths of the Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC on this rally?

"We have a good engine and we know the car performs well on gravel. We also have some evolutions on tarmac so hopefully we can be a bit stronger than in Germany."

While Salou is a long way from where you live it's still your home round of the WRC so how much pressure are you under?

"Salou is a long way from my home but it's still the 'Rally of Spain'. The people want you to be fighting for the victory. I have always been close but I have never taken the win. I would like to do this for the fans and when you want to do better in something you always have extra pressure."

How much extra motivation do the fans give you?

"The fans give me a lot of motivation. It's very difficult to describe but when you are in the car and you see all these people in the stages pushing you a lot it's amazing, one of the best feelings ever. I am really happy to have this support."

What's your earliest memory of this rally as a fan and as a driver?

"I have a lot of memories from when I was younger going to the rally with my father, my mother and friends to see drivers like Colin McRae, Tommi Mäkinen, Carlos Sainz and Jesus Puras. They were really nice moments. I have done the rally myself many times now, winning the Junior world championship and getting my first podium in a World Rally Car."

HYUNDAI HAPPENINGS

- Thierry Neuville still leads the World Rally Championship Drivers' standings despite a tough weekend for Hyundai Motorsport on Wales Rally GB, where the Belgian came back from an off on day two to finish fifth. Andreas Mikkelsen and Hayden Paddon were sixth and seventh respectively after the team struggled to reach the right set-up for the Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC on the demanding stages.
- Neuville heads the Drivers' championship by seven points from GB winner Sébastien Ogier, while Hyundai Motorsport has a 20-point deficit to the Toyota Gazoo team in the Manufacturers' standings.
- There was better news for Hyundai Motorsport Driver development Program (HMDP) crew Jari Huttunen and Antti Linnaketo, who were quickest in WRC2 on the last stage in Wales to finish a fine fourth in class. They will now contest their final event of the season on Rally de España.
- Hyundai Motorsport tested in Spain in mid-October with all three drivers preparing for Rally de España with a day of running on asphalt, plus there was one day of gravel testing for Neuville and Sordo.
- The i30 N TCR remains the leading car in the FIA World Touring Car Cup after back-to-back events in China, where the Hyundai became the first car to win all three races over a weekend. At the Race of China-Ningbo (September 28-30), MRacing-YMR driver Thed Björk dominated Races 1 and 3, while teammate Yvan Muller won Race 2. For the following weekend at the Race of China-Wuhan a change in compensation weights meant the i30 N TCR was up to 100kg heavier, but despite this BRC Racing Team's Gabriele Tarquini remains ahead in the overall standings.
- The i20 R5 has taken arguably its biggest victory with Hyundai-supported Diego Dominguez and Hector Nunes winning the 45th Transchaco Rally in their native Paraguay. The pair were quickest on nine stages over three days to build a 90-second advantage. The rally is the blue-riband event of the national series, covering nearly 900km over 25 stages this year.
- Hyundai España-supported i20 R5 customers scored a double podium at the Rallye Villa de Llanes (September 28-29), the latest round of the Spanish Tarmac championship. José Antonio Suárez and Iván Ares set top times on eight of the event's 10 stages, but following the former's retirement it was series leader Ares and Surhayen Pernía who claimed second and third behind winner Miguel Fuster.
- Armindo Araújo still leads the Portuguese rally championship after the penultimate round of the series, the Rali de Amarante Baião (September 21-22). The Hyundai Portugal-supported driver finished third overall, the best of four i20 R5s entered for the event.

3: Across 11 rounds of the 2018 WRC, Hyundai Motorsport has so far scored three victories on Rally Sweden, Rally de Portugal and Rally Italia Sardegna. Sweden has proved the most successful hunting ground where the team took a double podium finish, with Thierry Neuville the winner and Andreas Mikkelsen in third. Neuville and Dani Sordo were then second and third in Argentina.

60: Hyundai crews have so far amassed 60 stage wins during the 2018 season following Wales Rally GB, as well as 49 Power Stage points.

10: Hyundai Motorsport claimed its 10th podium finish of the 2018 season with Hayden Paddon's third place on Rally Turkey. The team finished on the podium in every round between Sweden and Sardinia.

- 3: As its name suggests, the Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC comes with three doors compared to the five in its predecessor. But while there are two doors less, the new-for-2017 challenger has a power output of 380hp thanks to the introduction of a larger turbo restrictor – up from 33mm to 36mm.
- 1: With the current regulations allowing manufacturers to nominate three point-scoring drivers rather than two, the three Hyundai i20 Coupe WRCs are entered under one banner: Hyundai Shell Mobis World Rally Team.
- **6,000**: Prior to the launch of the Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC, some 6,000 kilometres had been covered during extensive development testing.
- 50: Hyundai Motorsport's Alzenau base is located within a 50-kilometre radius of Hyundai Motor Europe's base in Offenbach and Hyundai Motor Europe's Technical and Design Centre in Rüsselsheim.
- **29**: There are 29 nationalities represented at Hyundai Motorsport GmbH, with more than 200 employees based in Germany.
- 0.7: Thierry Neuville's 0.7-second victory over Sébastien Ogier on Rally Italia Sardegna matched his winning margin over Elfyn Evans in Argentina last year – one of the closest in WRC history. It was also his ninth and Hyundai Motorsport's 10 victory so far in the WRC.
- **5.3**: Hyundai Motorsport has fans all around the world who follow its efforts in the WRC and Customer Racing through social media, with over 5.3 million likes on Facebook. The team also has 65,200 followers on Twitter and more than 140,700 on Instagram.

- First announced in 2015, the N line-up showcases Hyundai's engineering expertise, offering high-performance models that are equally at home on the road, or out on a race circuit.
- N was born in Namyang, Korea in Hyundai's global R&D centre and honed at the famous Nürburgring circuit, home to the Hyundai Test Centre. The close working relationship between the engineers in Korea and Germany created the foundations for the development of the line-up. The N logo also symbolises a chicane, where the models carrying the badge are most at home.
- N is Hyundai's answer to emerging customer preferences, calling for uncompromising innovation and technology-driven performance. Designed to deliver the perfect combination of feedback, precision and predictable response, the models of the N line-up are made for driving enthusiasts, bringing a unique character to the road and further enhancing the image of the Hyundai brand.
- Inspired by Hyundai Motorsport competing at the highest possible level, the creation of N has drawn on our experience of testing the i30 N TCR, and racing on the tarmac, gravel and snow of the World Rally Championship. From the knowledge taken from the stages and the circuit Hyundai's engineers were able to identify further handling and performance refinements during the development of the N line-up. With all this experience, N delivers exhilarating driving pleasure for everyone pure emotions.
- The i30 N was the first road-going model to be launched from the N line-up in July 2017. The car is based on the New Generation i30. However, it was developed from the ground up in order to deliver maximum driving pleasure for everyone. Under the theme 'Fun to Drive', the i30 N has been developed on the basis of three cornerstones: Corner Rascal, Everyday Sports Car and Race Track Capability. It offers segment-leading high-performance elements that can be selected individually by the driver in order to tailor the car for any scenario, from a comfortable daily commute to a day at the track.
- Like the i30 NTCR the road-going i30 N is powered by a two-litre, turbocharged
 engine. The i30 N develops up to 275 horsepower, with a maximum torque of
 353 Nm, delivered through a six-speed gearbox to the front wheels. The roadgoing car can reach a maximum speed of 250km/h and accelerate from 0 to
 100 km/h in just over six seconds.

Mikkelsen joined Hyundai Motorsport for three late-season events in 2017, passing his audition with flying colours by earning a long-term deal with the team. Having initially flown in skiing. he switched to rallying when injury curtailed his promising career on the slopes. Relocating to the UK for 2006, he was a winner shortly after getting his driving licence following his 17th birthday. Fifth on the 2008 Rally Sweden then made him the youngest driver to score a WRC point. Mikkelsen won back-to-back Intercontinental Rally Challenge titles in 2011-12. Having joined Volkswagen's WRC line-up, he took his maiden win on the 2015 Rally de España. and won in Poland and Australia in 2016. Mikkelsen also scored his first podium finish for Hyundai with third on this year's Rally Sweden.

A relative latecomer to co-driving, Jæger has enjoyed a rapid rise to the WRC ranks having started his career in 2014 in his native Norway alongside Bernt Kollevold. He made his world championship debut that year with Ole Christian Veiby in Spain before going on to contest a mix of mainly Junior WRC and European championship events the following season, scoring five podiums including a win in the former Jæger's partnership with long-time friend Mikkelsen began in fine style in 2016 when they were second on Rallye Monte-Carlo, one of six podium visits that included two victories.

#5 Hyundai i20 Coupe WRC (chassis 010)



THIFRRY NEUVILLE Date of birth: June 16, 1988 Place of birth: Sankt Vith, Belgium Nationality: Belgian WRC starts: 96 WRC wins: 9

Neuville is a firm title contender for Hyundai Motorsport - following wins in Sweden, Portugal and Sardinia - having finished a close second in 2017. His successes last year included four victories - the most of any driver - and he finished with a win in Australia. Having enjoyed huge success at junior level before stepping up to the WRC in 2009, the Belgian finished second in the 2013 standings after a highly competitive season. Those performances caught the eye of Hyundai's fledgling WRC team and he was signed for its debut campaign. Alongside co-driver Nicolas Gilsoul, Neuville scored the team's debut podium in Mexico 2014 and led a memorable one-two (ahead of Dani Sordo) on Rallye Deutschland - the squad's maiden victory. Although German is Neuville's first language. French is used on events as the shorter words make communication more efficient

An experienced WRC campaigner, Gilsoul was awarded the prestigious WRC Co-driver of the Year accolade in 2016 after finishing second in that year's championship alongside Neuville. They joined forces in the spring of 2011 and the partnership quickly blossomed with victory on the Tour de Corse, then a round of the IRC, in only their second event together. Moving to Hyundai Motorsport for 2014, Gilsoul helped to secure the team's first victory on Rallye Deutschland that season, and Thierry is quick to praise his co-driver's precision and matching skillsets in the cockpit. Gilsoul's four wins with Neuville in 2017 was more than that scored by any other co-driver, confirming this Belgian's crew status as one of the most formidable in world rallving.

Hugely consistent and experienced, Sordo has amassed a legion of fans since arriving in world rallying 15 years ago. This asphalt specialist's career began at the age of 12 in motocross and karting, but he also tried hillclimbing before moving to rallying and winning the Junior world crown in 2005. The Spaniard, who is reunited with former co-driver Carlos Del Barrio for 2018. scored his maiden WRC victory in Germany in 2013 and was signed by Hyundai Motorsport later that year. Since then he has been an integral part of the team. Sordo helped in Hyundai's milestone one-two result on Rallye Deutschland in 2014 and has since secured many more podiums. Scoring two top-three finishes in 2017 only added to his impressive list of achievements and he was second on this year's Rally Mexico - Hyundai's best result on that event - and third in Argentina.

The vastly experienced del Barrio has co-driven for some of the biggest names in Spanish rallying. His career began in 1987 and he made his WRC debut in 1994 with Jesus Puras. They enjoyed tremendous success in their native Spain, winning three national titles. In 2004, del Barrio joined forces with Dani Sordo for an initial four-event campaign with the young Spaniard looking for an experienced co-driver. The pairing would reunite in 2011 for a longer WRC programme, which included three podiums and victory on the 2013 Rallye Deutschland. The crew will be chasing more success in 2018 with Hyundai Motorsport.

Rising star Huttunen has joined Hyundai Motorsport's Driver development (HMDP) for 2018 to contest selected events in the WRC2 category. The Finn, who was named the Finnish federation's Future Rally Star in 2015 after winning the SM3 class in his national championship, was chosen to take part in the HMDP project after impressing the team during a rigorous evaluation process. As a result, he will undertake a programme of tests and WRC events in a Hyundai i20 R5 this season. Huttunen and codriver Antti Linnaketo won the 2016 ADAC Opel Rallye Cup in Germany, with six victories from seven events, before going on to contest last vear's ERC Junior U27 title in which they finished second. The pair also won the WRC2 class on last vear's Rally Finland and finished second this year.

Linnaketo's co-driving career stretches back to 2004, when he began contesting events in his native Finland and neighbouring Estonia. He made his WRC debut in 2010 on Rally Finland. co-driving for Juha Laaksonen, and first teamed up with Huttunen in 2014 when they finished third in class SM3 on the Pirelli Ralli Tampere in Finland. The pair had been introduced that summer in a meeting facilitated by the AKK Driver Academy and, of course, went on to national success the following year on home soil. Huttunen and Linnaketo got their first competitive taste of the Hyundai i20 R5 on last year's Wales Rally GB, when they gained some useful experience in the privately entered car ahead of this year's WRC2 campaign.

HYUNDAI IS HERE... En España

- Hyundai Spain began life on March 1, 1992 with the opening of 18 dealerships across the country. Three models – the Sonata, Lantra and S-Coupe – went on sale with 1172 Hyundai vehicles registered by the end of the first year.
- In late 2009, Hyundai Motor Company took control of the distribution of the brand in Spain, forming Hyundai Motor Spain and relocating its headquarters to Las Tablas in early 2010.
- That summer, Hyundai Motor Spain was responsible for organising the largest event by a private company in the country when 500,000 fans flocked to the Hyundai Fan Park in the centre of Madrid to watch the Spanish football team win the FIFA World Cup in South Africa.
- For the first time in the history of Hyundai in Spain, the company was represented at the Barcelona Motor Show in May 2011 where the Hyundai i40 was given its world premiere and the Hyundai Elantra its first showing in Europe.
- For the last 14 years, Hyundai in Spain has sponsored a Moroccan desert event, called Desert Children. Aside from being a solidarity trip to support the children of the Moroccan desert, the event represents a test for Hyundai's SUV range in extreme weather conditions.
- One of the most important Hyundai models, the Tucson, was launched in 2015 and was chosen as ABC newspaper's Car of the Year. And for the first time in the event's 42-year history, a serving Spanish Prime Minister, Mariano Rajoy, attended the ceremony as guest of honour and presented awards to the representatives of Hyundai Spain. The Tucson joined other Hyundai models previously elected as Car of the Year in Spain the i30 (in 2008) and the ix35 (in 2010).
- In 2016 Hyundai launched the IONIQ, the first vehicle worldwide to have three different levels of propulsion: hybrid, plug-in hybrid and all-electric.
- A year later, Hyundai launched the latest generation of the i30 with four different versions available: five-door, Station Wagon, Fastback and the N - the first high-performance vehicle developed by Hyundai. Hyundai also entered the SUV-B segment with the new Hyundai KONA.
- This year is proving to be just as successful for Hyundai in Spain. Sales are
 expected to reach 62,000 units a national record. New versions of the
 Tucson, Santa Fe and i20 have been released, as well as the first compact 100
 per cent Electric SUV, the new KONA EV.

SPAIN MEANS

- Rally de España, the only true mixed-surface event on the world championship schedule, has been a happy hunting ground for Hyundai Motorsport's WRC crews in the past, with both Thierry Neuville and Dani Sordo making the podium and Andreas Mikkelsen claiming his maiden WRC win in Spain in 2015.
- This year, the Hyundai Motorsport Driver development Program pairing of Jari Huttunen and Antti Linnaketo will make their debut on the event.
- The rally continues to be based at Salou's PortAventura theme park in Tarragona province, its home since 2005, but this year the action begins a bit sooner on Thursday. Following a ceremonial start in Salou, crews will tackle the 3.20-kilometre Montjuïc, which offers spectacular views over Barcelona.
- Friday's route uses mainly gravel roads, with two loops of three stages covering Gandesa, Pesells and La Fatarella-Vilalba. The latter test, which is all-new for 2018, is the only mixed-surface stage of the rally and is also the longest at 38.85km.
- Legs two and three are based on asphalt, with Saturday's action kicking
 off at Savallà and Querol followed by a visit to the famous El Montmell test.
 Following a repeat of that loop the day's running concludes with a 2.24km
 blast around the promenade by the sea at Salou.
- Sunday's final leg covers two tests, Riudecanyes and Santa Marina, with the latter televised live and counting as the event-closing Power Stage.
- First run in 1957 as the Rallye Catalunya-Volta a Catalunya, Spain's WRC round was a regular European championship fixture before its elevation to global status in 1991 from its old base on the Costa Brava in Lloret de Mar. The rally's relocation to Salou in 2005 coincided with Sébastien Loeb beginning his unbroken sequence of eight wins.
- Arguably Spain's most successful rally driver is Carlos Sainz, the two-time world champion and winner of 26 WRC events, while factory Hyundai driver Dani Sordo and co-driver Carlos del Barrio will once again be firmly in the Spanish motorsport spotlight this weekend.


