

● Reaching 90 90 90: What Will it Take? Tuesday 19 July | 15:30-16:15 | Press conference room 1

The recent UN member states' endorsed Political Declaration includes commitments to reach 30 million people with HIV treatment by 2020, the '90 90 90' targets show evidence of political commitment while science has provided the tools and evidence base to achieve it. However, while critical progress has been achieved, we must prioritise a number of key interventions such as community-based treatment, solidifying the role of HIV/TB lay counsellors, early treatment for all people living with HIV and routine viral load monitoring, to help facilitate rapid scale-up and help people remain in care. This is particularly true in West and Central Africa, where 3 out of 4 people in need don't have treatment.

Today MSF supports HIV/AIDS treatment for 250,000 people in 19 countries throughout Africa, Asia and Eastern Europe; and continues to push for access to newer, more affordable treatment and diagnostic technologies for HIV/AIDS and TB.

At AIDS2016, MSF will share operational research related to simplified patient-focused differentiated models of care, community-based testing, linkage and retention in care, human resources for health as well as scale up of routine viral load monitoring. Field realities from countries in West and Central Africa, as well as conflict affected contexts where ART coverage is alarmingly low, will also be shared. Along with the latest reporting on drug pricing trends and threats to affordable access to HIV treatment.

TEST AND START

Based on MSF's experience across the HIV continuum of care, involving the community in prevention, testing, treatment and adherence strategies is critical. Strengthening supply chain systems, ensuring last mile drug delivery and investing in counsellors and lay health workers ensures patients start and continue treatment. The successful roll out of routine viral load monitoring will require solid investment at all levels, including providing adherence counselling and alternative treatment for those who need.
