David Stratton's Stories of Australian Cinema

"Perhaps more than any other Australian film, The



Castle (1997) encapsulates love in a nuclear family," says David. But when it was released he saw it as patronizing and full of caricature and gave it one and a half stars. Now he sees the affection that pervades the film and admires how Michael Caton plays Daryl Kerrigan with laconic humour.

In *Rabbit Proof Fence* (2002) families were systematically torn apart, exposing the shame of a nation: the creation of a "stolen generation", and the behind-the-scenes impact of filming the abductions was harrowing. "*Rabbit Proof Fence* helped galvanize momentum for an official apology that came six years later from (then Prime Minister) Kevin Rudd," says David.

Others that fit the rich theme of family: *The Devil's Playground* (1976) - a family of faith; the "brilliant" and "sophisticated" *Lantana* (2001), and the realities of modern families; the emotionally intense and confronting *Head On* (1998), a window into the world of some second-generation immigrants.

When David refused to rate *Romper Stomper* (1992) and its family of neo-Nazis, fearing copycat violence towards Asian immigrants, he says, "Ironically my non-score created free publicity, adding to the notoriety around the film".

David thinks Australian crime films are distinctive in that they're bedded in ordinary domesticity. Think *Chopper* (2000), *Animal Kingdom* (2010) and *Snowtown* (2011). "Lawbreakers are seen as part of the family unit," he says.

One of Australia's most famous real-life anti-heroes is Ned Kelly, and David takes in *The Story of the Kelly Gang* (1906), the first feature film made in the world. It "symbolizes the anti-authoritarian myth that forms a core of our (Australian) identity" and pre-dates Hollywood.

David's favourite Australian film, *Newsfront* (1978), features one of two rival brothers selling out to Hollywood. "Film projectors project so much more than stories," says David. "They beam our identity and values and ultimately our dreams."

The Good Karma Hospital

Set in a coastal town in tropical South India, the sixpart series, **The Good Karma Hospital** tells the story of junior doctor, Ruby Walker (Amrita Acharia),



who arrives in India looking for a job and a distraction from her heartbreak. She anticipates the sunshine, the palm trees, and picture-perfect beaches. She's even prepared for the sacred cows, the tuk-tuks and the Delhi-belly that everyone warned her about. What she doesn't expect are the realities of work, life and even love at an under-resourced and over-worked cottage hospital.

Tests reveal Pearl's (Zoe Terakes) friend overdosed on the same drug that contributed to her brother Tyler's death. Janet (Marta Dusseldorp) suspects that Pearl may be trying to sell it, and with that goes the NCC's best chance of getting inside the betting network. Janet manages to track her down moments before she meets her buyer, thwarting Pearl's plan to use the money to pay for her own place and condemning her to continue to live with Flynn (Andrew Ryan) – the exact situation Janet is trying to prevent.

Pearl is now confronted with the fact that the drug that led to Tyler's death is the same one she stole from Flynn, and Janet tries to convince her to report him to the police for sex with a minor. But is Janet solely concerned with Pearl's welfare? Or is it also an attempt to foster leverage on Flynn for her NCC reference?

With Nate Baldwin (Adam Demos) incarcerated, his wife Lucy (Marny Kennedy) struggles with her financial situation. Richard (Hamish Michael) offers to help, but as he digs through the Baldwins' accounts, it becomes clear that Lucy has no monetary freedom – a clear case of financial abuse. As Lucy accepts the truth of her situation, coupled with Nate's potentially lengthy prison sentence, she finds herself becoming more intimate with Richard. But with the drug now recovered, Nate Baldwin stands a high chance of acquittal ...

Meanwhile, evidence is growing that Maxine Reynolds (Susie Porter) is the major profit-taker, and the likelihood she ran Eddie Cooke (Kenneth Moraleda) off the road. That is, until the Northern Devils' coach confesses he crashed into Eddie, enraged that he refused to tell him the truth about the drug he was giving to his players. But Maxine is no innocent, as it's discovered she was the person who signalled Oliver Pittman to bowl the uncalled wide.

With Maxine's involvement in the betting network all but confirmed, the NCC race to find her, but are they too late. Has she fled? Or has she met a more sinister fate?

The hit UK police thriller is back, taking another probing look at modern policing and corruption within the force.

Daniel Mays (Common, Public Enemies) plays Sergeant Danny Waldron, the highly proficient leader of an Armed Response Unit whose unpredictable behaviour is becoming a threat to colleagues and suspects. When AC-12 are called in to investigate Danny's conduct, even they could find themselves in the firing line.

Mays joins returning cast Martin Compston (Sweet Sixteen) as DS Steve Arnott, Vicky McClure (This is England) as DC Kate Fleming and Adrian Dunbar (Ashes to Ashes) as Superintendent Ted Hastings.

Tonight, the shooting at the drug house intensifies the scrutiny on Danny's team, who once again close ranks. But with DC Kate Fleming (Vicky McClure) on the inside, AC12 feed in new information that helps her expose cracks in the team's story, but with tragic consequences.
