Jack Irish

Emmy Award-winner Guy Pearce reprises his iconic role as Jack Irish, former criminal lawyer, and part-time debt collector, with a penchant for getting wrapped up in things he shouldn't.

The bluebird of happiness has stopped warbling and Jack's life has hit a new low. His body broken from too many beatings, Linda has left him, the racing world is in turmoil, his local – the Prince of Prussia – may never be the same again and Jack has returned to the law in the form of mundane conveyancing. That is, until he learns of foreign students at a disreputable private college dying in bizarre circumstances.

After Eddie (George Zhao), a Chinese courier who was supposed to deliver a package for Jack three years ago, shows up dead, Jack can't help but get involved. Following the trail of Eddie's last movements, Jack discovers Eddie's friend, an Indian student named Lakshmi (Rubi Balasingam), committed suicide shortly before Eddie disappeared. They studied together at a private college where the facilities and level of education leave much to be desired.



Digging deeper, Jack encounters the psychiatrist Lakshmi saw before her tragic death, Dr Rory Finch (Danielle Cormack). As they both work to discover the truth behind the two deaths, a relationship brews between Jack and Rory.

Jack's investigation unfolds an intricate web of lies leading all the way to India and back again, where he enlists Linda's help (Marta Dusseldorp), still working overseas as a journalist and living with Orton (Jacek Koman). But every step Jack takes towards the truth threatens his world and his friends – from Harry (Roy Billing) and Cam (Aaron Pedersen) in the racing game, to cabinetmaker Charlie Taub's granddaughter, Gus (Tiarnie Coupland), to the Prince of Prussia run by Stan (Damien Garvey) and his regular clientele, the Fitzroy Youth Club. Jack must keep his wits about him, or this quest for the truth may be his last.

Jack Irish is a former criminal lawyer with a penchant for getting wrapped up in things he shouldn't. The apparent suicide of a foreign student triggers a chain of events that sees Jack risking his life to uncover the truth.

Adapted from the novel Grace Beside Me by Sue McPherson, this series is a 13-part live action series about an extraordinary Indigenous girl trying to lead an ordinary life. It combines whimsy, adventure, comedy and drama and takes audiences on an emotional roller coaster ride, following Fuzzy Mac, as she learns to accept her gift and understand the meaning of 'grace'.

Fuzzy's life is turned upside down on her 13th birthday when she discovers she can communicate with spirits! It's hard enough navigating the highs and lows of becoming a teenager while living with your eccentric Nan and Pop. Throw in a host of needy spirits, mischievous totems and spooky ancestors, and you have a recipe for a whole lot of trouble!

You Can't Ask That

Do you want to kill me? Aren't you just a fame whore? Where do you hide your dick? What's it like watching the love of your life get pounded? How much did you lie? What batshit crazy things did they make you do? Has it completely ruined your life? are just a few of the tough questions being asked in series 3 of **You Can't Ask That.**

This proudly homegrown ABC original format, puts misunderstood and marginalised Australians front and centre. The series confronts prejudice and discrimination by offering searing insights into the lives of diverse Australians who live in judgement. By asking only the hard questions and allowing interviewees to answer in their own words with conviction, candour, fervour and humour, the series adds new voices and fresh perspectives to subjects often dismissed.

You Can't Ask That series 3, will feature the first-person voices of survivors of sexual assault, exreality TV stars, former cult members, people with eating disorders, swingers, people living with schizophrenia, drag performers and priests. The series shines a light into all corners of Australian culture and identity, uncovering unique perspectives rarely heard with such honesty or clarity.

In the opening episode of **You Can't Ask That**, eight women and men tell their deeply personal stories of sexual assault – sharing what happened, how people reacted, whether or not they got justice and what they did to recover. Empowering and affirming, the unique format of **You Can't Ask That** adds surprising, new, and accessible perspectives into the conversations already occurring worldwide. 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Back In Time For Dinner

In each of the series' seven episodes, this food-loving Australian family of five is throwing away its culinary comforts and kitchen appliances, smartphones and snapchat, and is turning its backs on its 21st Century lifestyle. The Ferrones are embarking on an extraordinary time-travelling adventure from 1950 to the future, to discover how the way we shopped, cooked, and ate has shaped our modern-day lives.

In the final episode of *Back in Time for Dinner*, after travelling 60 years back in time, the Ferrone family will now get a glimpse into the years to come. But what the future holds, nobody can definitively say! We can, however, be guided by research, statistics and projections, in order to understand what may likely be on our dinner plates in decades to come.

The family members enter their renovated home for the last time. Internet connection is paramount, and the house is full of devices. Even the cat is automated! Women still assume the lion's share of the housework, but Carol's new robotic vacuum cleaner helps cut down the manual labour. Virtual reality headsets have the kids wrapped up in their own simulated worlds. Meal times are a concoction of surprises. Peter and Julian trick the girls with their vegan burgers, Annabel surprises the family with edible bugs, and Carol flinches at the thought of serving her family qummies for dinner.

The girls take a trip to Western Sydney Uni's glasshouse to learn about food sustainability and Julian and Carol gear up for a backyard beekeeping lesson. Annabel informs the family that to venture into the future, we need to understand our past, so she sends them to meet chef Matt Moran, who incorporates local Indigenous ingredients in his dishes. Annabel then joins the Ferrones on a trip to the Royal Botanic Gardens to learn about Indigenous bush foods. Food shopping incorporates technology but dips its hat to the 50s as Carol sees the re-emergence of local shops and produce. Around 50 per cent of Australians claim to incorporate superfoods in their diet, so Carol and Peter head out to try the newest coffee... an algae latte. Facial recognition technology is used to take their order, and Carol questions the impact it will have on privacy in the future. With obesity set to be still on the rise, fitness guru Commando steps in to help the Ferrones take control of their fitness and pave the way for healthy habits. Carol is shocked that Julian completes the final fitness challenge, and Olivia is happy to be playing with her family again. The experiment comes to an end and Annabel joins the family for their final meal together. They reflect on the past seven weeks, which have been both emotional and life changing.

Short Synopsis

After travelling 60 years back in time, the Ferrones forge into the future and get a glimpse of what may likely be on our plates. The family also reflect on the impact the experiment has had on their lives.

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Back Roads

ABC News presenter Joe O'Brien visits the tiny Queensland town of Thallon. Joe grew up in regional Queensland, and he gladly leaves the studio behind to head into the outback.

Thallon is a little town on the brink. At one point, even the town's only pub was at risk of closing. But Thallon dug in, refusing to give up, and has come up with some big ideas to rescue their town.

Leanne Brosnan is a woman who doesn't let challenges stop her. She came to Thallon as an energetic school teacher 31 years ago and fell in love with a local wool classer. But just before they married, a terrible accident changed the course of their lives and they eventually had to leave Thallon. When Leanne saw that her old home town was in trouble she wanted to repay the community for all that it had done for her. She talked friends and family into buying the Thallon pub and has spearheaded other projects to put Thallon on the map. Locals all agree that if it wasn't for Leanne Brosnan, their little town may not still exist.

Wayne Lasserre grew up in Thallon and worked on the railway line for 26 years. He watched on as his once bustling home town slowly started to die. First the passenger trains stopped coming, businesses shut their doors and the railway depot closed. Population decline, drought and flood have all taken their toll on the town. Wayne is a Kamilaroi man and he works for local farmer Bill Willis. Bill is a third-generation farmer whose family owns Bullamon Plains station on the outskirts of Thallon. Around Thallon, you don't often see Bill Willis without his mate Wayne. Bill plans to be buried near his grandfather and he's offered Wayne a spot in the family plot. But Wayne jokes that he's yet to make up his mind if he'll accept the offer, because working together for 40 years might just be long enough!

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Everyone's A Critic

This week the critics visit the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV), Melbourne. Founded in 1861, the NGV is the oldest and most visited gallery in Australia. The NGV collection contains 70,000 works, valued at \$3.6 billion.

The critics universally like their first encounter **Carved Retable of the Passion of Christ** (c.1511-1520). Created by the Antwerp **Guild** of St Luke, in modern day Belgium, this altarpiece tells the story of Jesus from his birth to resurrection. The critics' discussion quickly leads to religion and the value of believing. Next is Pablo Picasso's **Weeping Woman** (1937). Whilst most have seen or know of this piece, not many have seen it in real life. After this initial recognition, our critics start to analyse her face, the crying and pain, and wonder what is behind this iconic painting.

Portrait of Anne Charlotte of Lorraine, Mademoiselle de Brionne (1755–1786), as Diana, bust-length (1775) by Élisabeth-Louise Vigée-Le Brun, is a classic 18th Century portrait of aristocrat Anne Charlotte of Lorraine. Critique of this artwork centred around being a woman in that era and the perceived lack of independence. Phantom Landscape in which Yang Yongliang practices Shan shui, is an ancient Chinese art of landscape painting that dates back to the 5th century. The critics really see the mix between old and new here, and appreciate the old traditions mixed with modern art.

Anguish is by Danish born August Friedrich Albrecht Schenck. Everyone gets a strong feeling of sadness and emotion from this artwork that represents animals with human characteristics.
