




# LET THE MAGIC OF WINTER COME OVER YOU

### LIV SANSOZ, THE MOUNTAI THROUGH AN **HROUGH**

A prodigious climber, experienced mountaineer, passionate paraglider and seasoned skier, Liv Sansoz has made the mountains of Savoie Mont Blanc her playground. And her home. Being one with the mountains. On a rockface most of the time, but also descending a snow-covered mountainside on skis or flying high above under a paraglider, or simply walking through the snow. This is the life of Liv Sansoz, born in Bourg-Saint-Maurice, raised within a ski lift's span of the resorts of Savoie and Haute Savoie and steeped in tales of the climbing exploits of Bonatti, Messner and Rebuffat, In a decade of competitive rock climbing, Liv has racked up some 50 podium places.

She now lives in Chamonix Valley-Mont Blanc, where she recently won her spurs as a fully qualified mountain guide, a role in which she can pass on her passion for the mountains. What makes her tick? Glacial landscapes and jagged peaks outlined against the sky, sheer walls of granite or limestone, the babbling of a mountain brook, the view from the summit and the sunrise that greets her in her mountain-top bivvy.

"I like being outdoors, in touch with nature. My approach to the mountains is softly, softly," says the supremely athletic multiple world rock climbing champion, who likes to experiment with every possible way of going up and coming down a mountain. In 2017, after completing the world's finest and most

challenging climbs, she decided to attempt every one of the 82 four-thousand-metre peaks in the European Alps - without using any ski lifts and descending on skis or by paraglider. "I wanted to do something befitting the kind of person I am, that ties in with my values and my take on

the mountains. The idea was not to achieve an exploit but to rediscover the wilder side of the mountains and remind myself I have an unlimited playground accessible from where I live. It also gave me the opportunity to climb summits I didn't know." This adventure, shared with some 20 different climbing companions along the way, taught her a lot, "You never stop learning from the mountains. You learn a lot about yourself, and about others too. At altitude, there's no filter: you face the unvarnished truth. You're in incredible natural surroundings. That gives you energy but also involves an element of risk. You have to approach the mountains with a lot of humility, tame them and keep a cool head, aware of your abilities and limits and those of your climbing companions, keeping an eye on the weather, taking the right gear, preparing thoroughly..." says Liv, who advocates climbing with a guide to enable you to tap in to everything that fascinates about the mountains.

All too aware of the impact of climate change on our mountains, in 2020, Liv - who was already working with Protect Our Winter and Mountain Riders - cofounded the association 'Une Bouteille à la Mer', which encourages outdoor brands to reduce their use of plastics in packaging and creates visual campaigns to raise public awareness of climate change. She is currently taking part in an air quality data collection campaign in the mountain areas where she spends time. For Liv, Savoie Mont Blanc is simply where she belongs. It is here that she gets her energy, working tirelessly to educate everyone around her about just how fragile the mountains are - but also about the endless joy of immersing yourself in the Great Outdoors here.

# GET SHIVERS DOWN YOUR SPINE





Plunging into icy water releases endorphins, which relieves stress, reduces anxiety, and increases one's general sense of wellbeing. Find out for yourself in Samoëns, the new capital of swimming in icy water – a growing sport that may well make it into the Olympic Games in 2026. The Grand Massif resort, which only last winter welcomed the world champions in the sport, offers training sessions in the Lac au Dames, ranging from a simple cold dip lasting 10 to 20 minutes to a full-on experience comprising breath control, walking and bathing, lasting 90 minutes to two hours. You emerge feeling more alive in body and mind.

Or at Saint Pierre d'Entremont, in the Chartreuse Mountains, Delphine offers revitalising bathing sessions in a cold river.

### **ICE DIVE WITHOUT EQUIPMENT**

Dressed warmly in a thick neoprene wetsuit, enjoy a magical dive into the silent blue icy world of the Lac de Tignes. An experienced guide will teach you to manage your breathing and the cold in order to be fully present in the moment. You can also take part in this intoxicating sensory experience at the Lac de Lou in Les Menuires and the Lac de Montriond near Morzine and Avoriaz.

### **EXPERIENCE EXTREME COLD**

In Evian-les-Bains with its famous thermal baths, cold is held to have many benefits. Used at a moderate level (from -5 to -9°C) for 45 to 60 minutes, it banishes mental fatigue and stimulates the metabolism. Alternatively, there's cryotherapy, which means exposing the body to extreme cold (down to -150°C) for a very short time (3 minutes) to boost oxygenisation and cellular activity, detoxify the body and promote healing. The technique is on offer in the resorts of Méribel, at the Antarès Wellness Clinic, and Courchevel, at Aquamotion.

### MAKE LIKE A MONK WITH SOME COLD YOGA

Invented on the high plateaux of the Himalayas, Toumo or cold yoga is used by Tibetan monks to counter glacial temperatures. The ancient practice has now made its way to Les Saisies, where Hélène, yogi and mountain guide, offers snowshoeing followed by a yoga session in the snow, allowing you to discover the power of your inner fire. You can also do this in Courchevel, Méribel or Le Grand-Bornand, pushing the limits of your resistance to the cold and unleashing a wave of happiness hormones.

### FLOAT ON THE ICE LAPPISH STYLE

A quirky form of meditation popular in Lapland, ice floating consists of lying flat, swaddled in a fat wetsuit, in water of about 5°C. Try it in the Lac du Lou in Les Menuires, by moonlight or candlelight. Both body and soul relax within moments.

This method of immersing yourself in nature is also available in Val Cenis and Val d'Isère.

### **GO OUT LOOKING FOR WILDLIFE**

In Les Gets, mountain quide and amateur ornithologist Dominique will teach you all the secrets of mountain wildlife during her family-friendly snowshoe excursions - great opportunities to learn about environmental responsibility and the protection of the mountain environment.

The same reverence for nature is the inspiration for two excursions in the Bauges natural regional park: The 'Preservation of Local Wildlife' walk in the Cœur de Tarentaise, and outings to observe endemic alpine species in Praz de Lys-Sommand.

### **HORSE-RIDING BY STARLIGHT**

In the mountains the nights are just as gorgeous as the days, which is why resorts are increasing the number of night-time activities. In Pralognan-la-Vanoise, the Ranch de l'Ancolie organises horse-riding beneath the stars for both beginners and experienced riders.

In this same mountain village, Thierry offers fun workshops teaching you to recognise the stars, planets, and constellations. accompanied by short sessions in how to photograph the night sky. You'll come away with personalised souvenir photos. Other astronomy evenings are offered in Arêches-Beaufort, Saint-Jean-de-Sixt and the Alpes du Léman (in French only).

### **GO ON AN ADVENTURE BY PULKA SLEDGE**

In the Chartreuse Mountains, Alpes Ascensions offers you the chance become a trapper for two days. Linked to a pulka containing their belongings, wearing snowshoes, and led by a guide, adventurers explore the massif from the Désert d'Entremont to a site specially set up for building an igloo for the night. Once the encampment is set up, there's a welldeserved campfire and fondue by moonlight. At first light, the adventure continues with some wildlife viewing, before you head back to civilisation with memories that will last a lifetime.

### **SPEND THE NIGHT IN A MOUNTAIN REFUGE**

A hike up to a mountain hut to spend the night there is one of those quintessential mountain experiences that people fantasise about. Departing from Tignes with a qualified, highly experienced quide from Oxygène ski school, you'll head up to a cosy high-altitude refuge wearing Nordic skis or a splitboard. Still dazzled by the stunning landscapes you've traversed, you'll get to savour a well-deserved Savoie meal before sinking into a reviving sleep in your room.

### **SPEND THE NIGHT ON A GLACIER**

This mind-blowing descent of the legendary Vallée Blanche beneath a full moon is a true fairytale experience for highly experienced skiers, who descend 20km and 2000m between ice ridges and crevasses, amidst the peaks and spires of the Mont Blanc massif. Led by the high-mountain guides of the Compagnie des Guides de Chamonix, the descent ends with a warming dinner in the Refuge du Requin. The same Compagnie des Guides offers a night's camping on the Glacier du Géant at the heart of the Vallée Blanche.

### **A SUNSET WALK**

Like sunrise, sunset is a special moment for connecting with the elements and meditating. At Les Saisies, you start with a gentle showshoe walk, followed by breathing exercises then a moon-themed meditation session led by a mountain quide, to relax and revitalise you. Reconnected with the nature around you, you'll come away with a great feeling of mental and physical tranquility.

# DISCOVER NEW PISTES

### **FOLLOW WINTER TRAILS**

Whether you're an occasional or a frequent runner, running in snow allows you to improve your technique and endurance in pristine nature. You'll discover unique sensations in Samoëns during half days out with a mountain guide.

In Praz-de-Lys Sommand, Vincent offers an 'off-piste' white trail in snowshoes, allowing you to venture into semi-virgin spaces.

In Arêches-Beaufort, a Nordic skiing mecca, swap the chairlift for skis fitted with synthetic seal skins in introductory sessions run in partnership with Dynafit during the school holidays, including trail loops, guided outings, and safety and best practice advice.

The joy of skiing and climbing combined is also available in Cluses Arves in training by high-mountain guide Olivier, and in Bessans, with Thibault Anselmet, 2023 world champion in ski mountaineering.

### **WORK ON YOUR TURNS**

An ancient nordic sport, telemark has had a resurgence, and this winter, in Méribel, skiers seduced by the elegance of the style can learn it with Chris, Phil and Sven Lau, a trio of award-winning champions. Alternatively, at Les Contamines-Montjoie, the Association Val Montjoie Télémark organises sessions for beginners or improvers all through the winter, including week-long workshops in how to move fluidly on all kinds of terrain. Morillon in the Haut Giffre and Peisey-Vallandry are also turning to telemark with fun half-day initiation sessions.

### **GO AGAINST THE CURRENT**

Less strenuous than climbing frozen waterfalls, ruisseling consists of ascending frozen streams using crampons and ice axes. This highly immersive nature experience can be enjoyed in Les Contamines-Montjoie, where staff at the guides office get you familiar you with the tools before you set out on one of several secret itineraries at the heart of the national nature reserve of Les Contamines, the highest in all France.

And in Samoëns, walkers can climb frozen streams and rivers wearing snowshoes.

# **ROMAIN TR**

Visionary founder and managing director of the Assas Hotels group, Romain Trollet has come up with a hotel philosophy that breaks with convention to provide a true mountain experience.

> Ensuring that guests enjoy a shared experience - together. That's the ambition that drives Romain

Trollet, a graduate of EHL Hospitality Business School in Lausanne and founder of Assas Hotels in 2011. "People who choose the mountains for their holiday destination want to share something with others: time, activities, encounters, experiences," he says. To meet this need, he came up with the idea of hotels that lend themselves to experience-sharing.

**WHAT MAKES YOU COME BACK TO A HOTEL, IS THE WAY YOU WERE TREATED** 

Places that offer much more than just a bed for the night, where guests can tap in to a social environment with their family, friends or colleagues and create shared memories. "When we opened the Heliopic in Chamonix-Mont-Blanc back in 2013, the mountain hotel industry was still essentially family-run and poorly structured," says Romain. "Our idea was to bring something different to

A champion of the philosophy of bringing people together to enjoy a shared experience, a value that is typical of mountain people, Romain creates unusual and appealing social spaces, where a quest arriving in the vast lobby is offered a coffee before being asked for their credit card details; where the spaces are designed so that groups of people can sit and spend time together. Like at the Araucaria in La Plagne, which boasts a 1.000m<sup>2</sup> social space that includes a cocktail bar, stage with piano, children's play area and games for adults too. Lively places with the feel of a large family home, where coffee and cakes are served to guests returning from the pistes while their kids are having fun with facepainting. Keen to "provide a brand-new customer experience," Romain encourages guests to meet the locals - like at the Heliopic where, every morning and evening, quides and mountain professionals pop along to share a hot drink with holidaymakers. Because the mountains are different to other places, and venturing out there requires a certain level of trust. "We run mountain hotels from the mountains. So it's important to us that our hotels embrace the culture of the Alps." It's a view shared by all the hotel staff, aware of the importance of providing the kind of welcome that reflects the strong mountain tradition of hospitality. "You might first come to a hotel because of the pictures you've seen on social media, but what makes you come back is the way you were treated when you were here the time before," says Romain. And that applies to the local residents too. "Our hotels have to appeal to different kinds of guests and adapt to the locations they adopt so that they become an integral part of local life." For example, whereas the Araucaria is firmly aimed at the family-friendly end, the RockyPop Hotels in Flaine and Les Houches apply a more unusual, financially accessible approach. In Val Thorens, the Hôtel Marielle, which has taken over

### BE COSSETED IN A MOUNTAIN CHALET WITH A SPA

From an ancient farm chalet belonging to his family, Philippe Carteron has created a remote and timeless refuge inspired by the spirit of sharing and helping others that is so dear to mountain dwellers. Tucked away in alpine meadows between the Beauregard plateau and Aravis mountains, this charming 1787 building has a refined but authentic ambiance in its blend of antique and flea-market finds with modern tech. It includes newly created B&B suites sleeping two, four or six, a separate hut in an old storehouse, a spa with a new massage and relaxation room, and a restaurant serving mountain recipes based on dishes by Philippe's grandmother. It's very much a place for serenity and for letting go.

### STAY IN AN ICONIC BUILDING

Like a lighthouse, the legendary Montenvers refuge has been watching over the Mer de Glace glacier since 1880. Built facing the Aiguille Verte, the Drus and the Aiguilles Rouges to accommodate the first downhill skiers and 'glacier tourists', this venue up at 1913m is a gem of alpine heritage, with a granite facade and red-painted shutters evoking the heyday of mountain exploration but also embracing modern comforts. It's a unique experience you should pair with a visit to the ice cave reached by a new cable-car opened as part of the development of the Montenvers-Mer de Glace site. From December 2024, there will also be the new Centre d'interprétation du Climat et des Glaciers du Montenvers, an immersive museum looking at glaciers, their history and how they have fared under climate change, but from this winter you can also learn about the impact of climate change from guides.

### CHECK OUT A HOTEL AND BAR WITH A 1960S VIBE

The first hotel in Avoriaz and a major work by visionary architect Jacques Labro, the Hôtel des Dromonts can be recognised by its unique architecture in the shape of a pine cone. It's home to one of the hippest bars in the ski resort, open to all: Le 67, named for the year this ski resort was created, serving vintage cocktails (Dirty Martini, Bloody Mary, Speakeasy 70s...) amidst 1960s-inspired decor.

### SPEND THE NIGHT IN AN AUTHENTIC FARM


With its typical mountain decor and warm family atmosphere, this old Beaufortain farm converted into a hotel has a comforting charm. Nestled at the foot of the pistes, La Ferme du Chozal, also famous for its high-end cuisine, offers 12 elegant rooms and suites, one in a converted storehouse, plus a wellbeing zone and a cosy library where one can swot up on the glory days of the mountain pioneers.

### STAY IN A HAVEN OF FAMILY NOSTALGIA

In 2013, cousins Valérie and Audrey took on the hotel that had been created by their ancestors in the heart of Val d'Isère, transforming it into a cocoon of 17 guestrooms with sturdy wooden furnishings and reupholstered antique armchairs, plus a huge family-friendly dining room serving recipes handed down by their grandmother, decorated by old family photos.

### **GO REMOTE**

At the top of the Joux Plane pass, Chalet Mappelet is in the middle of nowhere in the commune of Samoëns. An old summer camp turned into a cosseting nest, it has a vast living room with an imposing chimney, a double room, a seven-space dorm, and a bathroom carved out of the rock. It's the perfect spot for absorbing the silence and splendour of the mountains.

### **STAY IN A HIP REFUGE**

In the commune of Le Grand Bornand, perched at 2,164m on a cliff overlooking the valley, Refuge Gramusset is famous for its sunset views and Natura 2000 listed limestone surroundings. Also known as the Refuge de la Pointe Percée, it's been fully renovated to offer 46 beds: 36 in a new chalet and 10 in the historic hut built in 1928 by the Club Alpin Français, which has also been refurbished. An ideal base camp for ski touring skiers, it's one of very few refuges open and staffed in winter.

### **FIND A HAVEN OF PEACE**

At the heart of the Vallée des Belleville, 30 minutes on foot (or by snowshoe) from civilisation, this authentic former milk storehouse has been transformed into cosy lodgings for four. A tiny meadow chalet of stone and wood, it's a dream location for simple pleasures far from the crowds: a digital detox, contemplation, feasting on fondue and hot-tubbing beneath the stars.

### LEARN TO MAKE AN OLD-FASHIONED TOBOGGAN

In the Haut-Giffre, Jérôme Guillot, a highly creative carpenter, has a passion for parets - one-person wooden toboggans in the form of a stool attached to a single wooden ski. They were once used by children to move around the Vallée de Manigod in winter. Guillot has already made more than 450 parets, which he personalises by request. In Chambéry Montagnes, you can take part in a paret-making workshop and take the finished product home with you.

### **CHURN YOUR OWN OLD-STYLE BUTTER**

Aside excellent cheeses, milk from Savoie farms has always been used to produce tasty alpine butter. The Musée d'Oé in Aussois has put its churn back to use in sessions during which some of the elderly folk of the village will teach you to make their butter, which you can then taste on bread from a local baker.

### **BENEFIT FROM LOCAL HERITAGE**

The new Pépites en Chartreuse, Patrimoine et Savoir-faire route unites a network of artisans, farmers, and cultural venues keen to share their passions. Among them are Charlotte and Marion of Champs du Pain, who set up their oven in the old schoolhouse in Saint-Même le Bas in the Chartreuse massif. Their organic natural-sourdough bread is sold on site and from a van that does the rounds of the villages. In Entremont-le-Vieux, Pierre, one of the last wood-turners in the Chartreuse massif, shares his secrets in wood-turning and sculpture lessons in his Peter Pan Bois workshop.



- Maxime Bonnevie. His restaurant René, named for his epicurean grandfather, is hidden away amidst larches and arolla pines, beside the piste of the off-the-beaten track Combe du Fornet near Val d'Isère. Its speciality is charcoal grills.

- Alban Chanteloup and Aymeric Velluz.
   Their 20-head restaurant Choral in a quiet part of Annecy has a small but appealing menu and wines from sustainably minded small producers.
- Adrien Lavorel and Enzo Duchesne.
  Their restaurant Le Bourgeon has
  blossomed in the heart of the medieval
  town of Alby-sur-Chéran, with a menu
  showcasing seasonal produce with low

  black garlic). Wines are original, eclectic

### THE SAVOIE MONT BLANC EXCELLENCE NETWORK NOW INCLUDES HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS.

For a venue to be accepted, it has to show real commitment to its region, to a circular economy (one based on sharing, leasing, reusing, repairing, refurbishing and recycling) and to sustainable tourism.

Today six hotels and restaurants have been accepted and two others are being assessed. (pro.savoie-mont-blanc.com).



### A SUSTAINABLE COLLABORATION

They have the same values, so it was natural for Agence Savoie Mont Blanc and Haute-Savoie herbal-tea brand Les 2 Marmottes to join forces to create the new blend Tout Schuss. It's part of a larger project that has included Les 2 Marmottes donating €10,000 to the Demain Savoie Mont Blanc endowment fund set up by Essentiem. This sum is intended to support initiatives to collect rubbish in the resorts at the end of winter, and to raise awareness of biodiversity in the Parc de la Vanoise from summer 2024.

### **MOVING INTO THE FUTURE**

France's first 'intelligent' zip-wire is arriving in Valloire. Able to slow down or speed up to vary the intensity, as well as electrically recharging during the 1,380m descent (300m in terms of altitude), the new zip-line can also go back up the slope by itself and position itself at the starting point.
