Barrenjoey Road

The true crime story of Barrenjoey Road begins with the mystery of 18 year old Trudie Adams' disappearance 40 years ago and leads to the dark heart of Australia now: high-level corruption, cover-ups, massive drug deals and many murders in which the bodies have not remained hidden. It reveals the underbelly of sunny Australia, the mongrel beneath relaxed and comfortable lifestyles from the late 70's to the present.

In Episode 1 of this three part series, we learn how outgoing, intelligent and much-loved Trudie Adams went missing from Sydney's seemingly idyllic Northern Beaches on June 24, 1978. Weeks away from a trip to Bali, she went out on Saturday night with friends to the local pub, then on to the surf lifesaving club. She was last seen hitchhiking on Barrenjoey Road.

ABC Reporter Ruby Jones' encounter with the last detective to work on the case alerts her to the scale of the story: a series of potentially related rapes, a massive police response but also inexplicable gaps in their investigations, drugs and high-level corruption. Ruby teams up with highly experienced crime reporter Neil Mercer whose connections in the criminal world and knowledge of late 70s and 80s Sydney underworlds she hopes will help her make progress.

Together they investigate the night Trudie disappeared and the account of the last known person to see her alive, ex-boyfriend Stephen Norris. They explore confusion about the car that picked up Trudie and suspicions from Trudie's Mum that her daughter was being pressured to carry drugs back from Bali in the next few weeks.

Short synopsis

Soon after Trudie Adams disappeared, young women begin to come forward and report being taken from Barrenjoey Road and raped. The investigators' search for the truth leads them from Trudie's ex-boyfriend to a pack of wild young men and one very dangerous criminal.

Pine Gap

As Kath, Ethan and Rudi find themselves no closer to uncovering the Pine Gap mole, Jasmina's recent discovery of Boyle's email correspondence with the Prime Minister has rattled the Australian side of the executive floor. Jasmina is torn – her loyalty to Australia is strong but so is her desire to make her growing relationship with Gus one free of secrets.

Deciding to commit to Gus, she comes clean and tells him that Boyle's email reveals Australia is seriously considering a Treaty of Neutrality with China. The Set

Australia has just scored itself a new live music TV series like no other. Hosted by triple j's Linda Marigliano and Dylan Alcott, *The Set* will make its debut during Ausmusic Month this November, kicking off on 31 October at 9.30pm on ABC and iview.

The show will feature performances from some of the biggest and very best Australian artists of the moment, to a live audience of 250 people who've come to join the party. Angus and Julia Stone, Vera Blue, Ball Park Music, and The Presets will be stopping by – and they're bringing their mates.

Across the series, headline artists will curate the line-up for each program by inviting two guest acts to perform live. They'll then close out the show with a special one-off musical collaboration. Ask The Doctor - Stress Relief

Stress is the body's natural response to pressure, when faced with challenging or even dangerous situations. Not all stress is a bad thing. A little can help performance, but if we have too much stress it can have a negative impact on our mood, behaviour and physical health - and many of us don't realise how stressed we actually are. Chronic or ongoing stress has long been known to increase the risks of high blood pressure, addiction, anxiety and depression.

Sandro admits he's 'a bit of a stress head', but what effect is stress having on his body? He becomes a lab rat in a Deakin University experiment to find out, by submitting to a series of humiliating and stressful situations. It's as if his worst nightmares have come to life. The tests monitor how much his body reacts to stress in its initial fight or flight response, and then how much of the follow-up hormone cortisol is released. The results are hair-raising!

Caroline discovers a ground-breaking program called 'Burn to Learn' that's helping high school students manage stress. Professor David Lubans from the University of Newcastle in New South Wales is looking for a link between student fitness, cognitive performance and stress.

Meanwhile, Shalin examines the difference between acute stress and chronic stress. One reduces hunger, the other leads to binge eating. Comfort food is officially 'a thing', but giving in to it isn't good idea. Shalin shows the best way to combat this.

After his earlier stress test, Sandro embraces some stress-busting moves to try out at home, many of them easy and free - which won't add to money stresses at least.

Australia's Lost Impressionist

Australia's Lost Impressionist – John Russell tells the fascinating story behind the only Australian artist at the centre of the Impressionist movement in France and how his famous friendships forever changed the way the world sees colour.

John Russell (1858-1930) painted in France alongside Claude Monet, he mentored Henri Matisse and was a close friend of Vincent Van Gogh. Russell exhibited at the 1905 Salon d'Automne in Paris and his work



entered the Louvre collection in 1949. Russell's portrait of Van Gogh was purchased by the Van Gogh Museum, Amsterdam in 1938 and is documented as Van Gogh's favourite.

In 2017, director Catherine Hunter, cameraman Bruce Inglis, AGNSW curator Wayne Tunnicliffe and author Sarah Turnbull travelled to Belle-Ile, the charming windswept island off Brittany where Russell lived for 20 years. The island is virtually unchanged since the 1800s. The beguiling coastline of Belle-Ile was a continual source of inspiration for Russell and his contemporaries.

Australia's Lost Impressionist explores Russell's intriguing life through the eyes of a new generation of Australian painters as they discover Russell for themselves. Highly respected contemporary artists Luke Sciberras and Euan Macleod travelled with the crew to Belle-Ile and the film documents their interpretation of the island that so inspired Russell.

Russell was handsome, wealthy, debonair and being Australian, quite exotic in 19th Century France. Yet despite his own artistic accomplishments and his pivotal role in the development of modern art, his name and his art have been largely unrecognised outside rarefied art circles. This documentary explores his enormous legacy on 20th century art through his paintings and his friendships.

"We are in the throes of a mighty revolution in art. The gropers after truth. Men who are searching things for themselves seeking to render what they see and not what they know to exist are throwing up most old time conventions, as to rules of composition, sentiment, colour and they are drifting towards what is best in Impressionism." – John Russell letter to Tom Roberts, Antibes, late 1890 or early 1891

Actor Hugo Weaving features as the voice of John Russell who was a prolific letter writer especially to fellow artists Vincent van Gogh, Auguste Rodin and Tom Roberts. The intimate correspondence between Russell and his fellow artists is captivating and at times heartbreaking.

Christopher Riopelle from London's National Gallery, acclaimed author Sarah Turnbull and Head of Australian Art, Art Gallery of NSW and Russell exhibition curator, Wayne Tunnicliffe feature in the documentary together with the endearing voice of the great-granddaughter of Russell's housekeeper together with a number of other international art scholars. Especially notable is acclaimed Matisse biographer Hilary Spurling who says Matisse always credited Russell with explaining colour theory to him.

New South Wales finalist, John Le Messurier, ha led generations of scouts and volunteers as they transformed a former coal mine near Newcastle into a native plant retreat full of wildlife.

South Australian finalist, Brenton Roberts, used lots of money-saving ideas to restore a heritage cottage and garden in the Adelaide Hills to a semi-formal wonderland for his family.

West Australian finalist, Troy Devereux, loves the feel of Balinese gardens so much he has created his own tropical paradise in Perth, creating a haven full of colourful bromeliads, palms and other lush plants.

Victoria

The impulsive young queen faces the very modern challenge of balancing a growing family with her husband and her work - all while being the ruler of the most powerful nation on earth. As Victoria's (Jenna Coleman) reign continues into the 1840s, her kingdom is witness to extraordinatry events. Constitutional crises and scandalous romances blossoming at court; the rise of the Chartist movement; the devastating Irish Potato Famine; and perilous diplomatic relations that see Victoria travelling to France to try her hand at foreign policy.

Victoria and Albert (Tom Hughes) brave each trial on the world stage while also confronting profound personal changes. Facing down loss and betrayal against a dizzying backdrop of their expanding family, royal duties and an adventure to Scotland, they must renegotiate the balance of power in their passionate marriage if they are to thrive as the world's most influential partnership.

Episode One: "A Soldier's Daughter"

Queen Victoria surprises the court when she insists on returning to her duties shortly after giving birth. Adoring new father Albert decides not to trouble her with worrying news regarding British soldiers in Afghanistan, but as the reports worsen, Victoria grows increasingly suspicious that he and Prime Minister Robert Peel (Nigel Lindsay) are hiding something from her.

Victoria sets about reclaiming her place with characteristic impulsiveness, bringing in a formidable new Mistress of the Robes and demanding that her former chief cook, Francatelli (Ferdinand Kingsley), return to the palace kitchens. Her attempts to reassert control falter when her Coburg in-laws descend for the christening, their dynastic plotting only intensifying her sense of frustration. Convinced that the truth about Afghanistan is being kept from her, Victoria seeks answers from the Duke of Wellington (Peter Bowles), and what she learns creates a rift between her and Albert - a development that their sharp-eyed Uncle Leopold (Alex Jennings) is swift to detect.

Albert vehemently defends his decision to shield his wife from distressing news. Yet when the truth of Britain's catastrophic military failure hits London, it is Victoria who instinctively understands the steps they need to take to lift the nation's morale. Her boldness in the face of adversity reminds Albert of the woman he loves and leads them to a passionate reconciliation. But it's becoming clear that parenthood hasn't dimmed the force of either of their personalities: this is to be a devoted yet volatile union.
