Logline

An American brother and sister travel to Australia hoping to build a successful spray tan business, but a momentary lapse in judgment draws the siblings into the Sydney underworld. When the duo tries to escape by committing a tiny bit of murder, they must figure out how to stay alive, out of prison, and in the black.


Long Synopsis

American brother and sister, MARTIN and VICKI MARVIN have ventured to Australia to launch their fledgling spray tan company, Tansform. Travelling half-way across the world to start their business made sense – Australia has the highest skin cancer rate in the world and their spray tan market is exploding. Plus, it just happens to be where Martin's estranged wife, JOYCE, returned to after their marriage collapsed.

Martin, a cautious former risk analyst, is desperate to win his wife back by proving he's the bold, ambitious man she fell in love with 15 years ago. And for Vicki, whose life has been a case study in self-sabotage, starting a successful business is an opportunity to prove to her doubters – and to herself – that she's not destined to be a loser.

The duo is making real progress when Martin is targeted by con artist SUSI, leading to a deadly confrontation with her psychotic boss, KASH.

In the aftermath, Martin, Vicki, Susi, and exfooty-player-turned-enforcer, TERRY, cover



up their crimes by feeding Kash's body to a crocodile - which should allow the siblings to continue their spray tan journey now that nothing connects them to the murder. But, in what might be the most improbable turn in the history of the cosmetic industry, the poor reptile explodes and blows the evidence of their misdeed all over a golf course.

Making matters worse, Joyce, a journalist, picks up the story of the exploding croc, and joined by animal wrangler and amateur sleuth, NOVA, attempts to solve Sydney's most bizarre murder – an investigation that might lead her straight back to Martin.

And Joyce isn't the only one on the siblings' trail - Kash's unhinged, loan-shark sister, MONY, is fresh out of prison, and she really loves her brother. So, when she finds out someone's murdered him, things start to get very violent, very quickly.

As the season progresses, Martin and Vicki's attempts to turn their spray tan company from a start-up operating out of the back of a van into a million-dollar business become increasingly intertwined with Sydney's criminal underworld, forcing them to decide how far they're willing to go to achieve their dreams.



Episode I Transform With Tansform By Nick Keetch and Ty Freer

Martin and Vicki Marvin, American spray tan entrepreneurs, are dragged into the Sydney underworld when an extortion attempt turns deadly.

Synopsis

Siblings MARTIN and VICKI MARVIN have flown across the world with dreams of making their burgeoning spray tan company, Tansform, a success. It's the fresh start they both desperately need - Martin hopes building a successful company is the kind of daring gesture that will win back his estranged wife, JOYCE, and Vicki wants to prove she can be more than just an impulse-driven underachiever.

Arriving in Sydney for a Beauty Convention, the siblings check in to the extremely dodgy-looking Sunny Nights motel and quickly get to work trying to find a retail partner who will stock their spray tan.

But their plans are disrupted when Martin is rejected by Joyce, which leads to a drunken one-night-stand with SUSI KAMDANI, who just happens to be a con woman.

The next morning, footage of the tryst is used by criminal KASH MONROE to blackmail Martin. Told he needs to pay to keep the footage private, Martin and Vicki must find ten grand to get the extortionists off their backs and ensure that video is never seen by Joyce.

But Martin and Vicki's scramble to find the money only pulls them deeper into the Sydney underworld when they attempt to borrow the blackmail money from ex-footy-player-turned-standover-man, TERRY TORRES.

When the deal with Kash goes horribly awry, Martin, Vicki, Terry and Susi are forever entwined as they take extreme measures to destroy all evidence and cover their tracks.

But when an escaped crocodile explodes on a putting green, it exposes Martin and Vicki's transgressions, and they're left with a decision about how to move forward with their business as they face down the dangerous consequences of their actions.



Episode 2 Blinders on, Baby By Marieke Hardyr

On-edge and under-slept, Martin and Vicki attempt to secure a manufacturer for Tansform, only to discover the dramatic events of the previous night won't stay buried.

Synopsis

After the events of the previous night, MARTIN and VICKI are, to put it mildly, nervous. Determined to keep their focus on the business rather than the fatal encounter with an unstable criminal, they've found a potential Tansform manufacturer in footy die-hard, NUGGET FRASER, who can help them produce the cans of spray tan they need to fulfil a retail contract. But while they look towards the future, the sins of their recent past are catching up fast...

Because MONY MONROE, Kash's notoriously psychotic crime boss sister, has just been released from prison. Offended that her beloved brother didn't show up to welcome her back, Mony immediately turns her attention to tracking him down. Which is a disturbing turn for SUSI, who works for Mony, and, well-aware of the circumstances behind Kash's demise, is forced to divert her boss's attention in order to cover her tracks.

Meanwhile, JOYCE has begun an investigation into the events that led to the crocodile exploding. NOVATULUA, an enthusiastic reptile wrangler who discovered the grisly scene, lets slip that a tattooed human hand was found amongst the reptilian remains. When Joyce successfully squeezes Kash's name out of DETECTIVE BOULDER, she looks into his background, and becomes convinced that this

is a story that could reignite her journalism career. If only her editor, OLIVIA, would let her pursue it.

When Martin and Vicki hit a roadblock with their Nugget negotiations, they have no choice but to break their no-contact vow with TERRY, leading Martin to a surprising, and aggressive, moment of self-discovery.

Manufacturing deal secured, things are looking up again for the siblings. But when Mony's worst fears about Kash are confirmed by the police, she's set on a path of vengeance that can only end badly for Martin and Vicki.



Spisode 3 Not A Drug Drop, Roy By Lally Katz

Martin and Vicki celebrate as Tansform lands on shelves and make plans to ensure their retail trial at a pharmacy chain takes off, while Mony's quest for vengeance and Joyce's investigation both gain momentum.

Synopsis

It's official: Tansform has finally hit the hallowed shelves of retailer, Chemist Galore! MARTIN and VICKI are feeling great. Not only have they secured a trial deal with a national pharmacy, but Martin's making progress with Joyce, and Vicki's starting to think the company's success might get her the validation she craves from her mother back in the States.

But their excitement is short-lived when their retail buyer, HENLEY, explains they need to hit their sales targets quickly if they don't want to be relegated to the clearance aisle.

To promote Tansform they set up a free spraytan activation at Bondi Beach, but are soon booted off the boardwalk for not having the necessary permits.

While Martin races off to acquire a permit, Vicki decides to take matters into her own hands, and enlists the services of elderly (and slightly out of practice) pilot, ROY, to fly a Tansform banner across the beach.

And while Martin and Vicki are focused on advertising their company, a grieving MONY is coming to terms with her brother's death. In denial, Mony focuses her repressed anger on a debtor who owes her money, while SUSI and TERRY discuss a plan to avoid her discovering

their involvement - which becomes much more difficult when Mony announces a 75K reward to whoever brings her Kash's killer.

And to top it all off, JOYCE and NOVA start poking around Family Fun Time after linking Mony's rundown kiddie theme park to the dead man whose hand was found inside the crocodile that exploded. While scoping out the grounds, they discover an intriguing piece of evidence, solidifying the two as a team and further bolstering Joyce's theory that Kash was murdered - which is bad news for Martin and Vicki.



Episode 4 Next On The Board By Clare Sladden

Martin and Vicki are confronted by their corporate shortcomings, while Susi and Terry concoct a plan to keep Mony off their trail.

Synopsis

High off the unexpected success of their highstakes Bondi Beach publicity stunt, MARTIN and VICKI are quickly brought back to reality with a surprise visit to *Sunny Nights* from SUSI and TERRY, who inform them MONY is rapidly closing in on Kash's killer.

Mony's interrogations into who might have killed Kash are clearing potential suspects, which puts her on a fast path to eventually bringing in Kash's blackmail victims - the most recent of which was Martin.

Susi and Terry think Martin and Vicki should get out of the country. But with Tansform taking off and things going well with Joyce, Martin and Vicki aren't so keen on leaving right now. They just need something to get Mony off their scent. Luckily, Martin has a wild idea for a frame-job solution that just might work. All they need is a dead body, a good story and a willing witness.

As Susi and Terry begin to enact the elaborate cover-up plan, Martin and Vicki attend the Chemist Galore Vendor Engagement Day, hoping to pick up tips, tricks and valuable connections that'll help take Tansform national. As Martin takes to the stage with inspirational speaker, LEWIS TEMPLETON, Vicki networks with CEO and multi-millionaire, HAZEL BELANSZKY. But a day of attempted schmoozing with the best in the beauty biz

only shows the siblings how much further they have left to go.

And as JOYCE and NOVA piece together Kash's connection to Susi, Mony's quest to find her brother's killer brings her face to face with Martin, who has to dig into his past in order to survive.



Episode 5 Dumbest Girl Alive By Niki Aken

As Martin races against time to divert Mony's investigation into who killed her brother, Vicki's misguided attempt to boost Tansform's profile threatens to put them right back in her crosshairs.

Synopsis

After meeting with a high-end marketing firm, VICKI is determined to boost Tansform's profile, and her own fragile self-belief, with an expensive advertising campaign. But MARTIN, knowing they haven't got the budget and feeling like Tansform is on the path to meeting their sales goals, suggests they take the day off (so that he can spend it trying to impress JOYCE on her birthday). But a frustrated Vicki is determined to prove herself. So, Vicki tells Martin he can go hang with his estranged wife, but she's going to knuckle down.

Meanwhile, NOVA infiltrates Kash's wake at Family Fun Time, using a bogus snake sighting as cover to look for the mystery wine bar conwoman, SUSI.

And at the same wake, MONY, upset by the weak turnout of mourners and well-wishers, starts to suspect everyone at the event of killing her brother. Which means the plan to frame a corpse for Kash's murder needs to come together quickly. But that might be a challenge because a road rage incident triggers TERRY's CTE and he rolls into a ditch, with a rapidly defrosting body in his boot. Martin has to put his plans for Joyce's birthday on hold to rescue Terry and stage the crime scene in a way that'll convince Mony of the dead man's guilt – all before his big date.

Making it to the cocktail bar just in time, a frazzled Martin shows Joyce a side of himself that she's never seen before - one that might convince her he's a new man. And while Martin's proving himself to his wife, Terry's trying to convince Mony that a corpse she's completely unfamiliar with killed Kash.

And as it starts to look like the ruse might take the heat off the siblings and their co-conspirators, Vicki, still looking for the money to fund her advertising campaign, might drop them right back in the fire by borrowing cash from the worst possible option in Australia...



Episode 6 On A Cellular Level By Nick Keetch and Ty Freer

Martin and Vicki go to war with a rival brand, while Joyce and Nova go undercover, and Susi tries to get out of the crime business for good.

Synopsis

Tansform's meteoric rise hits a speed bump when arch-rival Glow Bronze runs an irresistible in-store BOGO promo. Which means VICKI's expensive billboard campaign is completely nullified. Now heavily in debt to the sister of the man they killed, and struggling to hit their sales targets, MARTIN and Vicki can feel their dreams, and their lives, slipping through their fingers. Martin develops a a convoluted coupon scheme to compete with Glow Bronze, but customers aren't convinced.

TERRY, having received the reward money for discovering Kash's killer, tries to get the ball rolling on his experimental CTE treatment, only to be told that he'll need to kick his opioid habit.

JOYCE and NOVA, who have discovered the identity of the mysterious extortionist, track SUSI to her house, and posing as wildlife wranglers, discover a clue that might unravel the mystery of Kash's death – while also revealing a shocking truth about Martin.

MONY, the burden of her brother's death finally lifted, makes plans to expand her criminal operation. But when her overzealous interrogation methods into the death of her brother are punished by the criminal syndicate in which she's a partner, she must figure out how to save her crumbling criminal empire.

Which is a problem for Susi, who has plans to exit the Fun Time crew, and get back to her dreams of rebuilding her family's business. But Mony's desperate, making it unlikely she'll be allowed to leave. Meaning Susi's going to have to force her way out.

Meanwhile, Vicki tries to disrupt their rival's supply of spray tan and ends up locked in the back of a Glow Bronze delivery truck. As Martin attempts to save his sister, he must decide if he has it in him to also save his company. Even if that means breaking the law.





Spisode 7 A Journey Down The Uncertain Road Of Yes By Nick Keetch and Ty Freer

Martin and Vicki try to finalise a long-term national distribution deal that will take Tansform to the next level, Susi attempts to change careers, Terry struggles to get clean, and Mony jumps into a new business.

Synopsis

MARTIN and VICKI, expecting to be offered a long-term contract, are brought back down to earth when their buyer, HENLEY, tells them that changes at the corporate level mean they have to impress a new VP of Sales. The siblings finagle their way into a private dinner with the VP, LACHLAN JENNINGS, and make plans to present themselves as impossible to turn down - a difficult task for wild-card Vicki.

MONY, meanwhile, is also making big moves. Having lost the casino, she's partnered with the owner of a greyhound track. Unfortunately, the clientele aren't exactly the high rollers she's used to.

Not wanting to go down with the Fun Time ship, SUSI plans to buy back her family's hotel and leave the crime life for good. But first, she'll have to convince the bank of her professional acumen and good moral character.

Head still spinning from last episode's revelation about Martin, JOYCE has her own questions about moral character. Could her husband really be capable of murder?

TERRY, trying to kick his opioid habit, gives in to his addiction and plans to get around his drug test by using a "urine doner." But when he hits rock bottom, he recommits to his plan to detox by any means necessary.

Despite Martin's planning and Vicki's commitment to putting on a professional demeanour, the VP dinner doesn't go to plan. As Martin struggles, Susi, playing his "wife", tries to convince him that he's capable of anything – after all, she's seen him survive much worse.

Together, Martin and Vicki use everything they've learned over the course of the season to convince Lachlan that they deserve a place on his retail shelves. But their success might not be worth much, because Joyce has made a discovery that could lead to them losing much more than their business.





Episode 8 Whatever Is Necessary By Nick Keetch and Ty Freer

Martin and Vicki must pull off the con of a lifetime to save their skins and their company.

Synopsis

Chemist Galore distribution deal secured, MARTIN and VICKI think they'll have the money they need to pay back their debt. But when they discover they won't receive any money for months, they must explore alternate financial options if they're to keep all their limbs intact. And they have to move quickly, because Vicki's next on MONY's list of debts to collect.

Martin and Vicki don't have much time to brainstorm solutions because JOYCE arrives to confront Martin with her damning evidence about his involvement in Kash Monroe's death. Martin finally confesses and Joyce is forced to decide whether she can move forward with her story, and if she wants anything to do with Martin.

SUSI, meanwhile, knowing Mony will never let her leave the Fun Time Crew, sets up a murderous ambush with another criminal, SKINNER.

When Mony arrives at Sunny Nights to collect, Martin and Vicki make a narrow escape and devise a new plan to settle their debt by borrowing the money from TERRY. At Terry's caravan, they find him in the throes of his detox. When they can't wake him, they decide to borrow his bag of cash temporarily. But Terry wakes and catches them in the act. Fortunately for the siblings, Terry's chained himself to his bed as part of his detox, and he's

unable to stop them from making off with his treatment fund.

Martin and Vicki absolutely plan to pay Terry back as soon as they clear their debt and get paid by Chemist Galore. But when their rustbucket car finally gives out in dramatic fashion, their ill-gotten funds are destroyed.

With no money and no other options, Martin and Vicki make one final all-or-nothing gamble to save their skins. But as they attempt to bluff their way out of trouble – they find that the only path forward that'll leave them alive is one where they make a deal with the devil.





About The Main Characters

MARTIN and VICKI, the siblings at the centre of this story, are two sides of the same coin. Except Martin's side is unused. It's kept in a felt-lined box. Rarely removed to ensure it remains unblemished by the world. Vicki's side is different. It's corroded by oxidation, scratched, and dented. It barely works in vending machines these days, and it's probably time it was discontinued. The product of a financially reckless father and an emotionallyindifferent mother, Martin has always been Vicki's de-facto parent. Someone had to raise them, so he took the responsibility and leaned into playing things safe. He took the first job offered out of college. Married his college sweetheart. Bought a house in his hometown. Set himself up so he'd never make the same mistakes as his parents. Vicki went the other way. She reacted to the chaos of their childhood by deciding that life's a bitch, so why play by the rules? Vicki's life's been a party. The kind that lasts 25 years. The kind where you catch your reflection in the mirror while cutting up lines of coke and realise - that maybe - you're running out of chances to make a change.

But then Martin's wife, Joyce, left him, and Vicki was arrested for selling stolen spray tan. And the siblings, pushing forty and staring headlong at the disaster of the rest of their lives, both decided they needed to try something different. So, together they took the plunge into the exciting world of consumer beauty products. Martin quit his job. They developed a unique formula. Bottled it. Named it "Tansform." And hit the sales convention circuit in Australia - because they have the highest rate of skin cancer in the world, and it just so happens to be where his estranged wife is currently located. He can't win her back if they're 15,000 kilometres apart. Which is how they ended up in Sydney, fledgling company struggling. The last of the start-up cash, gone. Trying to get away with murder. A murder that has intertwined Martin and Vicki with a series of other characters whose stories will constantly overlap with theirs.



Martin Marvin

Martin's smart and funny and determined but underneath, he's deeply anxious. In spite of his ambitious nature, he's always let fear rule his decision making. His unwillingness to take more risks led to his marriage stagnating, and now he wants to change.

Martin wants to prove to his wife that he's the driven man she thought she married, so he quit his job, cleaned out his savings, started a spray tan business with his wayward younger sister, Vicki, and set out for Australia. Sure, he's cash-strapped, entrepreneurially-inexperienced, and temporarily living in a culture he doesn't understand – but he's not

going back to America without the woman he loves.

But there was a reason Martin sought out the safe route in life. He knows there's a part of him that's been waiting to escape. A part he can't control. A part that frightens, but also excites him.

Overthe course of the season, we'll see Martin slowly transition from a scared, straight-laced rule-follower to a more confident, impulsive man capable of doing anything to get what he wants. But as his outlook on life starts to change, so will his goals, and he'll start to wonder whether he really wants his old life back.




Vicki Marvin

Vicki is the opposite of Martin. Vicki isn't scared of anything. She lives her life to the max and doesn't worry about consequences. She's spent the past 20 years partying, travelling, jumping from short-term relationship to short-term relationship – moving so fast she'll never have to think about the trauma she's running from.

But now Vicki's decided it's time to prove to everyone that she's got what it takes to make a success out of her life. Because Vicki doesn't want to be seen as a wayward embarrassment anymore. She's out to earn some respect. So, she convinced her brother that they both needed a change and together, they started spray tan company, Tansform. And while the business is helping her see herself in a different light, the voice in the back of her head that tells her she's worthless is always waiting to rear its head.

Over the course of the season, we'll reveal the layer of self-doubt that lies underneath Vicki's super-confident, brash exterior. She'll reveal to Martin that she's terrified their Mum is right when she says Vicki's worthless, and eventually she'll discover that all of her impulsiveness can be a superpower *if* she applies it at the right time.



Terry Torres

Terry is a former Rugby League star turned stand-over-man in the Sydney underworld, whose tough exterior hides a yearning to regain the family he's lost.

Terry spent his 20s as a popular and successful first-grade Rugby League front rower. But years of concussions, and one particularly bad knock to the head, caused Terry to develop CTE. His personality began to change, and a painkiller addiction soon followed, ending his career. Terrified of his own increasingly unpredictable mood-swings, he decided to separate himself from his loving wife Huela and son TJ, at least until he could find a cure for his condition.

These days, Terry's only source of income is working as muscle, relying on his reputation for violence. A reputation he hates. Despite keeping his distance from his family, Terry quietly keeps tabs on TJ, who's now a teenager with a talent for footy. When Terry watches TJ play from the top row of the grandstand - hat down to avoid being recognised - he can't help but feel pride. A feeling that will drive him to try and change.

Over the course of the season, as Terry does whatever's necessary to find a cure for his brain, he'll learn that it's actually his soul that needs saving.



Susi Kamdani

Susi is charming, whip-smart and highly observant - skills that have served her well as a con-woman. Her trade is seducing sleazy high-rollers at a Sydney casino - then blackmailing them with footage of their indiscretions the next morning.

Despite her talent, this is not the life Susi pictured for herself. Her life of crime didn't start until her father fell ill and lost his country hotel. After that, Susi had to increasingly rely on her illicit income to support her family, and fell in with a local crew of criminals that could provide her with easy marks and protection.

But taking advantage of people is starting to get to Susi. Especially now that her boss, local crook Kash Monroe, is starting to behave increasingly erratically.

And when she finds herself destroying the life of Martin Marvin, a man who definitely doesn't seem like he deserves it, Susi starts to think that maybe she needs to get out of crime.

That exit comes faster than expected one night, bonding her forever with former-mark, Martin. But as the consequences of her attempted escape catch up with her, Susi has to use all her powers of persuasion to keep herself and her new "friends" out of the cross-hairs of the cops and the crooks of Sydney.

Over the course of the season, Susi will find herself diving deeper into the world of crime in order to escape, only to discover she's more trapped than ever.



Nova Tulua

Nova's a wildlife wrangler for Rapid Reptile Removal - a family business that sounds more exciting than it actually is. Although there are worse jobs than setting snake traps around Sydney with her Uncle Frank, the mundanity of the gig has set in.

She's starting to feel stuck and dreams of what an alternative life path might look like, when one day on a work assignment, she finds a crocodile with a hole in its belly on a golf course. And inside that hole, a human hand.

And man, she just can't stop thinking about it.

Nova knows she should just focus on her job. But she can't help herself – she dives headlong into trying to solve the case with Joyce. And while her actions might put her job and her life at risk, she may have finally found her purpose.

Over the course of the series, Nova will go from a non-committal young woman yearning to escape her boring family business, to an obsessive amateur sleuth trying to solve a mysterious murder which helps her discover who she really is, and what she was meant to do.



Joyce Davis

Joyce grew up feeling like the forgotten member of her family. So, when she met Martin and he offered her love and companionship, it felt like she was getting something she always wanted. And Martin seemed like he wanted the same things as her – to move to a big city and pursue their dreams. That's why she left Australia for America in the first place.

But as Martin broke promise after promise, Joyce felt her life's goal of becoming a serious journalist drift away. As the years went by, she began to resent how Martin's own insecurities had stifled her life. So, she left him, moved back to Sydney and took a junior position at an online magazine -mostly click-bait stories, but it's a start.

When Joyce is assigned a story about an exploded crocodile on a golf course, she assumes it's just another puff piece. But when she discovers that the explosion has revealed the hand of a murdered criminal, she thinks she's found a story that could be her big break...

Joyce starts the season trying to prove that her new life without her husband is the one she's always wanted. But as she struggles to unravel the story behind the hand inside the crocodile, she starts to wonder if her new career is a huge mistake. And, as her doubts increase, her old fears about being alone start to rear their head, leading her back towards her estranged husband, Martin.



Mony Monroe

Mony grew up in foster homes with her brother, Kash. Constantly being shuffled around, the siblings came away from the chaos believing they could only rely on each other. They ran away from a group home in their teens and ended up in Sydney, robbing tourists, and running small scams. Eventually they saved enough of their ill-gotten gains to buy the dilapidated Family Fun Time, a lone symbol of joy from their childhoods, and turn it into their base of operations.

Over the years, they developed their criminal enterprise into a loan-sharking operation where they target down-on-their-luck gamblers outside of local casinos, and offer to front them cash to go back to the

tables - before taking the same gamblers for everything they've got when they inevitably fail to pay back their debts.

After three years in prison, she's about to be released and reunited with her beloved brother. But when she gets out, she discovers the only person who she truly loves, Kash, is gone. Mony's need for vengeance puts her on the warpath, and on a collision course with Martin and Vicki.

But vengeance is a lonely place, and without her brother by her side, Mony's starting to doubt whether she even wants to be a criminal. Over the course of the season, as she starts to consider alternative options, she might just find her calling in a burgeoning spray tan company...



About The Production

Sunny Nights is a Stan Original series from Jungle Entertainment (Population 11, Mr. Inbetween) and Echo Lake Entertainment (The Great) in association with Cineflix Rights (Last King of The Cross, Tehran) with major production investment from Stan and Screen Australia, and financed with support

from Screen NSW through the Made in NSW Fund. The series is directed and executive produced by Trent O'Donnell (Population 11, Colin from Accounts, No Activity, Hacks) and is created and written by Nick Keetch (Almost Paradise) and Ty Freer (High Fire, Almost Paradise). Sun Fanning And Australia - How Sunny Nights Came About

For Jungle Entertainment's Managing Director and executive producer of *Sunny Nights*, Jason Burrows, the opportunity to make the show with Echo Lake Entertainment was irresistible. Jungle had been looking for projects to bring Trent O'Donnell back to Australia when Echo Lake Entertainment approached Jungle with Nick Keetch and Ty Freer's pilot script.

"Sunny Nights is a perfect Jungle show because it is very much a drama that goes to some interesting and dark places, but it also has really strong comedic elements, and they're the type of shows that we love. It was a project that we immediately saw as a perfect Trent O'Donnell show - it just ticked all the boxes for us," Jason says.

Executive producer (and CEO of Echo Lake) Doug Mankoff said, "Working with Jungle and Trent O'Donnell has been an amazing collaboration. We could not have asked for better partners to help make *Sunny Nights* such a terrific television show."

Co-creators and executive producers Nick and Ty were looking to develop a crime show together that emphasized their different approaches to writing. Ty's background leans towards comedy, whereas Nick has written more drama. The inspiration for the series came from friends of Nick's who had started a spray tanning business from their house in Los Angeles, building it into a juggernaut company that they later sold for tens of millions of dollars.

"That's how we ended up with a with a crime show that combines the complexities of trying to get away with murder with the absurdities of trying to a build a spray tan business. It seemed to us that there was an interesting aspirational story to tell that also had a metaphorical component about how we hide ourselves in the modern world," Nick explains.

"Sydney has a coastal culture that's similar to LA, and LA was a big influence on our thinking when we created the show. Sydney has a culture that's very aesthetically aspirational, so it's the perfect place to set a show about spray tanning. There are a lot of people who present versions of themselves externally that aren't always the most authentic versions of themselves. That, combined with Australia's very specific cultural interest in the outlaw and the criminal, made Sydney the right place to combine those two story elements," Nick continues.

Nick and Ty also knew that to distinguish their show from the many other crime shows on television around the world, they needed to create unique characters alongside the story of the spray tanning business.

"We were shooting for people you've never seen on screen before, something subversive, something different, like Nova the wildlife wrangler. We could very easily have had her just as an investigating cop but we always want to do something different, which isn't always easier, but it's ultimately more rewarding," Ty says.

Nick adds that Terry, the criminal fixer, could also have been a one note character; the muscle who just walks around beating people up: "But we wanted something that gave him more depth, and that's why we added the element of him being an ex-rugby player suffering from a degenerative brain disease, so that we could tell a different story about that type of character that you've seen a million times."



Casting Sunny Nights

The most original characters of all are the siblings Martin and Vicki Marvin, an American brother and sister who head to Australia, the land of perennial sunshine, to remake themselves as spray tan entrepreneurs.

For Nick and Ty, as well as director and executive producer Trent O'Donnell, the first choices for these central roles were Will Forte and D'Arcy Carden. Trent had worked previously with both and knew the brilliance that they would bring to the roles. Will and D'Arcy had never worked together before, but had long wanted the opportunity. Despite having to relocate to Australia for a few months to make the show, the opportunity to work with Trent again along with the magic of Ty and Nick's scripts persuaded them to cross the world.

Trent says: "I adore Will and D'Arcy as people and as actors. This is a drama series but it is also very funny, and in working in grounded comedy, which is mostly what I do, I want the characters to be funny, but also feel like they are a real person. And Will and D'Arcy have an incredible sense of character - they 'value add' so much. When you're directing, you have a billion things on your plate. But if you cast well, you want those smart, funny actors to take ownership of the character, and it makes

life so much easier for me to work with actors whose sensibility I really trust. Will and D'Arcy brought so much pathos and comedy to their characters. They're incredible."

Producer Bridget Callow says: "Will and D'Arcy were our first and only thoughts for those roles. It is so rare to be able to get your first picks, and so we were blown away to be able to get both of them to come and play. They are not only incredible performers, and so perfect for the roles, but they were behaving like brother and sister within two days of working together. They were like siblings in real life and it was hard to believe they hadn't worked together before. They had a fantastic relationship. And they are the nicest people to work with. The whole cast and crew absolutely loved them."

Surrounding Will and D'Arcy is a who's who of Australian acting, with New Zealand's legendary Rachel House taking on the role of the criminal gang leader Mony, with other supporting cast including Jessica De Gouw, Miritana Hughes, Ra Chapman, Megan Wilding, Harry Greenwood and, in his first acting role, Rugby League legend Willie Mason. Audiences with a keen eye will also note a host of cameos from high-profile actors such Patrick Brammall, Ewen Leslie, Leon Ford, Emma Lung, Jeremy Sims and Claudia O'Doherty.



The Allure Of Working With Trent O'Donnell

Gathering such extraordinary cast, including those literally dropping into the *Sunny Nights* set for a day's work, speaks volumes about Trent O'Donnell's reputation. Actors simply love working with him. As do crew.

"Trent is one of those few directors who can direct a drama with very high stakes and bring in beautiful comedic moments while not losing the stakes of that drama. He can direct comedy in such a way that it's extremely grounded and truthful for the characters. His casting instincts are brilliant and it's a truly collaborative process with the actors," says Jason Burrows.

Bridget Callow says: "Trent is a phenomenal director and we're lucky to have somebody who is so experienced. What he's particularly good at is creating an environment where the performers can be their absolute best. He creates a vibe on set where everybody is gunning to work their hardest, but they also get to play. It becomes a fun environment, which is conducive to everyone doing their best work. It's always a joy. Sunny Nights was a particularly happy set. We were shooting a very sunny show in the middle of winter and it was freezing at times, but everyone coped with that incredibly well. We had a truckload of fun."

Jessica De Gouw, who plays Susi, says: "Trent knows comedy inside out so you know that he has complete control, and therefore within that space, you can play and you can take risks. It's a joy to feel so secure with a director and know that, whatever you offer, he will turn it into something wonderful and very funny. I think he's Australia best comedy director."



Creating The World Of Sunny Nights

Sunny Nights is the third series production designer Claire Granville has made with Trent O'Donnell, and Trent has also worked before with costume designer Rita Carmody and hair and makeup designer Cassie Hanlon. New to his collaborators is director of photography Tyson Perkins.

Together they created an extraordinary world in Sydney that takes us from the city's world renowned harbour and beaches to its less glamorous underbelly, including the suburban *Sunny Nights* motel where Martin and Vicki are staying while they launch their business, and the run down Family Fun Time amusement park, front to Mony and Kash's criminal enterprise.

The series was filmed entirely on location, with 97 different locations across Sydney featured.

Nick Keetch says: "Tonally the show is an attempt to juxtapose the darker crime world with the bright elements of the beauty industry. The comedy is designed to reflect the absurdity of the two worlds clashing, and its dark drama comes from the real stakes of Martin and Vicki trying to get away with murder."

Ty continues: "The physical embodiment of the tone is Family Fun Time which is a kid's theme park but is also a crime front. So you've got literal children's games and arcade machines and go-karts, but in the back room there are criminals doing terrible things, such as torturing other bad guys. That contrast feels entirely like the show to me."

Trent O'Donnell says that shooting on location meant that the production was able to capture the two sides of Sydney that represent the clashing of Nick and Ty's two worlds.

"Unashamedly we show the beaches and the coastline and all those beautiful things we have in Sydney. But it's not a show about beautiful people doing beautiful things. It's a show about characters really struggling to keep their head above water. And so we juxtaposed Sydney's beauty with a darker, grimier Sydney that's not so fancy and not so expensive. I owe a lot to Tyson Perkins, the DP, who was just so dedicated and has such a wonderful eye for shots. He was incredible to work with," Trent says.

Tyson Perkins says: "In Sunny Nights you've got this world that is a very heightened version of Sydney but we wanted to use the camera language and the lighting language to bed the show back down into reality, so that the characters are relatable and what they're doing feels real."

The sets are incredible, from Family Fun Time with its ferris wheel and putt putt course, to the Sunny Nights motel, with its neon signage and iced vo-vo pink exterior. Claire and her team also had to create an exploding crocodile, while amongst the costumes Rita Carmody created was a life size Tansform novelty can costume for Will's character Martin to wear to promote the product.

Tyson says: "The Sunny Nights motel was the standout for me. If you look at it as a symbol or metaphor for the whole show, it was a real pleasure to shoot in because you can see the influence of everyone collaborating; from the tones that were in the walls to the design of the neon sign, to the costumes, to the way we shot it, and the way that it was designed for Will and D'Arcy to play in. I think it really reflects the unique experience we had on the show where everyone got the vision and everyone was confident to do their thing. One of his best assets as a director is the fact that he steers the ship while he also allows everyone to feel like they've got an equal voice."

Production designer Claire Granville says: "Trent really gives you space to be creative. It's the first time I've worked with Tyson and letting the two of us loose on the look, alongside Rita, has been amazing."

Claire took inspiration for Family Fun Time from Coney Island and other amusement parks of the 50s era. Kash and Mony used to visit the park when they were kids and, once they had made money from their extortion racket, they bought it to use as their headquarters. The art department had a great time finding old amusement park pieces to dress the set, including giant fiberglass cupcakes, pigs and toadstools, and one of the team painted a clown mural. Inside we see the vintage carousal, details such as a taxidermy pufferfish and an axe-throwing wall.

Bridget says: "Everywhere you look in the interior of Family Fun Time, there are easter eggs and clues. Mony's office, for instance, is jam packed with lots of objects, and each one of these objects has a story behind it and a

reason for Claire to put them into Mony's office. The whole design is very, very thoughtful."

Nick Keetch says: "Everybody really understood that the assignment which was to create a world that felt both authentic and also juxtapositional; that really showed the darkness of the crime world, but with really big pops of color. And you can see that in the set design and in the costume choices, but it never extends to being too silly or too absurd. What we were trying to create was a real, but heightened world.

Ty Freer says the production design is "truly incredible".

"Martin and Vicki's room at the Sunny Nights motel has been in our head for years. When I walked into the set for the first time and looked around, I felt immediately overwhelmed with the beauty. I walked outside and I cried. That's a reflection of how much effort and heart the design team put into it."



A Conversation With Will Forte

Q: What attracted you to travel to Australia to work on *Sunny Nights*?

A: I met Trent O'Donnell the director several years ago, during Covid, when I did a voice role for No Activity. And he's just a delight. So we kept in touch, and he reached out to me a couple years later and sent me the scripts for Sunny Nights. I loved the scripts. First of all, I love Trent. Second of all, I love the show, and then the chance to come to Australia for the very first time and see what it's like over here sounded awesome too. It's been as fantastic as I had hoped. Then the fourth thing, which didn't register into the decision but was a blessing that came after I had decided I was going to do it, was D'Arcy Carden. I had heard that she was the person that the role was written for, but we didn't know if she would be able to do it or not. So when I found out that she was, it was very, very exciting.

Q: You seem like a great double act. Have you had fun?

A: We have so much fun together. We have a million friends in common, but had never met and never worked together, so this has just been a really delightful time, work wise and socially just such a fun time too. My wife's down here, and my kids, her husband's down here, so when we're not working, we're hanging out together and just having a great time.

Q: How have you found Sydney's winter weather?

A: D'Arcy and I are both from Northern California and so this is very similar to the weather that we grew up with. People keep apologizing that it's so cold but to us, this feels about right. It feels like home, and it also visually reminds us of Northern California. I love it here. I feel really comfortable. Everyone's very nice and welcoming and this crew has just been fantastic; just a bunch of really, wonderfully sweet people who are really, really good at their jobs.

Q: What is the story of *Sunny Nights*, and how Martin fits into that story?

A: Sunny Nights is a story about a brother and sister. I'm the brother. D'Arcy is the sister. We start a spray tan company. A part of me is starting it because I'm chasing after my wife, who's left me. She's Australian. She's moved back to Australia, so we come down here to try to start this spray tan business. Because the sun's so 'burnie' down here, we think this is a good place to start it. But in the back of my mind, I also want to get my wife back. Well as things unfold, things happen which get in the way, and we get mixed up with the wrong people and things unravel and then ravel and then unravel. There are a lot of twists and turns. Just when you think you're out of the woods, you're back in the woods, and then out. It's fun. I remember reading the scripts for the first time and it was very, very funny.



Q: What does Trent bring as a director? How have you enjoyed working with him?

A: Trent knows what he wants. He has been really fun. The scripts are fantastic but, every once in a while, you get to a part where you're like, 'Oh, it feels like maybe there needs to be something here' and as that's going through my mind, before I can say anything in between takes or during the take we're working on, Trent will shout out the perfect fix to it. He just always seems to know exactly what is missing or what could make the work better. It's really comforting as an actor to be in the hands of a director who you can put all your trust. He's just really funny, really smart. You guys don't probably use the term five-tool player, but it's a baseball term. But, yeah, he's a five-tool player.

Q: Did you speak to Nick and Ty, the creators, about their vision for the show and their vision for Martin?

A: I talked to Nick and Ty after I had read the very first script. A couple of months later, they sent me the second script, which was awesome also - and then that's all I read before I had to make a decision. I just had to have faith that they could land the rest of the eight in the way that they did the first two. It was a huge relief when I read the other the final six and they were fantastic. They were in fact, maybe even better - the story got more and more fun. It's a real testament to them that they've brought all of these stories together into one cohesive

series. It's a comedy, but there are dramatic elements and there are scary elements and a lot of tension and suspense. So it's really fun because you never get sick of work. One day you're a goofball, and the next day you're getting waterboarded.

Q: Tell me about some of the most memorable moments on set?

A: We were down on Bondi Beach and the wind was howling that day. I was really cold and D'Arcy was really cold. But there was this guy who was getting a spray tan demo, and he was in, I would say Speedos. You guys would say budgie smugglers. I wanted to complain about how cold I was, but then this guy was just wearing Speedos, and we were spraying basically cold water on him while the wind was howling, so I couldn't complain.

Q: What audiences going to love about *Sunny Nights*?

A: It's a riveting story that keeps you guessing. You never know what's going to happen and there's a lot of humour throughout. But it's not just straight comedy. It's got a bunch of really good actors - really, really fun and wonderful people. I mean, just even for very small roles, Trent's gotten legends of the Australian comedy scene. So we're really blessed with the different people who have come to do parts in this. It's going to look fantastic. This guy Tyson Perkins is a wizard. I think it's gonna be great.



A Conversation With D'Arcy Carden

Q: What attracted you to the role of Vicki and persuaded you to come to Australia?

A: So much attracted me to this role and this project. It started with Trent O'Donnell, who I know and have worked with and love. We started working together on *The Good Place* eight years ago, and have worked together a few times since, and are always sort of looking for reasons to work together. A couple years ago, he called me and said, 'I have this great script. I want you to read it. I feel like it would be great for you and Will Forte'. I am such a fan of Will's. I had never worked with him before or even met him, but have loved him for years, and thought, 'oh my gosh, what a dream'. Then Trent said we'd film it in Australia. Everything was, as you guys say, 'tick, tick, tick'.

I read the script, and I was so happy. I closed the last page, and then I opened the front page and I read it again. There have been so many moments on set where Trent and Will and I look at each other and we're like, 'it's happening. We did it. We're here. Can you believe it?' There was a lot of a lot that attracted me to this project and it has exceeded my good expectations. I thought it was going to be good. It's great.

Q: How have you enjoyed filming Sunny Nights?

A: Filming has been such a great experience from the first day. I was blown away from the table read. We have these heavy hitters, Australian legends to have come to play on our show for a day or two, or a week or more and everybody is incredible. Will and I, we've had many days on set where we're doing our scenes, and then somebody will pop in and

blow our minds. We'll do the rehearsal, or we'll do a take and Will and I look at each other and we're like, 'oh, they're good'. And this just keeps happening. It's such an impressive cast and I can tell these are a bunch of Trent O'Donnell's friends and people he's worked with before. And he's basically bragging about all his friends. He's like, 'look at all these talented actors I work with' and Will and I are impressed.

Q: What is it about Trent O'Donnell as a director that attracts these actors?

A: He is a very certain kind of actor's director. He is so collaborative. He's wonderful and fun and creative and funny, and he's just great. And he brings all of that to his directing. You can tell he loves working as a team. He only has people around him who feel the same way. So the all the crew and everybody on the set - I mean everybody on the set - is a team player, super collaborative, here to help each other, here to make everything better. It's so inspiring and so fun. He really lifts people up and wants people to be their best.

Q: Have you and Will Forte forged a strong bond?

A: Mates, totally mates. I've been a fan of Will Forte since his first episode of SNL. I just remember thinking this guy is so weird and so funny, and my love for him only grew. I'm such a fan of what he's done in his career, and we have about one million friends in common. We'd never met before. We had one dinner the week before we came out here to get to know each other. We're also from the same small hometown, right outside of San Francisco. It's so wild. We've been just like circling each other for years and we became such good friends so quickly, and that is so rare and so lucky. And our spouses love each other.

Q: What is the story of *Sunny Nights*, and where Vicki fits into that story?

A: The story revolves around this 'down on their luck' brother and sister duo, Vicki and Martin Marvin. Vicki just wants her life to work out. And it's not working out. She's looking for some success, but not really putting the work in. I think this show starts at that point where you think 'Did I miss my calling? Did I miss my moment?' They're scrambling for some meaning in their life. And they find that meaning through, you guessed it, spray tan. And that leads them to Australia, which for Vicki means adventure and success and a new life. And for Martin it means following his estranged wife, Joyce, to Australia. We're both kind of in it for similar but different reasons, but the main goal is to make some money and get our life going. However, our lack of knowledge about this business and our ambition and determination lead us into bed with the wrong

people, figuratively and literally. We get mixed up with some bad dudes, and we get in over our heads almost immediately.

What's so fun about the show and what drew me in immediately is that the characters are really distinct, and they're real. I know all of these characters. I can see these fun characters, I can see this fun world, and then all of a sudden, shit hits the fan? Their entire world gets flipped upside down. I just love a story that's about people in over their head. They are so in over their head. It's like they are at the top of a hill, just running down and trying not to fall.

Q: How have you enjoyed being in Australia?

A: I've been happy every single day that I've been in Sydney. It's a beautiful place. It's just been such a great experience, and I've really fallen in love with this cast and crew.



A Conversation With Rachel House

Q: What attracted you to the role of Mony and Sunny Nights more generally?

A: I thought it was very good writing - very clever, very dry and with fantastic humor. I thought it was a beautifully drawn world full of fascinating characters.

Q: How does Mony fit into the world of Sunny Nights?

A: Mony is the leader of her gang. It used to be her and her brother Kash, her foster brother. They were bounced around foster homes as children, and they found solace in each other, which is why they have such an intense relationship, and why Cash's death is so devastating. She's fun to play.

Q: How have you enjoyed working with the cast of Sunny Nights?

A: Will and D'Arcy are the loveliest people and it's been a pleasure to be around them; and they are team players, which is important. And then, our ensemble, we've had a lot of fun together which makes the on-screen world even more potent. Matuse, George and Jess are just sublime. Our characters are the executors of some horrendous things. We do terrible things to people. So, it's important that we have a lot of fun in real life.

Willie Mason is just so impressive. He's gone from strength to strength. It's been such a pleasure to watch him really take to this industry in such a wonderful, rich and deep way. He's a natural.

Q: Did you to speak to the creators, Nick and Ty, about the role of Mony?

A: Yes. Nick and Ty were very, very generous. They really wanted us to make the characters our own and just run with our instincts. They've created a phenomenal world with very rich characters.

Q: What are audiences going to love? What can they expect?

A: There are a lot of layers to all these characters, and I think that's what people will be drawn to. And, with Vicki and Martin, they will want to know 'Will they make it? Will they get through?'. There are just so many obstacles.



About The Cast Will Forte As Martin

Will Forte has established himself as one of the most versatile actors in film and television. Forte is known for his eight seasons on Saturday Night Live and his starring role in the feature film adaptation of MacGruber, for which he co-wrote the script with Jorma Taccone and John Solomon. In December 2021, the trio created the MacGruber series on Peacock, which stars original castmates Kristen Wiig and Ryan Phillippe.

Forte can most recently be seen starring alongside Tina Fey and Steve Carell in Netflix's series *The Four Seasons*, released in May 2025, which has been picked up for a second season. Forte can also be seen in Netflix's *Kinda Pregnant* alongside Amy Schumer and Jillian Bell, released in February 2025. In May 2024, Forte starred in the Netflix series *Bodkin*, produced by Higher Ground. Previous credits include the Universal film Strays, Netflix's *Thelma The Unicorn*, Fox's *The Great North* and Netflix's *Sweet Tooth*.

She also received rave reviews for her starring performance in the Amazon/Sony TV series adaptation of the classic film *A League of Their Own*. Carden was most recently seen recurring on the final season of *The Handmaid's Tale*. She stars alongside Jennifer Garner, Chloe Sevigny, Regina Hall and Gemma Chan in The *Five Star Weekend* (Peacock), an upcoming series based on the Elin Hilderbrand novel of the same name.

In film, Carden stars alongside Tony Hale in the *Sketch*, which premiered at the Toronto International Film Festival - it has a 100% score on Rotten Tomatoes - and will be released theatrically in August 2025. Later, he was sent to St Stephen's boarding school, (Tipene), in South Auckland, New Zealand, and after a difficult transition, learnt to embrace the teachings and disciplines of Māori Tikanga.



Upon completing high school, and after the devastating loss of his mother, Miritana returned to Sydney, Australia to pursue acting.

Described as "an unpredictable and raw talent", he attended Dean Carey's The Actor's Centre, before being accepted into the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA), in Perth.

Other recent credits include *No Activity: The Night Before Christmas* for Stan and BBC Studios, and *Big Deal* for ABC and Madman Entertainment.

Before her tenure at Jungle Entertainment, under her own company banner, Bridget independently produced three award-winning feature films, which all launched at top tier international festivals, and sold around the world, showcasing her commitment to exceptional storytelling across diverse formats and genres.

A significant number of Lally's plays are published by Currency Press, PlayLab and Australian Scripts Online. Lally regularly writes articles for magazines and newspapers and has been a panellist on television shows including Q&A, Agony of Modern Manners and Dirty Laundry.
