Welcome to the Belfry and the premiere production of *The Children's Republic*.

The Children's Republic is based on the true and inspirational tale of Dr. Janusz Korczak, a selfless advocate for children's rights. In this issue of Upstage, Dr. Robert Oppenheimer provides us with a brief biography of Dr. Korczak and Michael Shamata delves into the realities and importance of producing this play, at this time.

The play takes place in a Jewish Orphanage, confined within the walls of the Warsaw ghetto. Dr. Korczak struggles to protect the children and save them from the horrors of World War II. A powerful and true story of beauty and heroism in a world devoid of freedom and the necessities of life.

Hannah Moscovitch has continued to work on this piece throughout rehearsals and director Christian Barry has assembled a fine team of actors to tackle this important piece of theatre.

Paul Rainville (last seen at the Belfry in Art) will play Dr. Janusz Korczak with, Kerry Sandomirsky (*Brilliant!*) as Stefa, his longtime colleague. Rounding out the cast is Sari Alesh, a recent arrival from Syria, who played violin with the Syrian National Symphony Orchestra.

A BRIEF INTRODUCTION TO THE LIFE OF **Dr. Janusz** Korczak

JANUSZ KORCZAK WAS A POLISH-JEWISH PAEDIATRICIAN, AUTHOR AND PSYCHOLOGIST. BORN HENRYK GOLDSZMIT IN 1878, KORCZAK ADOPTED HIS PEN NAME AS A YOUNG MAN WHEN HE BECAME A PUBLISHED AUTHOR.

Above all Korczak believed that children should be recognized as full human beings and treated with respect. This approach was at odds with the prevailing beliefs of the time, and many of his ideas are still radical even by modern standards.

Korczak was a successful young paediatrician in Warsaw when he decided to give up his medical practice in order to focus on running a pair of orphanages for Jewish and Catholic children. This became the main focus of his work with children over the next thirty years. As movingly portrayed in the play, Korczak and his close colleague Stefa Wilczyńska, together with their staff, created an oasis of hope in the midst of suffering for the Jewish children in their care.

The titles of two of Korczak's many books: "How to Love a Child" and "The Child's Right to Respect" give a sense of the values he espoused. He wrote "Children are not people of tomorrow, they are people today" and he was also a key figure in the development of the international movement for children's rights that began in the 1920s.

Korczak also developed a Children's Court, complete with child judges, that offered all the inhabitants of the orphanage a chance to seek justice for perceived wrongs done to them. This included the right of any child to accuse an adult staff member of mistreating him or her, an almost unheard of concept at that time or even today. Korczak and Stefa intended to help each child realize their full potential in life. This careful attention to the needs of each individual child is one of the most impressive aspects of his child-care model. There were also weekly opportunities for visits from former orphans, which over time came to include their spouses and their own children.

Besides supervising the running of the orphanages, Korczak was busy with his involvement in many other activities. These included writing books both for and about children, appearing in the city's courts on behalf of delinquent youth, and offering regular radio shows for both parents and children as "The Old Doctor". »

Story Highlights

As they have grown quite a bit you may not recognize Lily Cave and Simeon Sanford Blades - they played Fan and Tiny Tim in our original production of *A Christmas Carol*.

Camellia Koo has designed all three productions of *The Children's Republic:* Great Canadian Theatre Company in Ottawa, Tarragon Theatre in Toronto and the Belfry's production.

We have presented three plays by Hannah Moscovitch - *Little* One, The Russian Play and, this past March, What a Young Wife Ought to Know. Photo by David Cooper Korczak also developed and ran the children's section of a national newspaper with a staff of child writers and editors from all over Poland. In addition, Korczak lectured on children's needs at the medical school and he ran an ongoing training program for the younger staff at the orphanages.

Many graduates of Korczak's orphanages later joined the Kibbutz movement and some became ministers in the Polish government. During WW2, Korczak and Stefa continued to take care of the children after the Jewish orphanage was forcibly re-located to the Warsaw



Hannah Moscovitch is an incredibly exciting voice in Canadian theatre. We have presented three of her remarkable plays during three separate SPARK Festivals. Last year at SPARK, we presented her heart-stopping *What a Young Wife Ought to Know*, in a searing production from 2b theatre in Halifax, directed by Christian Barry, the director of our production of *The Children's Republic*.

The Children's Republic is a play that I saw at the Tarragon Theatre in Toronto seven or eight years ago. It had a very successful run, but, knowing that Hannah was interested in revisiting it, we commissioned a new version. Two happy workshops later, we have an exquisite script, and one that is unhappily all too appropriate for the social climate in the world today.

It does our hearts good to see and hear the words and actions that Hannah has written – that represent the words and actions of a remarkable human being, whose love and respect for children was more powerful than the hate that surrounded and eventually destroyed them.

I chose this play because I love Hannah's writing and I love this play – especially in this new version. I did not know when I chose it that Nazi flags and slogans, rallies of hate, and lack of moral leadership would be the issues of the day.

Ghetto. Then, in early August 1942, all 200 children were marched to the train depot and sent in cattle cars to the Nazi death camp at Treblinka, along with Korczak, Stefa and the rest of the staff. They were all murdered on arrival. This year marks the 75th anniversary of their deaths.

Dr. Oppenheimer is a retired child psychologist living in Victoria, with a longstanding interest in Janusz Korczak's work. Robert is an active member of the Janusz Korczak Association of Canada, their website at www.januszkorczak.ca is a great resource for learning more about Korczak's life, and includes on-line access to his "Selected Works" and other publications about him.

Belfry donors Rob and Shirley Hunter have been married for 34 successful years. Rob, who came from Vancouver, has benefited from the love of Shirley's large extended family, as she is a third generation Victorian. He started Devon Properties in 1980 and by the time Rob and his partner sold the company this year, it had grown into the largest property management company on the island and leading broker of apartment buildings. Fortunately, both Rob and Shirley believe that "if you are doing well, it's important to give back to the community." Shirley was the first chairperson for Greater Victoria Crime Stoppers and is active in fundraising for supportive housing.

Their attendance at the Belfry goes back to the eighties. Rob confesses that his taste in theatre may be a little more traditional than Shirley's. However, looking back, it turns out that the plays he has loved the most were ones that Shirley persuaded him see, including the very memorable *Mom's the Word* and Joel Bernbaum's *Home is a Beautiful Word*.

The Hunters support the Belfry because of our encouragement of emerging playwrights, the need for "home grown" art, and also because the Belfry is "comfy and homey and feels good." It is one of the cultural destinations that they enjoy most in the city. They realize that none of this can exist without community support.

We are fortunate that the Hunters have generously supported both our artistic work as well as our Capital Campaign to fund the recent renovations. The Capital Campaign made sense to them, as after building commercial properties for 40 years, they could recognize the need to maintain and upgrade buildings and are aware of how much money it takes to keep a facility of this nature functioning in top form. They cite having a more functional concession area and the expansion of the women's washrooms as just two of the practical changes that will make an important difference for the Belfry's future.

Thank you, Rob and Shirley, for your generous support, and your outreach into the community to help raise funds for this remarkable transformation of the Belfry Theatre in 2017.
